

Swan Upping on the Thames in Caversham

On a damp and dreary morning in July the Swan- Uppers arrived at Caversham lock. Although I have lived in Caversham for many years this was the first time I had witnessed the event. I was surprised to see that most of them were not dressed in red but in blue. Red is worn by the Crown company and blue by the Dyers' and Vintners' companies. The purpose of the event is to count the Swans and to count and mark the cygnets.



Launches were in attendance all flying colourful flags with white swans on bright backgrounds. There were six skiffs each with the bright flags, but just one carried the red liveried uppers led by the Queen's swan marker. The drizzle worsened and the beautiful red and blue jackets were quickly protected with matching waterproofs. Dazzling white trousers were also worn and I wondered how many pairs had been carried to enable the participants to look so smart. Some of the uppers sported swan feathers in their caps.

Watching from the riverside we did not see any cygnets to be ringed and the Uppers proceeded into the lock to make their way up-river to the Caversham Prom. Spectators walked along the river bank and many crossed by the new bridge to watch the boats pass by. The family of swans that had been seen frequently on Fry's island were conspicuous by their absence. However, I was told that they had been caught and 'Upped'.



On arriving at the Prom by Caversham Bridge the Uppers boarded a boat for some refreshment before rowing on to Mapledurham and further up the river. There were many swans around but I did not see any cygnets and so did not see any Upping. Perhaps I will be luckier next year.

Reading reports of the Upping in other areas it seems that there are more cygnets around than last year, sadly not on the stretch of the Thames in Caversham.

TALKING POINT

Who is my neighbour?

Do you know your neighbours? Apparently 50% of us in this country don't know the names of their neighbours, let alone anything else about them.

Knowing someone's name is the first step in getting to know them. We find it very hard to have a conversation with someone when we don't know their name. I wonder if you've had one of those conversations when you cannot remember a person's name and, being embarrassed, you do all that you can to skirt around the issue and pretend you know who you are talking to? (Or perhaps that is just me?!)

But knowing someone's name is not enough. Living in a complex and varied society it is all too easy to pass by our neighbours without knowing anything about them. To 'know' someone is to allow them into your lives, to help people for their own sake rather than for reward, to journey with them through the ups and down of life.

In answer to the question 'Who is my neighbour', Jesus told a story about a good Samaritan. But in doing so, he was pointing out to his Jewish audience that they should look to find their neighbours outside of their own community, among the despised geographical neighbours in Samaria. The point of the Good Samaritan story is that it is the most unexpected, and perhaps disliked or hated, person we can think of that does the neighbourly task in looking after the sick man. Jesus ends the story by saying "Go and do likewise" to those following him.

So, we too are commissioned to find our neighbours in those who come at the bottom of our 'favourites' list. Think about who among those you know, that you think of least, and who in our society are the most berated. They are our neighbours whom we need to seek out, befriend and journey with as common humanity.

In a world that is increasingly quick to categorise and marginalise people, to blame others for our ills, to encourage 'us' to not be like 'them', the challenge to know our neighbours is as relevant now as it was in Jesus' time. The risk of the changes in UK and USA politics is that we are encouraged to focus on our nation, our own needs, and not look further.

Being a good neighbour asks each one of us to be broader than that. So as summer begins to turn to autumn, now might be a good time to seek out that person we don't know and to commit to getting to know them.

The Crown Air Rifle Club

A batch of old postcards I received earlier in the year contained one would be 'a certain and positive assistance in showing Caversham Mill, which I used in my article for July, and this one. It shows 21 members of the Caversham Crown Air Rifle Club in 1910.



Air rifles were commonly used by farmers to shoot at crows, rabbits and other pests. The clubs proliferated during the Edwardian period: during the course of the Boer War, various inadequacies in the British Army were shown up. The Boers were adept marksmen, able to target our troops with apparent ease. The British were not so adept.

The National Rifle Association had been formed in 1859, but the rifles were of large calibre, the ammunition was expensive, and the firing ranges were out in the country, beyond the reach of most men. By contrast, the Society of Working Men's Rifle Clubs, founded in 1899, used small-bore rifles, and the ammunition was much more affordable. They soon had over 4,000 affiliated clubs, often attached to pubs and large firms. It was thought by the military at the time that practice in shooting at targets



case men were called upon in defence of their country.'

An Internet search has brought up an interesting photograph of a shooting competition run by the Reading Post Office Rifle Club, from around the same time as the postcard. Their shooting range was in a yard between tall buildings, and the targets can be seen. Rule books state that the bull's eye should be five feet from the ground, and the length of the range should be between six and eight yards. The spot at which contestants fired was painted white, and in the photograph, a pot of flake white paint and a brush can be seen, kept handy so that it could be repainted. Presumably this had to be done after each splash of pellets. Each contestant had five shots, starting with a preliminary "sighter" which did not count towards the score. The rules did not allow the prizes for the winning side to be bought out of club funds - they had to be paid for by the losers. The rule-books I've seen don't seem to mention the little medals that the men in the picture are wearing.

Local papers show the formation of the Reading Temperance Air Rifle League in 1910, and the existence of an air rifle shooting section of the Biscuit Factory Recreation Club.

The men in the club from the Crown look ultra-respectable - all wearing suits, collars and ties. One of them is a clergyman. Where we can see their shoes, they are highly polished. Most of the men have at least one medal, and some have as many as 12, most of them pinned directly onto their jackets, rather than hanging from a ribbon.

The River Thames is in the background of the picture. Around 1910 the area around the pub would not have been so built up, so there should

CTC Children's Summer Holiday Club 2017

Anne's School in the first week of August for the annual summer holiday club. This year, volunteers from 13 different Caversham churches were involved. The ecumenical holiday club is now in its sixth year, having started in the 2012 Olympic year.

The Scripture Union 'Guardians of Ancora' programme started with a service at Gosbrook Road Methodist Church, five days of holiday club, then a final service at Caversham Baptist Church as a celebration. Through seven stories starting with the announcement of the birth of a Saviour as told in Micah, through two stories about Angels visiting, firstly, Mary and Joseph and, secondly, the shepherds, we moved thirty years forward to hearing about how Jesus taught his disciples to pray, then onto Good Friday and lastly to Easter Sunday.



There is a Bible verse, which is used each day that the children are encouraged to learn: (John 3:16) 'God so loved the world that he gave his only Son that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life'.

The club has a structured day: after registration in year groups, everyone gathers in the main hall for singing, listening to the Bible story for the day told by a story-teller. Then it's back to our rooms for snack time and a review of the Bible story, craft activities and puzzles/colouring in a Scripture Union booklet. After lunch and playtime, the afternoons are spent in two sessions of other activities ranging from archery and dance through fencing, French and football to community craft and cookery. This year the children had the opportunity of seeing and holding many types of reptiles, including a bearded dragon.

One hundred and fifty Caversham children gathered at St. The tree frog gave great entertainment and some consternation to the adults accompanying the children!



Wednesday afternoon traditionally is 'Wet Wednesday' and this year it really was wet! The outdoor water-based activities included a competition to carry as much water as you can in a cap or a newspaper, an obstacle course where the children were bombarded by super soakers, as if they needed to get wetter! A halt was called earlier than usual so everyone could dry off and warm up inside watching a film together. The week ends with a family fun afternoon; younger siblings and parents join the children to enjoy bouncy castles, face painting, hotdogs, cakes, including those made by the children during the week, and ice lollies outside in the playground and then come into the hall for singing and showing the parents some of the wonderful creations made during the week.



We all go home very tired but encouraged and uplifted by the spirit of teamwork between the Caversham Churches.

At the July meeting of the Reading and District Probus club, the speaker was Francis Brown, a member of the club, who gave a talk entitled 'Internet insecurity'.

The talk included many aspects of on-line crime, and how perpetrators go about accessing sensitive data.

Hundreds of millions of records containing private information have been stolen and then made public. Use the free service to see if you have been a victim (known as pwned). The stolen information MAY include the password used for the site(s) that have been compromised. Change the password for that site. If the password has been used elsewhere (a very bad idea) change the password for those sites too. See https://haveibeenpwned.com/

Francis's talk included many tips on how to keep computers and data safe when using the internet. Tips included:

Keep Windows version 7, 8, 10 up to date; do not share passwords between sites; use 2 Factor Authentication whenever possible; use strong passwords, at least eight characters, with a mixture of numbers, lower and upper case letters, and even other symbols (examples of useless passwords were listed); if you have to use a public PC, log out of everything before you get up and avoid free wi-fi with no password; to close a suspect Window use the close button (X)in top right corner, not any of the other buttons (Criminals do not play by our rules); if PC behaviour is
