

Caversham Heights Buses: route 22 services slashed!

Last month's issue featured a review of the Reading Buses consultation process on Caversham 'Pink' routes which has been in progress since October 2017. The process was brought to a close on Thursday 11th January at the Reading Council Traffic Management Sub Committee meeting which was attended by members of 'Concerned of Caversham' who have engaged constructively with the Borough and company to defend the 22 route and in particular the off peak service level.

Interested parties should refer to the conclusions and arguments put by the Borough and company on the website (http://www.reading-buses.co.uk/articles/caversham-timetable-changes/) as well as to the new 22 timetable which will start on 19th February. 'Concerned of Caversham' have engaged energetically with the public and bus users by carrying out their own observation surveys, disseminating leaflets to engage in the consultation, and working with elected representatives and the MP to promote a dialogue.



Passengers appreciate two buses an hour in the off peak to get top town, so once an hour is a cut too far! Reading buses are consulting but not listening.



A hour is too long to wait for the ride back to Caversham Heights! Other routes are getting a better buses service. Equality of treatment and nondiscrimination are vital for all Reading residents.

Whilst the majority of Caversham routes remain intact the route 22 is now to be linked with the 'Red network' on the south side of the river. The off-peak service on the 'Red' 22 is now reduced to one every hour (formerly two an hour) between 0900 and 1500 and the promised sustainable morning and evening peak has not been fully maintained either, with gaps of up to 65 minutes between buses for example after the 17:10 bus the next bus will arrive at 17:58 and the one after at 19:03. As Caversham Heights is without access to any amenities, it will make it harder for all residents who are required to travel in order to access doctors, shops, schools and work.

'Concerned of Caversham' put forward detailed arguments and evidence to maintain the route and frequency of the existing service. Both borough and bus company have proved intransigent to community needs and arguments for equality of treatment and non-discrimination across the borough. The campaign group has learned a

good deal in the process about the lack of clarity and transparency of evidence and data about operations and the group will continue to press the case for improved bus regulation and transparent processes. The local councillors Isobel Ballsdon in particular and Ed Hopper have assisted local residents in representing their views, however many are disappointed in the local MPs role in the matter.

Now the bus operator is telling its public to 'use it or lose it' but is not giving this mantra much of a chance when the thinner level of service is bound to be less attractive.

So, after 19th February 2018, the Caversham

Heights community will have less choice of public transport, at the same time as Caversham Centre loses yet another local bank later this summer and the nearest branch is in central Reading.

We encourage all readers and Caversham Heights readers especially to let *Caversham Bridge* know their views on these matters and to support any future local campaign to improve and reinstate bus services.

TALKING POINT

WORKING TOGETHER

Churches are busy communities. When you pass by the church buildings in Caversham they may not give that impression, but all of our churches are engaged energetically in serving the community. We believe that that's what God wants us to do, and it takes a large number of people to make it happen.

My reason for saying that is that we often draw attention to the name of the priest, pastor or minister of a church, and that might give the impression that that person does it all! However, that is not how our churches work. Every church needs teachers, worship leaders, musicians, singers, youth leaders, administrators, treasurers, caterers, welcomers, carers, cleaners, preachers and people to look after the buildings – and that's only the start of it! Churches are made up of lots of busy, dedicated people and we should thank God for each one of them.

In the Bible St Paul compared the church with a body. This wasn't Paul's bright idea. The philosopher Plato had previously written about the life of the city being like a body, and Paul probably took the idea from him. It's a powerful image when applied to the church because it makes it clear that every Christian is a member of the church community and has a crucial part to play. Paul says how stupid it would be if a foot complained that it didn't really belong to the body because it wasn't a hand! God doesn't want any of us to have inferiority complexes. But neither does he want us to have superiority complexes and he mocks the idea of an eye looking down at the hand and proudly asserting, "I don't need you." The fact is that we all desperately need one another.

We thank God for the gift of our priests, pastors and ministers. I believe that we have a superb group of leaders and they not only bring a great deal of experience to the churches in Caversham but also the benefit of many years of training. But without the prayers, the gifts and the enthusiastic support of all the members of the church they might as well go somewhere else. Church leaders are enablers, encouragers, teachers, and trainers - but we should never expect them to do everything.

It's good for all of us to look carefully at ourselves and reflect on the gift that we can contribute. Paul is absolutely clear that everyone has such a gift. They might be in full public view or hidden away. They might be noisy or quiet. They might be practical gifts or reflective ones. Whatever your gift may be, it has been given to you by God, and it is vital for the building up of the church.

I am excited to see the churches of Caversham engaging in the life of the community in so many different ways. The Bible tells us that Jesus came to this world because of God's love for everyone. Perhaps, at times, we give the impression that God only loves the church – but it's not true and never has been. God loves our whole community and welcomes everyone to himself and that amazing truth will only become clear to everyone as we all work together with ever increasing determination and effectiveness.

The Caversham Heights Society

On the 29th November 2017 a coach load of Society members went to London to see '42nd Street' at the Drury Lane Theatre. Because of traffic the chance of a leisurely lunch proved out of the question but most of us managed something to eat before the afternoon performance. '42nd Street' is the story of a dance group performing in Broadway, and elsewhere, in the early 1930s Great Depression. The story line was thin but the stage setting was cleverly done and the dancing and routines were breath-taking in their sheer energy. Whether or not folk were enthusiastic about musicals this was a show well worth seeing.

Then on 6th December we had our usual Christmas festivities - this year an organ recital, interspersed with Christmas carols and readings-followed by a most enjoyable feast of Christmas nibbles and a wassail cup. Those who attended seemed to appreciate the time and effort that was put into making this such an enjoyable occasion.

The first meeting of 2018 was held on 3rd January when Carl Feltham of the Reading branch of the RSPB gave us a most interesting and informative talk on red kites. Their history in Britain dates back to the Middle Ages, when they were noted as useful scavengers cleaning up the detritus left by humans rather like the vultures of Africa and India today. Their population gradually declined until by the end of the nineteenth century they had become virtually extinct in England and Scotland, except for 6 pairs, although some breeding pairs still survived in the mountains of mid-Wales. The reason for their decline was that they were perceived as vermin, along with herons, which killed too many fish, foxes and buzzards which killed too many pheasants. The result was that during Georgian and Victorian times farmers and gamekeepers were encouraged to shoot them. A penny was given for every head of a red kite that

was presented to church wardens who logged their demise.

In the early 1990s a decision was taken by various conservation bodies, including the RSPB, to try to reintroduce red kites into this country, starting with the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. The reasons why the Chilterns were chosen was because of the suitability of the undulating countryside with the mixture of different woodlands, arable farming as well as crop farming, all of which provide the ideal foods for both red kites and buzzards, which have also made a remarkable comeback. The first attempts at reintroducing kites was by using chicks that had been hatched in Spain and reared here. Unfortunately these attempts failed because once the birds were large enough they flew back to Spain! Further attempts were made using red kites from Sweden and some from mid-Wales. In 1992 there were just 4 pairs but by 2005 their numbers had increased to 250 pairs. By 2016 these had increased to about 600 pairs. The result is that the Chilterns have the highest concentration of red kites than anywhere else in the world. Reading, unbelievably, also has more red kites than any other town or city, especially on a Sunday when they descend on the town from surrounding counties! The reason is that too many homesteads are feeding then with the leftovers from Sunday lunches. Unfortunately there are downsides to this habit because the female red kite is larger than the male and it needs roughage and bones to help build up calcium and other minerals to feed the chick embryos.

If the shells are insufficiently strong then the chicks will die. The message is by all means feed these magnificent birds but leave carcasses and bones as well as meat. Carl's talk was illustrated with many beautiful photographs which added to a memorable evening.

Organ Recital at St Peter's



St Peter's Church, Caversham presents the fifth in a series of organ recitals at 3pm on Saturday 24th February featuring Jeremy Meager. Jeremy first became interested in learning to play the organ at the age of six and started lessons as a teenager in 1979 with Dr Stephen Darlington, the Master of Music at St Alban's Abbey where he was one of the Head Choristers. After leaving school Jeremy continued his studies with Dr Ronald Frost at the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester. Jeremy is an Associate of the Royal College of Organists and also a Licentiate of the Royal Schools of Music for which he was awarded a distinction. Until recently he was organist of All Saints' Parish Church, Leamington Spa, which houses a large four-manual pipe organ, an excellent robed choir, and has a cathedral-style music programme. Whilst there, Jeremy organised the bank holiday organ recitals and also accompanied the choir during their annual cathedral visits but has recently given up the position to concentrate more on being a solo recitalist and working with local choirs and orchestras. Jeremy has worked full time in the organ industry for

over 25 years now, and for the past 11 years has been managing director of Viscount Classical Organs Limited and has an intimate knowledge of the Regent Classic organ at St Peter's having been involved in its specification and installation in 2015.



HISTORY OF READING SOCIETY

The subject of the December talk was 'Georgian and Regency Reading'.

The speaker was Dr Margaret Simons who sits on the committee of the Berkshire Local History Association and is a tutor of local history for the Workers' Educational Association.

The Georgian and Regency era covered the consecutive reigns of the monarchs of the House of Hanover from the succession of King George I in 1714 to the death of King William IV in 1837.

Dr Simons quoted a passage from Daniel Defoe's 'Tour Through the Whole Island of Great Britain' where he described Reading in the 1720s as "A very large and

wealthy town, handsomly built, the inhabitants rich, and driving a very great trade".

The predominant sector of Reading's economy for much of the period was agriculture; at its close the new manufacturing

industries would be in the ascendancy. Reading was an important market for the sale of agricultural produce; the annual Michaelmas Cheese Fair in September was a major draw. Local author Mary Russell Mitford gave an account in her novel *Belford Regis* (her fictional name for Reading) of the regular throng of people and wagons descending on the town to sell their goods.

During the 18th century Acts of Parliament to

improve the nation's road network were passed that would greatly benefit Reading. The town's principal thoroughfare, the Bath Road, became a turnpike road in 1714, where a toll was charged to users for its upkeep. It was now possible for stagecoach passengers to travel to London and back in a day.

In 1785 the Simonds family established a brewery at Bridge Street, and in 1806, John Sutton opened a plant seed shop at Market Place. In 1822 Joseph Huntley opened a shop in London Street to sell biscuits to the many travellers arriving and departing by stagecoach in the street. These businesses would come to dominate Reading's economy in the 19th century and beyond.

The opening of the Kennet and Avon canal between Newbury and Reading in 1723 would cement the town's position as an important inland port; annually around 100,000 tons of waterborne goods were exported/imported through its many wharfs compared with 100 tons by road.

On the eve of the long reign of Queen Victoria in 1837 the population would increase from 8,000 to nearly 100,000 by 1900. The town's landscape was still dominated by the towers of the parish churches and many of its buildings were timber framed, this would change during the industrial revolution as factories and railways would dominate Reading's landscape.

The subject of the next talk will be the 'History of Abbey Baptist Church'. It will take place at Abbey Baptist Church, Abbey Square, Reading on Wednesday 21st February at 7.30pm. All are welcome, £2 to non-members.





Sweet Chestnuts

I have to admit that the nearest I came to eating chestnuts last Christmas was the stuffing in an oven-ready pheasant bought in the supermarket. Did the hot chestnut man with his brazier come to Broad Street last year? I must have missed him if he did.

Occasionally you come across sweet chestnut trees among old woodlands in this area, but usually they have been planted. This month's picture shows the veteran trees known as the Twelve Apostles, in Crowsley Park, which were pretty certainly planted for effect. The park is only a mile or two north of Emmer Green, and a good place for a walk.

The trees, also known as Spanish Chestnuts, are very distinctive, with leaves up to a foot long, very long yellow catkins in July, and then the nuts in prickly cases in November. And the bark is distinctive: old trees often have grooves in the bark, running spirally round their trunks.

In Kent especially, chestnuts were coppiced to produce hop-poles, and the poles could be split to make chestnut paling. Only once did I find myself in a Kentish chestnut coppice, and didn't at first realise what it was. I haven't seen the paling for some years, but the

pales were spaced out along wires, one band near the top and another near the bottom. A long length could be rolled up for ease of transport, and would be fastened to fence-posts, but the paling itself didn't touch the ground, enabling it to last longer. The modern equivalent must be that plastic sheeting with holes in it to reduce wind resistance, usually bright orange and non-biodegradable. I'll say no more, but have to admit that these old woodland industries must have been comparatively labour intensive, and it would have taken a long time to see a reward for your labours.

For a long time I imagined that sweet chestnuts must have been here since the end of the last Ice Age, but this is not the case. Like the non-related horse chestnuts, they were brought here by human intervention from the south. It used to be said that the Romans had brought the trees here, but it now seems that they probably imported the chestnuts as food, but didn't try to cultivate them here. The new 'Alien Plants' volume in the New Naturalist Series says that no pre-medieval pollen grains have been discovered in Great Britain.

When you gather chestnuts here, they're often very small and under-ripe – after all, they are believed to have come from the Balkan Peninsula and Asia Minor. In fact, their name seems to be Greek, coming from a place called Kastania in Thessaly in northern Greece. In Old English, the name was chasten-nut, which became shortened to chestnut. Nevertheless, I have read that in Kent, people used to believe that Kentish chestnuts had a better flavour than imported ones.

Our imported nuts come usually from Italy. In southern Europe they have been an important source of carbohydrate in people's diets from antiquity, and must have been particularly important before potatoes arrived. They could be ground into flour and made into pasta, presumably because the chestnut flour was cheaper than wheat flour. They were once poor people's food, though not any more.

He started by teaching part-time evening classes at Gloucester Technical College until he obtained a full-time post at Reading Technical College in 1966 where he remained until he retired. He was well liked by the students and he made full use of their willingness to please him by asking them to fetch him chips at lunchtime to go with the food Mary had supplied.

Derek's love of singing began as a child when he sang in the choir of his local church. He was persuaded by one of the secretaries of Reading College to give Reading Male Voice Choir a try. Since then he became a loyal member for over 27 years. He had expressed a wish to attend a rehearsal before Christmas but sadly that was not to be.

Derek started a snooker club to which choir members and their friends were invited to join. All showed a very competitive spirit and some wives were able to tell when their men got home whether they had won or

Although Derek and Mary had married in a Methodist Church in Gloucester they had not joined one in Caversham until a boy they were fostering started going to Boys Brigade at Gosbrook Road Church. He came home one evening and mentioned that the officers had asked whether the boys knew of any parent who would go to help out so along Derek went with William to the next meeting and was hooked. After moving to live in Caversham Heights and becoming a member of Caversham Heights Methodist Church Derek was asked if he would start a brigade in this church. He remained Captain for a number of years before handing over the reins to a younger officer but continued to play a role in the running of the brigade which eventually joined forces with the Gosbrook Road Brigade. In July 2003 Derek was presented with a long service award by the Southern District President of the Boys Brigade for 25 years' service to the 2nd Caversham Boys Brigade.

Boys Brigade was the start of his involvement in pantomimes in both churches. His first one was an adaptation of one which his daughter, Marguerite, had been involved and from then on he would either write or adapt others, take part or direct as well as painting scenery. He was a Sunday school teacher at Caversham Heights church for many years, also a member of the Church Council plus helping with the maintenance.

When an art group was set up at Gosbrook Road Methodist Church Derek joined and was able to give full flow to his talent as an artist. He has presented many of his paintings to family and friends as well as hanging them in any spare space he could find. It was a hobby that he was able to continue during his illness which was a great help in occupying his time.

Despite his involvement in many activities Mary and family remained his first consideration and love. Two of his proudest moments were walking daughter, Marguerite, down the aisle to her wedding nearly 35 years ago and then having the honour of doing the same for granddaughter, Hannah, nearly three years ago. He was very proud of both his granddaughters and their achievements and the arrival a Greatgranddaughter last December was another great joy.

His love was extended to wider family members and friends. His happiness was making other people happy and giving help in any way he could. He had a great rapport with children and would tease them unmercifully.

The tributes in the many cards and letters Mary and family have received are a lasting memorial of the way he lived his life.




