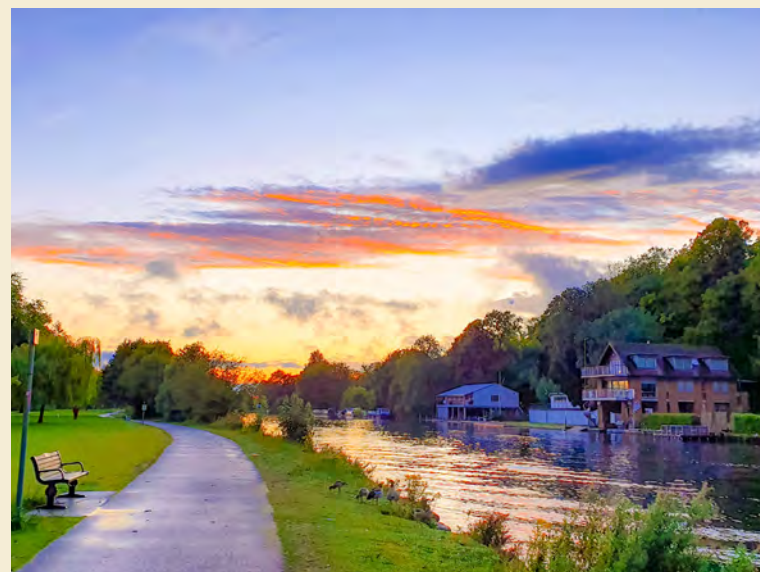

FOR MANY of us the past few months may have been very challenging. Some of us may have felt isolated and alone, others have been wearied by the pressures of work and children, all of us have had to adjust to a new way of life that for many has felt arid and joyless. For Christians, finding our churches closed and being unable to sing God's praises together has been a huge loss, a bit like being in exile. Even now, though some churches have reopened, the social distancing, masks, one-way systems and sanitising gel are reminders of the still-

present dangers of Covid-19, and of the closeness with one another that we have lost. It's tempting to wonder where God is in all of this – is he keeping his distance, too?

In our parish one of the questions we often ask one another, particularly at the start of team

meetings, is, "Where have you noticed God?" We are encouraged to reflect over the past few days, and to think of times when we have noticed God at work in our community, or in and through the lives of people we have met.

For me, one such occasion was a lady who knocked at my door with a potted rose bush in her hand. "I was praying," she said, "And God put you on my heart. I don't know why, but I thought you might like this." I didn't know why either, but we had a good chat and I received the rose bush with gratitude. A few days later, after an emotionally challenging day, I noticed the rose was in bloom. And God whispered, "I know. I care. That's why I sent you roses."

Perhaps not everyone would attribute their acts of kindness to a prompt from God, but I do believe that he is at work in and through the acts of loving kindness that are expressed every day in our community. I also believe that, when we seek God's heart and ask him to show us the world through his eyes and to put on our hearts the things, or the people, that are on his, then we will find our hearts melting. And when someone needs reminding that God knows and cares about them, and understands what they are going through, we might even be the ones through whom he speaks.

# Learn about Black History Month

BLACK History Month is an annual observance originating in the United States, where it is also known as African-American History Month.

It has received official recognition from governments in the United States and Canada, and more recently has been observed in Ireland, the Netherlands, and the United Kingdom. It began as a way of remembering important people and events in the history of the African diaspora.

It is celebrated in February in the United States and Canada, whereas in Ireland, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom, it is observed in October.

As a continuation of the Churches Together in Caversham (CTC) conversation, 'Captured by God's vision for a multicultural church', which was featured in the Caversham Bridge last month, Black History Month will be celebrated on the 19 October 2020, an occasion in which CTC members are encouraged to join in the conversation.

New Testament Church of God will host the zoom CTC conversation, and the guest speaker will be Dr Joel Edward, who was General Director of the Evangelical Alliance from 1997 until 2009.

Prior to taking on this role, he was working as a probation officer alongside service as a NTCG church pastor, and General Secretary of the African and Caribbean Evangelical Alliance.

He was the International Director for Micah Challenge, and a Commissioner of the Equality and Human Rights Commission. He has presented on BBC's Radio 4 Thought for the Day, a feature of the Today Programme.

'The Zoom Conversation on 'Captured by God's vision for a multicultural church' will be available from 18:30 on 19 October - **Zoom ID 97003464570, Passcode 014294.** The meeting starts at 19:00.'

It is my hope that we will all learn something valuable, and gain a better understanding of the vastness and cultural diversity which make up God's Church.

So I'm very grateful to Sam and Susie for their willingness to support us in this.

# IT'S ALL HAPPENING

## One way? No way!

THE ILL-FATED Westfield Road/Gosbrook Road one way traffic scheme was initiated at the end of August and caused significant traffic jams as motorists negotiated the changed priorities. By 2 September the signs, road marking and bollards had all been removed, and traffic had returned to normal. One problem which occurred was the disruption to bus routes, in particular the 800 diverting via the Upper Henley Road, leaving passengers heading for stops on Gosbrook Road a long way from their destination. The scheme was introduced as part of a Government initiative to encourage walking and cycling, but was unpopular with residents and drivers. Some ignored No Entry signs, causing more chaos.

## Development in Emmer Green

THE PROPOSED housing development on part of the Reading Golf Course land continues to make the news. Local MP Matt Rodda has had many responses to his survey on the subject, mostly expressing opposition. Campaign group Keep Emmer Green have maintained their efforts to encourage residents to object to the planning application for the site, with posters appearing on lamp posts and in windows.

The outline planning application for 260 houses and a Health Centre is under consideration by Reading Borough Council, and was open for consultation until 25 September. 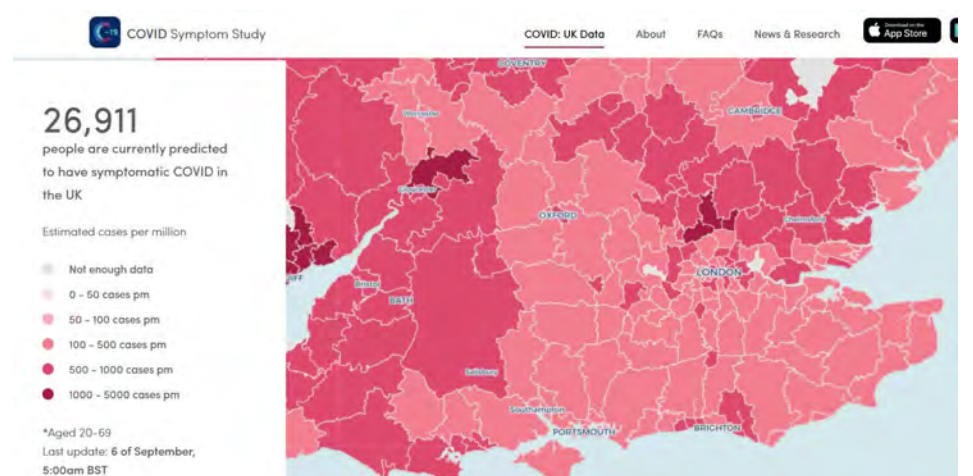

## Swim free

ONE consequence of the pandemic restrictions was the closure of swimming pools. Rivermead and The Lido have now reopened, although the restrictions in place to control infection mean they have a much reduced capacity and booking is essential.

Many keen swimmers have considered wild swimming in natural lakes and rivers. There are safety concerns with this. However, over the summer, Caversham Lakes Watersports opened up for open water swimming and stand-up paddle boarding on the lakes in Caversham, just off the Henley Road. The site offers plenty of parking, changing facilities, a café, and three well marked courses of between 400 and 1500 metres, as well as space for paddle boarding. It has become very popular over the summer, especially with families.

Swimmers are asked to wear a swim hat and either to wear a wet suit or have a tow float. Swimming without the confines of lanes and ropes, and the absence of any treatment chemicals, makes open water swimming quite a different experience.

## Time for your flu jab?

BALMORE Park Surgery have advised their flu vaccination programme will be different this year. They are expecting a high demand, but need to maintain a COVID-secure environment.

They will hold clinics for different groups at different times. This will take account of vaccine delivery and government guidance, as well as protecting their patients, and they advise patients over 65 to check their web site for availability.

Vaccine for patients aged 18 and over, but under 65, in an at-risk category will not be received until October, meaning their first clinic for this group cannot be until 17 October, with a second planned for 24 October.

Patients under 18 in the at-risk category will be scheduled in due course and as soon as possible. Patients aged 50-64 who are not in one of the at-risk categories are being included in this year's programme but will not be invited until November/December, depending on the vaccine supply.

The surgery will send all patients a letter with details of the booking system. It will not be possible to book before receiving the letter as it will be needed in order to have the vaccination. Appointments cannot be booked in person at the surgery.

ambitious – maybe too ambitious. The main events were held on the 'wrong' side of the river, near the Rivermead Leisure Centre. There was a main marquee, and a children's marquee. There was a beer tent run by the West Berkshire Brewery, who had brewed a Festival Ale for the occasion. Salter Brothers ran boats up and down the river, with live music on board. The Riverside Bar (now called River Spice) welcomed performers and festival goers, as did the Three Men in a Boat Bar, which was a part of the Holiday Inn (now the Crowne Plaza Hotel).

In Caversham itself there were events in St Martin's Precinct, at the Crown Inn on the bridge, and at the Clifton Arms in Gosbrook Road where there was dancing on the car park. Ceilidhs and barn dances were held in St Anne's Hall in Washington Road. It was a real community effort and, with around 50 sessions over three days, it must have taken a great deal of organising.

**'...strange costumes and sword fighting...'**

In previous festivals I remember the Morris Dancers, with a hobby horse, on the car park of the Clifton Arms, and there was a visit from the Mummers, who performed the traditional play in the bar. This involved strange costumes and mock sword fighting between St George, the Slasher, and Prince Saladin, and the antics of the 'Doctor' who brings them back to life. The 'regulars' didn't know what to make of it.

One Caversham pub which did not open its doors in 2001 was The Millers Arms in Paddock Road, which must have closed a year or two before. I remember the day we moved to Caversham in 1984. Being always short of money, we 'moved' ourselves. It was the hardest day's work I've ever done. It involved, among other things, moving a very heavy cast iron 'Cannon' gas cooker, a tank of tropical fish, and a few thousand books. Halfway through, at lunch time, we went to The Millers and ate bread and sausages, which we enjoyed in the sunshine in the garden by the river. The bar room was oak-panelled, and had an electric organ, and there was a skittle alley by the side. It was a sad loss when it went.

I mention it here because for at least one of these festivals, the pub featured large in the programme. The main events were held in a marquee in the garden, and I recall the seating was bales of straw. Happy days!

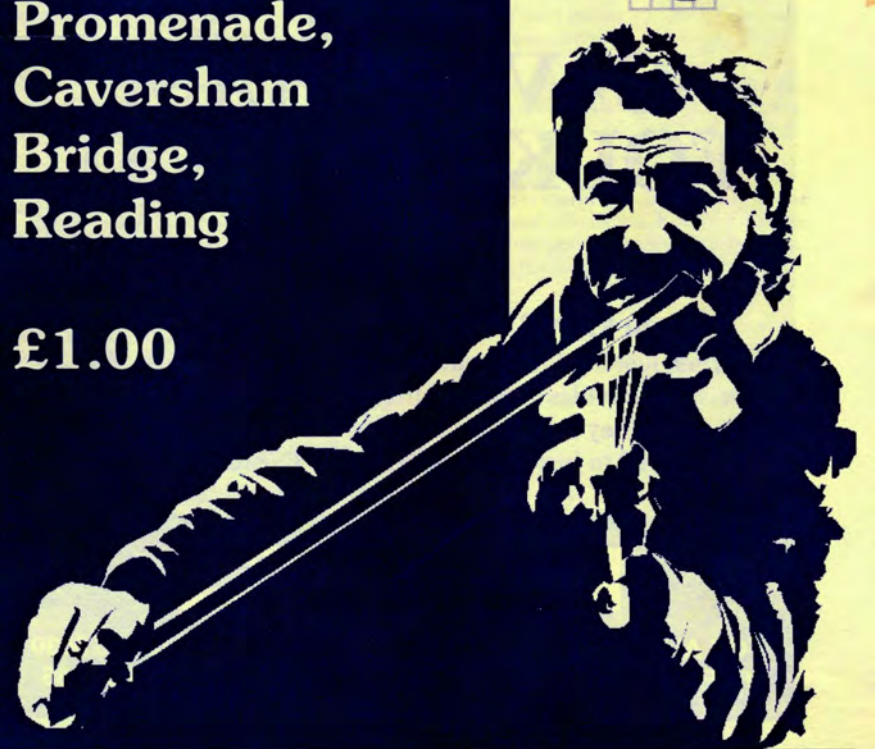

# All hands to the wheel

....bikes, bats, birds and bras - local traders battle to stay in business

OVER the last few months, many of us have turned to local shops and services to see us through the lockdown. We have told the stories of how some of these, like *Dudmans* the greengrocer, have adapted.

But for many small businesses, it has been a difficult time with no work coming in for months. Even essential service providers, like plumbers

and electricians, had almost no work in the early part of the year.

The Caversham Bridge is supporting small local businesses with this supplement, providing low cost advertisements to help them promote their services. We are also highlighting the work of local artists. Without the Caversham Arts Trail and similar events, it has been difficult for them to sell their works. Elestr Lee, who has written our Creative Caversham series of articles, provides more information in this supplement.

Some businesses have managed to adapt. For example, taking pilates classes online using Zoom, which is what Sue Hopcutt has done. For

some, the nature of their services meant they could not work at all. Sandy, the bra fitter, had only just launched her business when Covid-19 restrictions hit. Others, such as sports therapist Stevie Oldfield and lymphatic massage expert Nicola Kenworthy, are now trying to rebuild their businesses with new practices to protect their clients and themselves from the virus.

Not all shops were closed through the lockdown. Essential supplies were maintained by small local stores in our community as well as our local cycle shop, AW Cycles and hardware stores. Caversham Homecrafts in Church Street, one of our local hardware stores, will be closed for a week in October, between 11 and 18, to allow the owner, Neil Asbury, to carry out a major refurbishment.

For some, lockdown left them with no work. Ian Rayney was concerned about where future business would come from and thought he was too old to retrain in any new skills. He found himself researching bird nesting boxes, as he wanted to build one for a robin in his garden. He could not find what he wanted and hence Bird and Bat Art was born in his garage, making

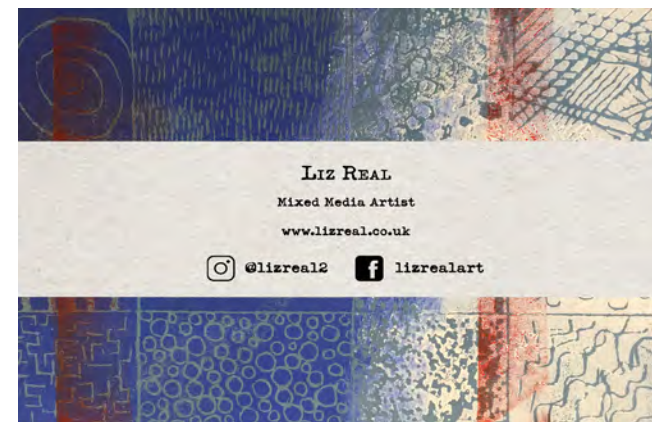

# Green Woodpecker bad news for ants - Yaffle has got his tongue out

BIRD LIFE on the lawn is nowhere near as varied as it used to be. There are pigeons, crows, blackbirds and robins aplenty, but it is ages since I saw a wren or a dunno.

So when I heard, then saw, my old friend the Yaffle I knew that for a while there would be a flash of colour and a cheerful chuckle to liven up the remains of the day.

Yaffle is the name many folk give to the green woodpecker because of its laughing cry. It is darkish green on the back, yellow-green below, and has a bright red cap. Males have a red moustache outlined in black. Females have moustaches, too, but theirs are all black. Unlike the greater and lesser spotted woodpeckers, it is rarely heard drumming when in a tree.

So what is a woodpecker doing on the lawn? The answer

is ants. Although it does eat other insects and even small reptiles, ants are its main diet. Ornithologists in Romania studied a pair of green woodpeckers who were bringing up 7 chicks. They estimated that, before the chicks left the nest, the parents had brought them nearly 1.5 million ants. For obvious reasons, Yaffles don't like heavy snow; one bird

was seen digging 85cm to reach an ant nest. The secret of the Yaffle's success in catching these huge numbers of ants is its extraordinary barbed tongue which can be up to 10cms long, and which it can stick out and wrap around to the back of its head.

Yaffles are easy to spot when they are in the air. They have an undulating flight with a short glide after

three or four wing beats. They dig holes in beech, willow, oak and aging fruit trees for their nests, and some holes are used for 10 or more years.

So, the ants may not agree, but I welcome back Yaffle.

## Plant Hedges for Wildlife and You

LOWLAND Britain was cleared of native woodland to create agricultural land. But much of the wildlife from the woods managed to live and travel within the hedgerows used to separate parcels of land. Surviving hedgerows still provide wildlife corridors through the countryside, and we can expect policies for reforestation Britain to pay for improved hedgerow management.

In towns, it is up to householders to make and maintain these corridors for wildlife. Can you help by planting or thickening up a hedge?

Gardens have boundaries that perform many different functions apart from defining ownership. They are often a wriggle-proof structure to keep toddlers and puppies in (or the neighbour's dog out). The standard wooden fence provides containment, but has a limited lifespan, creates barriers to wildlife and many have succumbed to high winds in recent years. Rather than replacing damaged fences with something similar, consider planting a hedge that will filter the winds and provide food and shelter for birds and other wildlife. This can be a beautifully clipped hedge of hornbeam, beech or yew providing a perfect backdrop to the border or a looser arrangement of different species giving nectar, fruit and seeds at different times of the year. A simple post and wire structure can define your boundary, whilst the hedge grows to final height, with wire netting if required.

Still prefer a boundary fence? That's fine, but could you grow a line of shrubs and evergreen climbers against it, and definitely provide a 13cm square hole at the base in a few places to let hedgehogs travel through your garden.

Autumn is the perfect time to start. Most native hedge plants are supplied as bare rooted plants between November and March. Prepare the ground before planting, digging it over and removing perennial weeds to make a trench 30-40 cm wide. The depth depends on the root growth on your plants. Preferably plant two staggered rows 15-20 cm apart and leave 30 cm between plants in the row. Stick them in at 45 degrees, going uphill if you are on a slope, so that the new vertical shoots give a nice thick hedge at the base. Water in well and mulch with leaf mould, old grass clippings (new stuff will rot quickly and heat up), chopped bark or biodegradable mulch matting. Cut the hedge hard in the first two years to get a nice thick base, and from then on trim it early in winter after the berries/nuts have been consumed until it reaches the height and thickness required. Then trim back to the desired shape each year.

DURING lockdown, particularly initially with fears of food shortages, it was very tempting to buy whatever was available during our limited visits to the supermarket. But now, with restrictions easing, it's more important than ever to support local initiatives and growers. Could you consider what locally grown foods you could include in your diet/shopping list?

Remember, locally grown produce is picked at the peak of its ripeness (rather than being harvested too early in order to be shipped and distributed to your local supermarket). Produce at 'peak ripeness' will be full of flavour and taste better than produce that has been imported and travelled thousands of miles. By purchasing locally grown food, you are helping to maintain green and/or open space in your community, and investing in the local economy.

## Plastic in the Thames

THE PROBLEM of plastic pollution in our seas and on our beaches was highlighted by Sir David Attenborough in the Blue Planet television series. But this is not a remote problem – it starts much closer to home. Even our own rivers are affected, and the Thames has some of the highest levels of plastic pollution in the world.

Research by scientists at Royal Holloway College and the London Zoological Society has found micro plastic pollution in the River Thames exceeds the levels found in other European rivers. As well as finding plastic fragments in the water they were also found in Thames crabs.

The particles are thought to come from the breakup of larger plastic items, such as packaging and bottles, which are washed into the river. Fibres from clothes in washing machine waste water also add to the load.

Professor Dave Morritt from Royal Holloway College warned, "The increased use of single-use plastic items, and the inappropriate disposal of such items, including masks and gloves, along with plastic-containing cleaning products, during the current Covid-19 pandemic, may well exacerbate this problem."

The researchers are calling for stricter regulations on the labelling and disposal of plastic products. They are calling for people to think about the plastic they use and throw away, highlighting how we can each help to make a difference through the choices we make every day.

What could I do, if dental treatment was unavailable? How long would it be before I could actually see my dentist?

In 1919 my father was nine years old. It was the time of the flu pandemic that killed so many. He was suffering with toothache and his mother called the doctor, who was so busy with flu patients that he was not able to attend until the next day. By the time the doctor did arrive, irreparable damage

had been done. An abscess had burst and severed the optic nerve. My father lost the sight of his eye permanently.

101 years later, I cannot imagine the pain he suffered. In those days there were no antibiotics and I don't know what treatment he would have received, if any. But it does make my own suffering pale into insignificance. Despite lockdown, I was able to contact my dentist, antibiotics were prescribed and the pain successfully eliminated.

How lucky we are to be living here and now.

This month we meet Charles Burns, a local artist with a worldwide audience.

## Life on the sharp edge

MOST artists build up a range of favoured 'tools of their trade' – but Emmer Green silhouettist, Charles Burns, lives by just one item – his surgical scissors. His latest pair has served him for 12 years so far - and he doesn't intend to hang up his scissors

just yet!

Charles studied Fine Art at Wolverhampton and, having moved to London, he managed to get a pitch at Jubilee Market, Covent Garden, where he produced ten minute pencil portraits. "The pitch fee was £50 per day, which doesn't sound much now, but this was the 80s! It was rare not to make this, especially in the summer holidays or coming up to Christmas. My pitch was where I earned my living, while my wife worked as a translator.

"I learned a lot. There is an art to selling stuff - you have to connect. At school I was very shy and introverted, so putting myself forward and engaging with people really taught me a lot.

"I started out as a portrait artist, but then I moved to doing silhouettes," Charles recalled. "As a street artist you are often approached by other artists who also want a pitch and I had to explain that Jubilee Market needed a range of skills, they would have to do something

different – why not try silhouettes? They would say, 'I can't do silhouettes!', so it occurred to me, can I?

"So I had to teach myself the skill, no one else was doing it. I had to adapt my drawing skills. I went to the National Portrait Gallery, which owns 30,000 examples

within the UK, but also travelling to the Channel Islands, Europe and the Middle East. I have even been asked to create my silhouettes at charitable events associated with the Royal Family – and created a silhouette of the Queen at her 80th birthday party!"

Silhouettes first became very popular in the late 18th century. They were named after Etienne de Silhouette, a French Finance Minister who imposed severe austerity on the French during 1759 – 'silhouette' became the byword for cutting costs. But the profile portraits, which were quick to do, cheap and fun, also required real mastery and 'secrets of the trade', which were jealously guarded. The advent of photography during the Victorian era drove silhouettists to purchase cameras

instead. There was a brief resurgence of interest in the skill following World War 1, when Hubert Leslie plied his trade.

Due to the pandemic, events and parties have abruptly ended. But Charles has discovered that he has no need to pack his scissors away. Through the wonders of Skype and Zoom, he is just as able to create the perfect silhouette – he created mine (top left) within minutes at the close of this Skype interview!

"The interesting thing is that I am returning to being a street artist again, through my online street art website. People can book a time slot, so in ten minutes I can do two people – for example, someone with two children could have their portraits done.

"It's like my days back at Covent Garden – people book a slot and, once I have cut the portrait, I mount it on card, then post the finished work to the client. So while in recent years I have been booked to attend events, now I am available to the general public, and I am also available world -wide. I am very enthusiastic about being online and have put a lot of work into creating my website. My new website is truly global!

"I am also keen to become a virtual artist from an environmental point of view. When I work from my studio my carbon footprint is reduced. I can do my silhouettes using my surgical scissors and simply post them off without travelling all around the UK or flying half-way across the world."

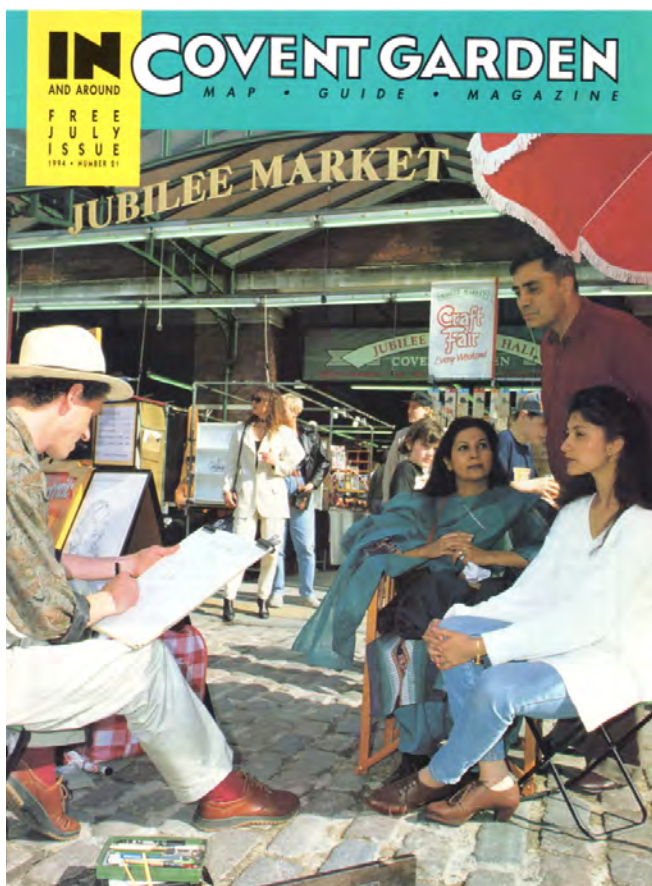

by Hubert Leslie, who had been working during the 1920s. Previously silhouettists had passed on their skills to their sons, or an apprentice. By the 1980s there was only one silhouettist left and he was very elderly – the tradition had virtually died. So I had to teach myself."

Charles started doing silhouettes at his pitch in Covent Garden; then he started being approached by events planners who wanted him to entertain guests at weddings, corporate events and parties.

"In 1997 I gave up my pitch at Covent Garden and started to make my living from these events – mostly

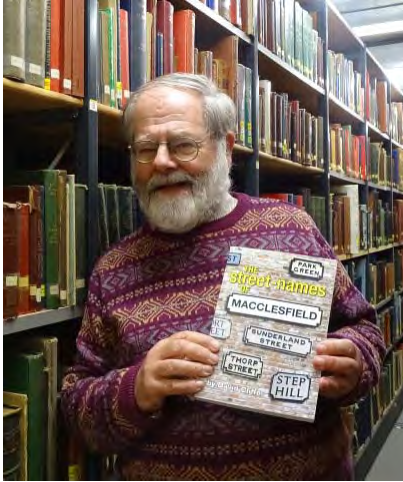


# Something New for Lockdown

## MakeAbility back on the case!

REMAP Berkshire is once again able to design and make free bespoke gadgets and equipment for anyone in Caversham with a disability or special need where nothing suitable is otherwise available commercially. Remap Berkshire is a branch of Remap, a national charity founded in 1964 to provide free, custom-made disability equipment.

Their service has now re-started after pausing during the lockdown. Remap's MakeAbility volunteer engineers are back at work, whilst adhering to strict Covid guidelines.

Amongst the projects they completed before lockdown were:

- A retractable wheelchair ramp to allow access from the pavement into a house
- A moveable rope gangplank-handrail for a stroke victim living on a narrowboat
- A retractable bracket for a wheelchair controller

- A standard bath seat adapted to fit a narrow bath
- Plus several of their ever-useful long-reach window openers and security-bottle-top openers

Remap make no charge for their services, and there are no tedious forms to fill in, thus minimising the load for users, referring professionals or charities.

One recently completed job by Remap Berkshire featured an ingenious moving recliner-style seat and supporting frame. This allows a young person with cerebral palsy to take a shower without his carers risking serious back injury lifting him in and out. Standard hoists were unsuitable for the bathroom. Remap Berkshire MakeAbility volunteer engineer, Andrew Roberts from Wokingham, designed and built the gadget. He adapted some ready-made components and created others from scratch, working closely with the client's family and occupational

therapist over many months.
