

## FADING LETTERS TELL A STORY

MANY OF YOU will have seen the faded advertising lettering on the walls of the Prospect Street building situated on the corner of Chester Street. I studied this advert in detail for the first time as I was wandering around the area recording local shops (for a future Caversham Bridge article). Initially I was puzzled as to why a business advertising bread would include hay and straw. My guess is that, as cereal grains were used both for flour and animal feed, it was logical to supply both in the 1890s, which was literally a horse-powered era. The faded paint and the lettering, now obscured by satellite dishes, meant I could not decipher the baker's name. A return visit to consult local trade directories at the Central Library provided the answer. I quickly found that Charles Turner (junior) owned this business. Incidentally, this was a useful reminder not to make assumptions. Directory entries place this business at 26/28 Prospect Street on the south side of the junction rather than the building pictured. Presumably the latter was chosen to advertise the business as its angled wall would be seen facing down Prospect Street and catch the eye of anyone heading up the hill.

Charles Turner followed his father in the family business around 1880. Initial directory entries list him simply as a baker. By the 1890s he had greatly expanded his business into catering, as the local directory advertisement (above) shows. Within this trade directory, another advertisement added the information that he also catered for steam

launch parties. This was a response to the late 19th century rise in Thames boating as a leisure activity. Local boat-building families, including Bonas, Cawsons and Freebody, plus Oxford's Salter Brothers, cashed in on this river craze by offering scheduled and chartered steam launch trips, for example works' outings, in addition to individual boat hire.

However, by the 1900s Charles Turner had scaled back his business. For the remainder of his working life, he is listed solely as a baker in local directories. His business was last listed in a 1913 directory. Censuses reveal that Charles Turner had several children, but it appears none of them continued this business after his retirement. Charles died in 1947. There is a monument to him and to his wife, Caroline, in the Caversham old cemetery in Hemdean Road.

# A day of mixed emotions

I WONDER what you do on Mothering Sunday? Is it a special day for you in some way? Does it involve cards, visits, presents? Is it a happy day? Or a difficult day? Or maybe sometimes, for some of us, a bit of both?

Mothering Sunday was traditionally the day when people visited their 'mother' church – possibly their parish church, or the church where they were baptised or, more often, their cathedral. In the past, it was also a day when those 'in service' were allowed a day off to visit their mothers, often the only day of the year for a family to get together. Today the focus is more on honouring mothers and thanking them for all they do or have done for us. But it can be a day of mixed emotions, can't it?

For some it's a time to give thanks, to give or receive presents and cards, and to rejoice in the goodness of God in the provision of our mothers and, for some, a time to give thanks for the gift of children.

For others, it's a time of excruciating pain. There will be some Christians who avoid church on Mothering Sunday, because the pain of loss, or childlessness, or distance, or estrangement is simply too much to bear. Some will have a duvet day, staying under the covers and waiting for the day, and the pain it brings, to pass.

The Bible is full of stories of women, some who experience the agony of childlessness, and some who experience both the joys and the pain of motherhood. Think of Moses' mother hiding him in the bullrushes to save him from death, and Mary, initially overwhelmed with joy at being chosen by God

to carry His son, then giving birth in a stable, and later having to flee as a refugee to a neighbouring country to avoid the genocide inflicted by a despot. Later she would watch Jesus' ministry unfold and marvel at his miracles, his healings and his wisdom. But as Simeon foretold when he held the baby Jesus in his arms, a sword would pierce her soul. Mary would see him crucified. Sometimes we find ourselves in these biblical narratives somewhere, sometimes rejoicing, sometimes weeping.

I have found that whatever is going on in life, whether I am rejoicing or weeping, I can bring both my joys and my sorrows to the God who knitted me together in my mother's womb, and who can be both father and mother to me. We tend to think of God as 'Our Father in Heaven' but there are lots of images in the Bible that show God in female terms – think of the woman searching for her lost coin, or of Jesus weeping over Jerusalem and saying how he longed to gather them, 'As a hen gathers her chicks under her wings'. In the Old Testament, there are images of God as a mother eagle stirring up her nest, then catching her offspring on her wings, and as a mother bear fiercely protecting her cubs. And verses like this one from Isaiah Chapter 49, verse 15:

'Can a mother forget the baby at her breast  
And have no compassion on the child she has borne?  
Though she may forget, I will never forget you.  
See I have engraved you on the palms of my hands.'

God's love for us is unconditional and unfailing. Whatever's happening in life, we can find refuge in the shelter of his wings.



## IT'S ONLY FAIR Fairtrade Fortnight 2023

FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT is a special time each year when tens of thousands of people commit to take action to deliver a fairer deal for the people who produce many of the goods we take for granted. These producers are too often exploited by our deeply unfair global trade system. This year it takes place between 27 February-12 March.

The Fairtrade Foundation has been organising this event for many years. This time the focus is on the threat climate change poses for the future of some of our most-loved food and the planet. Climate change is making crops like coffee, cocoa, and bananas harder and harder to grow. Combined with deeply unfair trade, communities growing these crops are being pushed to the brink.

But we can help them by making the small switch to Fairtrade. Choosing Fairtrade means extra income, power, and support for those communities.

Sadly, the pioneer of Fairtrade in the UK, Traidcraft, which was founded 40 years ago, ceased trading in January. However, one of the successes of the company has been the growth of other Fairtrade suppliers. So there are plenty of Fairtrade products available in local supermarkets like Waitrose and the Co-Op, at the World Shop on London Street, Reading, and through local fair-traders, who often have a stall at special events such as the Artists' and Makers' Fair, Beanpole Day, and at local churches.

A full list of special Fairtrade events in Reading has been compiled by the Reading International Support Centre (RISC), and is available as a leaflet from the World Shop. This includes details of sales at several of our local churches, including St Andrew's, St John's and Caversham Heights Methodist Church.

## Voting in the May local elections

DON'T LOSE your vote! There has been plenty of information published about the new requirement for voters to show photo identification (ID) when voting, but we thought this reminder would be worthwhile. The local elections on Thursday 4 May 2023 will be the first time photo ID is required.

The forms of ID you can use include passport, driving licence, a Blue Badge, bus pass or an identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme). This list is not exhaustive. For more information, see [www.electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID](http://www.electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID)

You can also call their helpline on 0800 328 0280.

If you don't have an accepted form of photo ID, or you are unsure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you will be able to apply for a free voter ID document. This is known as a Voter Authority Certificate, and you will be able to apply for it from late January onwards. To apply, see

KEEP CAVERSHAM TIDY (KCT) is a small charity dedicated to eliminating litter, improving public spaces, and promoting environmental awareness in Caversham and nearby areas. KCT started as a small group of friends during lockdown in 2020 and quickly expanded, collecting litter every weekend.

KCT's organised litter picks are every Saturday morning at 10:00 at a variety of locations, covering areas just south of the Thames to the northern edge of Caversham, depending on need.

### ...massive contributions...

Our recent work has seen the adoption of Coal Woodland (between Napier Road Tesco and the Thames) and View Island, to which we commit at least one session per month between these locations.

In 2022, Keep Caversham Tidy organised 38 litter picking

events, attracting 87 volunteers who contributed more than 1000 hours of time – the only thing that stops us getting out there is bad weather!

All ages are welcome, including Duke of Edinburgh Award participants. We'd be happy to take donations from individuals or small businesses to maintain our supplies of equipment. We're also keen to hear from other local litter picking and environmental action groups in the Reading, South Oxfordshire, and the wider southeast region, to think about bigger projects.


Welcome to 'Fourbears Reviews', where we briefly review a couple of titles chosen from our book shop 'Fourbears Books' in Caversham.

PREVIOUSLY WE reviewed *The Appeal* by Janice Hallett, which is a book we loved. *The Mysterious Case of the Alperton Angels* is Janice Hallett's latest book. In a slightly different format, the book is comprised mainly of transcripts of interviews, email exchanges and telephone conversations. Amanda is an author who wants to write a true crime book about a baby saved from

## Building our community


**Planning update from Caversham and District Residents Association (CADRA), bringing you a summary of planning and transport matters affecting the RG4 area**

OUR PLANNING Committee meeting in February considered the plans to demolish the Carters buildings on Caversham Road and build 60 homes with a mixture of houses and flats, of which 30% would be Affordable Housing. The plans (221324) were approved unanimously. Councillors raised concerns over cars exiting right across the busy Caversham Road and this is likely to be considered at the Transport Management Committee in due course. The plans for the Drews site (220922) which retain a part of the historic maltings building have still to be decided.

Members of the Planning Committee are to visit the site on Henley Road adjacent to the new Signature Care Home for retirement living. Further details have been coming through on the application (220189) and this may come to Committee in March or April. The revised plans for Caversham Park, which were shown at the public exhibition, are not yet on the Council website. A revised shop front design has been approved for previous House of Cards site.

To date, all applications for 5G masts north of the river have been refused. A new application on Caversham Park Road (230071), near an important veteran Oak Tree, has yet to be decided. And we await the decision for the appeal on St Peters Hill. A guidance note and a list of the local applications is on the CADRA website [www.cadra.org.uk](http://www.cadra.org.uk)

The Council plans improvements to the station subway and to revoke the ban on cycling. Cycling groups have long campaigned for this but there will be issues on how best to manage the mix of cyclists and pedestrians to avoid accidents. The consultation will have closed before this paper is published but CADRA has commented formally to express those concerns.

**W**ITH SPRING upon us, I thought I'd leave the history of Caversham on the shelf for this month, and choose a natural history subject. Here is a plant that crops up occasionally on the edges of woods and by hedgerows on chalky soils in our area, and it flowers about now. In fact, I took the photograph on the edge of Mapledurham Playing-Fields. It's not a showy plant, but handsome in its own way, and perhaps a little sinister.

### ...wouldn't use in cookery...

Though it looks a bit like Wood Spurge, which often grows near it, it isn't really a spurge, and it isn't really a laurel either. Its botanical name is *Daphne Laureola* and, in Greek mythology, Daphne was a beautiful water nymph, the daughter of a water god. She was pursued for her beauty by Apollo, the sun god, but she spurned his advances. Rather than be kissed by him, she had her father turn her into a tree. But that tree was not called Daphne – it was *Laurus Nobilis*, the Laurel or Bay Tree, which is native around the Mediterranean. This was the tree which was made into wreaths to sit upon the brows of heroes and poets – and which we now use to flavour our cooking.

The botanists gave the name Daphne to a very different group of plants, which you certainly wouldn't use in cookery, because they're poisonous. There are two native species, one of which is very rare, and hasn't been spotted in our area recently, as far as I know. This has small pink scented flowers, and its English name is Mezereon, which has come straight from the Latin, *Daphne Mezereum*. The

other species, Spurge Laurel, has glossy evergreen leaves like the Bay Tree, but is usually only about three feet high, and the flowers are small, yellowish-green, and scented.

It's a plant that should be approached with caution. Its juices have been used in folk medicine, and have been used officially in anti-cancer treatments, but the whole plant is dangerous. Handling it can cause dermatitis. The black berries which follow the flowers, if eaten, cause death from kidney failure. Even bringing the flowers indoors to enjoy their scent has its dangers: one of my books warns that, 'having it indoors when in bloom can fill the air with toxic vapours'.

Gardening books are ambivalent: some nurseries sell it as a garden plant, but some plant scientists believe that it alters the chemistry of the soil around it, preventing the growth of other nearby species.

### ...becoming infatuated...

Returning to the story of Daphne the water nymph, one of the most popular plays on the London stage in 1949 was 'Daphne Laureola', by James Bridie. It was described as 'a comic drama of youth and indiscretion', set in a London restaurant where a young Polish student becomes infatuated with the middle-aged Lady Pitts. He calls her his Daphne, and maybe fancies himself as her Apollo, to the annoyance of her much older husband, Sir Joseph Pitts. Edith Evans played Lady Pitts, and I wonder whether her would-be suitor, played by a young Peter Finch, managed to steal a kiss by the end of each evening.



IT WAS THE usual Tuesday morning in the Reading Soldiers', Sailors' and Airmen's Families Association (SSAFA) office, with phones ringing and caseworkers going in and out. Chandra, one of our Gurkha caseworkers, ushered out some very confused-looking Gurkha ladies. They were the first dependents of retired Gurkhas allowed into the country after Joanna Lumley's determined lobbying.

They were collecting food vouchers to help

through their first weeks in the UK. An ink pad was provided to register their thumb prints on a form. Chandra and I were both concerned about the integration of these new citizens, and their inevitable difficulties with the English language. Many were not literate in their own language.

We organised a first class for them, planning for ten students. 60 turned up! Each week the numbers increased, as the ladies loved meeting and soon started to pick up some vocabulary. We gradually built a team of over 30 volunteers, teaching over 100 ladies each week, with Joanna Lumley's support and encouragement throughout.

Everything was against them. Their complete lack of formal education, ages, hearing, sight, often general health, and lack of experience of interpreting symbols as sounds and words. But these are Gurkhas and giving up is not something they would consider! For eleven years, we all worked hard, watching them gain confidence to speak and understand quite a lot of English. They can all now write.

The volunteers learned from each other to find

It will be published in early 2023, with all proceeds divided equally between the Gurkha Welfare Trust and SSAFA. Copies will be on sale at the WADRA café in Mapledurham Pavilion.

Teaching is now restarting after Covid, so if you have a couple of hours free on Tuesday from 12:30 to 14:00, please join us in helping these wonderful women towards literacy and integration in their new homes. We meet at the Wycliffe Baptist Church, 233 King's Rd, Reading RG1 4LS.




Richard said, 'I believe *The Greek Ring* will provide a much-needed Mediterranean tonic for those who would like to experience something unique and different'.

# Changes in recycling

JANUARY WAS a busy month for government announcements on waste and recycling. The 2028 targets for reducing biodegradable waste going to landfill or incineration were set, together with targets for increased minimisation or recycling of different elements of household waste. From September this year, legislation will be introduced banning the sale and distribution of single use plastics, such as takeaway packaging and cutlery. Producer responsibility will be extended, so manufacturers and retailers will change packaging to make it compatible with widely available recycling schemes. Government will consult on disposable coffee cups and wet wipes soon. There are questions about loopholes in the proposed legislation, but it should generate some useful changes. You've probably seen adverts extolling 'new' systems, such as cardboard packaging for laundry products.

Although the September legislation will help reduce plastic litter and some non-recyclable plastics, it won't address the main issue. We need to reduce the number of single use products, not replace one-trip plastics with similar products made from paper, wood, bamboo or aluminium foil, which may have an environmental footprint which is as big, or even larger.

We can't go back to the Middle Ages and walk around with our bowl and spoon chained to our belts, but we can make some changes ourselves and support companies making a conscious effort to reduce waste. There were large sales of reusable coffee cups before the pandemic, with many coffee outlets offering a discount for their use. It all died during the first year of the pandemic, but most coffee vendors offer this service again. Dust off your reusable cup and support them, and keep your eyes peeled for changed packaging that allows more recycling, new deposit systems in stores, and innovative takeaway packaging options. And tell your friends when you find them.

# WORKING WITH NATURE *by Les Cooper*

MY BIRTHDAY is in September and my birth sign is Virgo, and we Virgo people are perfectionists. At least we like to think we are, although perhaps most others, who think horoscopes are poppycock, might not agree. The trouble with us perfectionists is we are rarely completely satisfied with our achievements. This becomes rather sad in the garden where, when we get something like a good crop of potatoes, we shake our heads saying, 'I should have done better than that'.

However, one thing I am proud of is the care I have taken of a number of bees over the years. Perhaps taking care of them is an overstatement but let me explain.

Several years ago, while on holiday in Northumberland, Eunice and I called in on a place selling honey. This was Chain Bridge Honey Farm at Teesside. In conversation with the owner, she suggested it would be nice for us to help nature by keeping bees ourselves in our garden. We shook our heads, because at one time a next-door neighbour had kept bees, so we knew it needed a great deal of dedication and attention.

But no, she was talking about Red Masonry bees. All we had to do to attract these harmless little creatures was to buy a bee house, fix it on a wall and the bees would arrive.

Although doubtful, the following Spring we bought a small tubular plastic house, filled with small wooden tubes, and attached it to our shed wall. Bingo, as the lady had forecast, bees arrived and soon went exploring into the tubes. Later we watched in fascination as they took up home and started flying out to the flowers on our crab apple tree and then buzzing back to one of the tubes. Eventually, after laying their eggs, they began blocking the entrances to the tubes with mud.

After only a few short weeks there was no more activity, and we were left with a bee house filled with mud-blocked tubes. When autumn came, we wrapped the tube in newspaper and stored it in our shed.

The next March the tube was unwrapped and fastened back on the shed wall. In April the next generation of bees crawled out to do their duty.

We now follow this routine each Spring.

There is something very heartening when you know for once you are working with the natural world and not just disturbing it.

## Plant of the Month – March

I REALLY LOVE the month of March, when small brave flowers begin to appear above ground. Crocuses never seem to mind whatever the month throws at them. Peeping through and remaining closed when covered in snow, or opening up to allow bees to collect pollen on sunny days. But there is one plant which, for me, epitomises the last days of winter and the oncoming spring, and that is the primrose. Flowering happily by walls and fences, under trees and by hedges, and beloved by all manner of insects, their pale yellow flowers light up barren areas of the garden where other perennials have yet to show growth. Plant just one common primrose, or *Primula Vulgaris*, and once happy it will seed around and grow into a larger clump, which can be divided up to make more plants.

Over the years, plant breeders have produced many different colours and variations, many of them offered at garden centres and named as polyanthus or primulas. At this time of year, I like to buy a few to plant up in pots placed by the front door. Winter planted pots are now looking tired or tatty, having withstood months of variable weather, and we have a couple of months to go before we can plant out our summer bedding. Polyanthus or primroses, dead-headed regularly, will add a bit of cheer to gardens bereft of colour and fill the gap until late spring. Once they have finished flowering, I like to cut them hard back and plant them out in the garden under shrubs. Sometimes they survive and I have had success with several double flowering varieties which return year after year with very little attention.

*...worth growing from seed...*

The world of the primrose is much larger than you may think, and you can have different types in flower from early spring right through to summer. There are some that start to flower in May and will thrive on the margins of ponds and in wet soil. These are called candelabra primroses. They have very tall stems and hybrids flower in a myriad of dolly mixture colours and, once happy, they will seed around. It's worth growing from seed or buying one or two and then dividing them regularly.

If you are looking for something really unusual, then *Primula vialii* or the orchid primrose will stop people in their tracks. They have tufty lilac flowers opening from lipstick red buds but, best of all, they will grow in moist soil and even tolerate a bit of shade. They will flower in early summer and are perfect for a bog garden.



# Creative Caversham

## The glittering gem on Prospect Street

*For life's special occasions, only something with a sparkle will do! We are extremely fortunate to have jeweller Chris Walton creating beautiful pieces for us.*

*Elestr Lee was privileged to meet him in his workshop*




IT'S HARD TO imagine walking along Prospect Street without seeing the familiar green awning and stylish shop window which marks the entrance to Waltons. Goldsmith and jeweller Chris Walton first opened his shop on 8 December 1986, having taken over the premises which had previously been a launderette.

Chris grew up at the Bird in Hand pub

in Sonning Common and went to Grove Road Primary School, then on to Chiltern Edge, where two of his best subjects were art and metalwork – "I've always been very creative", he remembered.

He had considered going on to art school, but a five-year apprenticeship came up at Jobins, a jeweller in Henley, so he chose that to combine both his talents. Within a year he was already working with

gold, platinum and various gemstones. Students at university and art colleges only get to work with silver and cubic zirconia, as the cost of more precious materials is too high. So Chris felt he had a far better experience and training, as learning to work with gold or platinum is totally different.

Having completed his five-year apprenticeship with Jobins, by the age of 26 Chris had the confidence to start up his own business. He looked at premises in various locations, then one in Caversham came up – an old launderette that had closed. He had to borrow what seemed a huge amount of money to take on the premises but, after a lot of work, he managed to open by December. It was fascinating to watch the video Chris has put together of the transformation of the derelict launderette into the premises which is now Waltons.

Chris was always determined that Waltons would be a distinctive type of jeweller – "The majority of jewellers around are 'off the shelf' stores with no bespoke service", he remarked. "However, as we have a workshop, we are able to manufacture handmade items customised as required". Customers can be directly involved in a commissioned piece and even choose their own stones. Chris and his team offer all aspects of the jewellery trade. Apart from the range of his own stunning designs, Waltons offers a full repair service, watches, engraving, restringing, and valuations, as well as buying old jewellery.

Chris has worked hard to nurture a loyal following from Caversham and the surrounding area, and includes many

TV celebrities among his clientele. "The majority of those who come into the shop are repeat customers", he said. "Once they know what we can do, they come back because we help to educate the public while serving them, which makes our job easier."

"My standards are very high, as I'm a bit of a perfectionist!"

Because of his knowledge and expertise, Chris often gives talks on the jewellery trade to local organisations and is frequently interviewed on radio. And, as well as creating video footage of his own shop's transformation in 1986, Chris takes a keen interest in the local area and its history and has produced a fascinating YouTube video of old photographs of Caversham with the same scenes today, called *Caversham 100 Years of History*.

### Mutual support

He is also passionate about helping his fellow traders prosper, despite the challenges which all small businesses have been facing in recent times. Chris is Chair of the Caversham Traders' Association, and during the lockdown, apart from carrying on making incredible pieces of jewellery in his workshop, he worked hard to ensure the association kept in touch with fellow traders through Zoom meetings, advising traders on government help schemes, for example. Due to this mutual support, Chris believes that Caversham appears to have been less affected by the pandemic than other local areas. The newly revamped Choose Caversham website is another initiative which he feels offers traders a chance to promote their businesses to a wider audience.

With his infectious enthusiasm for his craft and well-deserved pride in the exclusive and stunning pieces which he makes, Chris proves the point that nurturing an artistic streak can, with hard work, result in a thriving business model, as well as providing an inspiration for others. "My vision for Waltons has always been to be a traditional jeweller, with a modern twist", he told me.

## Local, dog-friendly Victorian pub run by one of the longest-serving licensees in the borough...

When I popped into the Clifton Arms I was welcomed by Lesley behind the bar. The atmosphere was warm and friendly, and the bar was full of lunchtime locals. It's an unpretentious traditional 'local' with a pool table, dart board, sports on screen and serving Brakspear ales. Lesley emphasised that the landlady, Seona, has made it a dog friendly pub – borne out by the presence of much loved 16 year old Cassie, a 'staffy' cross, who was curled up on her blanket by the bar. Seona MacKenzie is one of the longest serving licensees in the borough, having formerly run the Black Horse in Emmer Green from 1984, and the Clifton Arms from 1995.

Janina Maher's watercolour drawing of the Clifton Arms shows an attractive, homely

Victorian building with an upper storey hung with decorative tiles. The pub possibly dates from the 1860s to 70s when the Henley brewery, Brakspear, bought a number of houses and knocked them into one pub. One of the first landlords was Frederick Jenkyns who ran the Clifton Arms from 1876–9.

Today the pub occupies numbers 12-16 Gosbrook Road, but the numbering of the road has changed over the years. The origins of the pub's name are unknown, but it might refer to the famous Clifton suspension bridge in Bristol. The row of terraced houses following down the Gosbrook Road is called 'Clifton Terrace', but the houses on the other side are named 'Sussex Place' which is a little confusing – does anyone know the origins of these names?

# ONLINE INTERVIEWS

LAST MONTH I gave you my top tips for job interviews. Video interviews are on the increase, so here are some specific tips for these.

### Prepare Yourself

- Find out as much as you can on what to expect, e.g. who will be on the video call (unless it is a pre-recorded interview you submit, answering pre-set questions) and what platform the interview is on, e.g. Zoom, Teams, Skype, Facetime, Google Hangouts.
- Check you can use the technology on your laptop (preferable to a phone). It's worth setting up a practice meeting with a friend or family member to test your camera and speaker, and that you can share your screen in case you are asked to do a practical task.
- Conduct research on the company and industry by looking at their website and social media, and read all the information provided

about the job. Create a list of questions to ask and prepare answers to questions you think you could be asked. Ensure you have your achievements/examples at the ready!

- Prepare in advance what to wear. Advice is the same as for face-to-face interviews – you should make just as much effort for a video interview.

### Prepare the Room

- Do this a couple of days before the interview, not 5 minutes before!
- Choose a location that is quiet, with no distractions.
- Clear any clutter from the area you will be recording in, ensure all visible books are suitable etc.
- Face a window instead of a wall, turn off overhead lighting, and put a lamp on a table behind you.
- Check your location has a strong and stable internet connection.
- Turn off your mobile phone, and close down any applications on your laptop.

### Practice

- Search online e.g. Glassdoor for some common interview questions and practice – either with a friend or family member, or by recording yourself and watching it back.
- When watching yourself back, look out for any mannerisms you can change e.g. constant fidgeting, looking at the screen rather than the camera, talking too fast.
- You can split your screen, so you have the video call on one side and any prompts on the other. Don't read directly from your notes.

*Always send a thank you note to the interviewer/s after the interview, and ensure it is genuine, enthusiastic, and tailored to that interview.*

# Winter Nail Care

OUR HANDS need extra care at this time of the year, and our fingernails often suffer as a result of the weather. Here are my three tips for looking after your nails in the coming months.

Firstly, nail oil is your best friend. Apply it to the cuticle area and massage it firmly to aid absorption and to stimulate the nail from where it grows. Ideally, nail oils need to be applied three to four times a day. They reverse the brittleness of the nail coating by being absorbed into the nail plate to increase flexibility.

Secondly, a warm oil soak once a week works wonders! To do this at home, boil a kettle and pour hot water into a large bowl. Place a smaller bowl containing enough oil to cover your nails into the hot water and allow the oil to warm (I

like jojoba and avocado oil). Add one hand at a time and soak for five to ten minutes. Rub excess oil into your cuticles and hands when you finish. Be sure to test the temperature before putting your hand into the oil!

My third tip is to push back your proximal nail fold (skin at the base of the nail) gently yet firmly, with a wooden cuticle stick daily. You don't need to push it all the way back, just small amounts each day after oiling the area. Over a couple of weeks, the area should stay fully back. Keep gently nudging this skin back, rather than excessively cutting it, as cutting stimulates growth.

# The Role of the Lymphatic System

THE LYMPHATIC system is a part of our body's immune system and consists of a powerful network of tissues, tiny vessels and organs that work together to help keep the body clean and in optimum health.

Lymph refers to the fluid that flows through the vessels and carries potentially harmful substances such as bacteria, viruses and cancer cells to the lymph nodes and glands, where lymphocytes (white blood cells) attack and break them down. There are approximately 600 lymph nodes, located in the neck, armpits, groin, around the digestive system and between the lungs.

Waste-filled lymph can become stagnant, resulting in several signs and symptoms developing on our skin and around our bodies. When the lymphatic system is under-functioning, lymph nodes can become swollen and inflamed. Around one-third of the body's lymph nodes are in the neck, jaw and ear area. Stagnant lymph in this region can cause acne, clogged pores, eczema, and itchy, dry skin.

Other signs of an overworked lymphatic system can include swelling in the hands or feet, cellulite, breast swelling, puffy eyes, bloating, enlarged or painful glands, stubborn weight gain, headaches, sinus infections, brain fog, chronic fatigue and low mood.

Immunity-supporting foods like garlic, ginger, turmeric, leafy green vegetables, apple cider vinegar and seaweed can

be added to our meals. Loading our plate with red foods like red capsicum, tomatoes, beetroot, strawberries, cherries, cranberries and pomegranates also helps.

Keeping hydrated supports the flow of lymph through the vessels of the body. When we are dehydrated, the lymph fluid is thicker, making it harder to pass through the tiny vessels and sweep toxins to the lymph nodes. Reducing coffee, alcohol and sugar-filled soft drink consumption is recommended, as these can lead to dehydration.

Avoiding exposure to toxic chemicals is key. Unfortunately, chemicals are all around us in the environment. While it isn't possible to avoid them all, we do have control over what we clean with and what we put on and in our bodies.

Unlike the cardiovascular system with the heart as our natural pump, the lymphatic system has no pump of its own. This is where daily movement comes in!

### ...an easy ritual...

When we exercise, our muscles are contracting, which naturally stimulates the flow of lymph. Moving the body for 45 minutes four times a week is suggested. Yoga and trampolining are particularly good at getting our lymph moving and they're also fun – win-win! Dry body-brushing is an excellent way to help move lymph manually and support detoxification. It is an easy ritual to add in once or twice a week before a shower or bath.

Alternating between cold and hot water has been shown to support vascular health, improve blood flow and the function of the lymphatic system.

A simple ice rub on the face can help activate an immune response. Go gently with cold exposure, though! Brrrr!
