TALKING POINT

Lent or Given?

I'm writing this right at the beginning of Lent. You will be reading it much closer to Easter, but I want to think a bit about the two stories many churches start Lent with.

On the first Sunday of Lent, many churches listen to the story of the Garden of Eden, and the story of Jesus' temptation in the wilderness.

In the first story, God puts Adam and Eve into the beautiful garden he has created. He tells them they can enjoy the fruit of all the trees there – except for one tree. Of course, tempted by the serpent – the devil – they then do exactly what they were warned not to do.

In the second story, Jesus, about to start his ministry, goes into the desert, where he fasts for forty days. The devil then approaches him, and tempts him. Jesus resists, and sticks with what God wants.

Christians have long seen these stories as belonging together – the same story, but with different outcomes. Adam and Eve sin, they give in to temptation. Jesus, who has come from God to reconcile God and humanity and set us free from our sin, does not.

In Lent, we try to follow in Jesus' footsteps, and one way we do this is by copying a bit what he did in the desert: by giving something up, resisting the temptation to eat that chocolate, or drink that glass of wine, or whatever it is.

But I want to go back to the first story, the story of Adam and Eve, because there's a side to it I think is often missed.

What is the first thing God tells Adam and Eve?

'You may freely eat of every tree of the garden'.

We tend to think about what Adam and Eve did wrong. But the story starts with God giving them permission to enjoy everything else.

There's a Jewish saying that when we die God will hold us to account for every moment of legitimate pleasure we could have enjoyed, but didn't.

God doesn't want us to go without – he is generous, he gives us the whole of the world to enjoy, he wants us to grow and flourish here. Any rules are also a gift, there to help us to grow and flourish.

That's true about Lent too. Lent is a time given to us, to help us learn how to grow and flourish, to live as God wants us to.

So as we go through Lent, if we give things up, let's make sure it's so we can concentrate on the important things, learn to see God's world through new eyes – God's eyes.

And let's take things up too: being kinder, better people; getting to know God better; giving more and thinking about other people more.

Let Lent be a time to learn to flourish as God wants us to, and let us take that with us beyond Lent into the rest of our lives.

God is generous, he gives us this time. Let's use it.

Women's World Day of Prayer service

This year the service, prepared by the women of the Philippines, was held at Caversham Heights Methodist Church.

Peter Bernard was the organist, accompanied by Linda Blackburn on the guitar.

The theme was 'Am I Being Unfair to You' with the focus on the art work produced by 'Apol' a 32-year-old self-taught Philippine artist (shown right) together with the Parable of the Workers in the Vineyard from Matthew 20:1-16

The picture reflects fairness, balance and justice with two contrasting sides. The right is bright and colourful while the left is dark and dull to show the imbalance of life. Lush vegetation contrasts with the changing face of industry. Three women hold up a banana leaf with good food on the right and on the left only fish bones. The woman in the centre, with her right eye covered so she cannot see the destruction and poverty beside her, holds a pair of scales weighted towards the plentiful harvest. We reflect on both sides of the picture whilst holding to the truth that God is a fair and just God.

Throughout the service a verse was sung inviting people to join hands to form circles to share God's word together. Half the circle was built up on the platform, firstly by four women telling of the struggles they had endured to provide for their families. Then three women confessing their shortcomings and receiving assurance of pardon. The parable was read and then the Leader with two women who joined the circle led a silent reflection on the theme question linking the parable to the Philippine lifestyle. After this people exchanged ideas with their neighbours.

In the Philippines, among the rice farmers, neighbours are called to help with the planting and harvesting. No one is paid, but the harvest is shared among all. This sharing practice is called 'dagyaw'. Small bags of uncooked rice, representing the fruits of the harvest were distributed to everyone - an actualisation of compassion and care for each other

Music was an important part of the service and the songs reflected God's gift of beauty, joy and love in our world - his loving care, the life of Jesus and the Holy spirit at work in our world. We sang 'Let justice roll down like a river' a beautiful song written for the service by the Philipinos to illustrate their feelings and needs.

The service concluded with everyone holding hands to complete the circle with those on the platform and saying the Grace to each other. Altogether a very moving experience.

Fritillaries

In this part of the country, they were known as frits, wild tulips, snakes' heads, turkeys' eggs, and bloody warriors. Frits and wild tulips are self explanatory – although tulip flowers usually point upwards, and those of fritillaries hang down. Snakes' heads and turkeys' eggs stem from the chequered or mottled appearance of the flowers when looked at closely, and bloody warriors from the fact that the flowers en masse amongst the grass have been thought to look like blood shed on a battlefield. The name fritillary comes from the Latin name for the box in which you kept dice, which was traditionally decorated with a chequered pattern. The same name is given to kinds of butterfly with chequered wings.

You can still find fritillary fields round here, like the one in the photograph, at Stanford End. Many

years ago, I bought a second-hand copy of the book, *The Flora of Berkshire*, by George Claridge Druce. He mentions many parts of the county where wild fritillaries could be found – in 1897. It's a plant that can be found in parts of the Midlands and East Anglia, but is particularly at home in the valleys of the Thames and its tributaries. By the time Michael Crawley published his account of the Berkshire flora in 2005, it was found in many fewer localities. The damp meadows in which it grew had been drained, ploughed and re-seeded. However, it can still be found in large numbers in particular meadows, flowering usually in April.

Mr Druce did not mention the meadows where I took my picture in April last year, probably because it's right on the Berkshire-Hampshire border, and the changing meandering course of the River Loddon might have altered the boundary. However, in my copy of his book, someone has pencilled in that the plant was now very scarce at Burghfield Bridge, but at Stanford Bridge Meadows, near Stratfield Saye, it was very abundant. It still is.

I know that fritillary bulbs are fairly inexpensive to buy, and in my garden, which is not particularly damp, the plants flower reliably, year after year, but



there's nothing like seeing them in the wild, in their thousands. Last year, I was very happy to be at Stanford End at flowering time. But you can also go to Magdalen Meadows at Oxford to see them, and to Iffley Meadows, just downstream of Oxford.

The fritillary fields at Stanford End have been known for many years. Before the Second World War, a lady stood at the gate collecting the pennies, in exchange for which you could pick a bunch of flowers. Today, there's no picking. There's no right of way to the meadows, but the gate is left open at flowering time, and there are thousands upon thousands of flowers.

Whether fritillaries are actually native is a matter of debate. They enter the written record in the sixteenth century as garden flowers, but outside gardens, it's 1736. Had they been here from the end of the last Ice Age, you would expect them to have been mentioned before.

Whether native or not, it was a great pleasure for me to see and photograph them, a profusion of dusky purplish-pink blooms with the odd white one among them. Almost heaven on earth, in fact!

Reducing loneliness in our community

You may have seen news reports recently highlighting concerns surrounding loneliness and isolation. Recent national and international research demonstrates that they carry an equivalent risk to health as smoking up to 15 cigarettes a day. They have a destructive impact on quality of life and whilst loneliness can be felt by people of any age, it can often affect older people as risk factors can be more common. These include poor health, loss of mobility and bereavement. In addition, many families are now geographically distant from one another and social networks change more frequently.

At Engage Befriending we connect isolated, older people with their local community through visits from a volunteer befriender. We are passionate about combatting loneliness. Last year over 130 people used our service and 68 older people were regularly visited across Reading. We work with health and social care professionals, voluntary organisations and community groups to identify people who might benefit from a regular visitor. We can also help individuals who refer themselves. We only work in the Reading Borough and we use our local knowledge, partner with others and signpost to organisations, activities and services. We currently have over 60 volunteers who meet with others within their local community for a coffee and a chat once a week or fortnight. We might also take people out to a garden centre or the local shops. One lady said "I always get excited when my befriender arrives as it means I'm going to go somewhere nice".

The visits make a big difference to people like Mary, a retired nurse

who likes to reminisce. She is house bound and commented that "It's no life being stuck in this chair day after day". She said of the visits, "It lifts my whole day and carries on into the week".

There are lots of clubs and activities, but we understand that it can feel difficult going along for the first time. We can help introduce you to take the uncertainty out of the process. We can also provide information on getting there.

Residents and volunteers help to create local nature area

A group of residents and volunteers have worked together to create a community nature area in Caversham.

Local resident Nikki Drury approached Reading Borough Council's Neighbourhoods team and asked for the area to be cleared last year and the idea blossomed to put the piece of overgrown land to better use.

Since then the council has worked with residents and The Conservation Volunteers to create a haven for nature and wildlife, known locally as Dingley Dell.

Ms Drury told the council her children often enjoyed playing in a wooded overgrown area behind Peel Close and adjacent to the play area in Caleta Close. They had also spotted a variety of wildlife in the area, including a family of muntjac deer.

Neighbourhood officers thought it would be a great idea if the land could be adapted to create a recognised nature area to encourage more wildlife and to make it more accessible for local families to visit.

The land is owned by the Council's education department but cannot be developed due to the proximity of a brook so permission was given to go ahead with the plans.

The Neighbourhoods team contacted community volunteering charity The Conservation Volunteers and developed a joint project.

The council and a small team of

residents cleared litter from the land last Easter. In January this year, The Conservation Volunteers (TCV) worked with the Berkshire Biodiversity Action Team to clear rubbish and then the Reading Green Gym had about 26 people out to help dig, woodchip the path and carry out other improvements.

The Berkshire Biodiversity Action Team has since been back on several occasions to extend a dead hedge – a barrier constructed from foliage, cut branches etc – and finish the path.

The ambition is to install bird boxes, bat boxes, hedgehog homes and a bug hotel to encourage further wildlife. A fallen tree could be carved to create a seating area for picnics and some wild flowers could be planted.

The Conservation Volunteers are planning for the area to be used for a future Forest School, providing hands-on learning experiences in a natural environment.

Councillor Liz Terry, lead member of Neighbourhoods said: "It is wonderful to see how this project has taken off from a simple suggestion from an interested resident to involving so many people.

"This overgrown piece of land has been transformed thanks to the hard work of local residents and volunteers.

"It is a real haven for wildlife and I hope it will provide many hours of enjoyment and learning opportunities for local families in the future."

The Caversham Heights Society

The Society held two meetings during February. The speaker on February 1st was Carl Feltham, whose subject was *Birds of Berkshire 2*, which concentrated on farmlands and waterways. This was a follow up to a previous talk last season and was given at short notice because the scheduled speaker was unable to attend. Carl is an ardent member of the RSPB and he recommended the RSPB website www.reading-rspb.org.uk for information on the local RSPB group.

There are around 250 breeding bird species which can be seen in the Berkshire area. Farmland is a man-made habitat which is good for insect life, which forms much of the food chain for birds, and farmers want to encourage bird life. Set-aside is good for wild flowers, which in turn encourages insect life.

The bulk of Carl's talk consisted of showing a superb set of photographs of different birds, each photograph being accompanied by a recording of the bird's song. He gave us interesting background information on each one. Many of the birds migrate to and from Berkshire at different times of the year; for example the house martin returns year after year to Africa while the Arctic tern migrates between the Arctic and Antarctic each year and can often be seen in this area.

Many local species, such as the swallow, have experienced drops in numbers over the years, and the house sparrow is now an endangered species because their habitat has been gradually destroyed. Interestingly they never stray more than 250 yards from where they were born. The song thrush is also a "red-listed" bird, but its population is thought to have bottomed out. The crow is a very intelligent bird, able to solve problems and the linnets, a popular cage bird in the Mediterranean area, is also falling in numbers locally.

The real success story is the red kite, which, since its re-introduction some years ago, now has a higher concentration in the Chilterns than anywhere else in the world! Of other birds that Carl mentioned the corn bunting apparently has regional dialects, birds from even neighbouring areas sounding different from one another; the turtle dove is also a critically endangered species while the lapwing population is increasing. The raven, a scavenger, is also regularly seen in Berkshire.

Carl then showed many pictures of birds found near waterways, such as the heron, the kingfisher, which is very common, and many types of duck, swans, geese and others too numerous to mention. He closed his talk by showing a picture of a 'murmuration' of starlings filling the sky with patterns which can quickly change.

This was an absolutely fascinating talk, lavishly illustrated by superb pictures, which was of interest to both seasoned birdwatchers and newcomers to the subject.

On February 15th there was another talk arranged at short notice, this one given by Louise Vincent who told the story of the family firm of Vincents of Reading. Louise is the great granddaughter of William Vincent, the founder of the company. Long term residents of the town may well remember the distinctive Vincent's building opposite Reading station.

Louise's great grandfather, William Vincent, started work in 1866 in a workshop in Arborfield, making wooden horseboxes and coaches. He bought an interest in the company. He made several innovations which he showed at an inventor's exhibition, winning two silver medals from the dairy show.

William, and his son, also William, worked 12 hour days six days a week to build up the business, and by the early 1900s had moved into car manufacture. They built their first motor body at their workshops in Castle Street in Reading. In 1904 the older William took part in the London to Brighton car rally. By this time they were making cars, carriages, taxicabs as well as horseboxes. They supplied coachwork for a Rolls Royce and in 1912 they displayed a motorised horsebox. During World War 1 they were making carriages for the army.

They designed a horsebox suitable for travel in an aeroplane and, as well as making horseboxes they had a thriving business hiring out horseboxes with a driver and groom to take horses to races in the country. The premises in Station Square opened in 1928, selling and maintaining cars as well as providing a 24-hour petrol station.

During World War II they branched out into making parts for Spitfires. In 1946 they built a horsebox for King George VI, made of wood. The firm's engineers extended the wheelbase and fitted it out so that it could be lived in for a short time. They once tested the strength of a horsebox with two elephants. The largest horsebox could carry four horses and carriages, and had sleeping accommodation for the driver. All their horseboxes were constructed of wood and Vincents exhibited at the Motor Show until the 1950s. The company ceased trading in the 1970s after becoming part of a larger grouping and acting as agents for Austin and Rolls Royce, and later BMW.

The talk was well illustrated with pictures of many vehicles which had been made by Vincents throughout the period from the late 1800s to the time the firm closed in the 1970s.

The society meets fortnightly at Caversham Heights Methodist Church hall in Highmoor Road on Wednesday evenings beginning with coffee at 7.15pm. New members are always welcome. 
