

CADRA 50th Birthday

In the last few years we have seen two well known local institutions, the Caversham Bridge newspaper and Caversham Good Neighbours, celebrate 50 years since their formation. This year it is the turn of CADRA, the Caversham and District Residents Association. Helen Lambert, chairman of CADRA, outlines some of the events which will take place to commemorate this anniversary.

I care about where I live

Civic Day on 17th June 2017 is a national celebration of civic pride. It is a day, each year, to say "I care about where I live". See www.civicvoice.org.uk for more information.

This year, Civic Day will act as a focus to celebrate 50 years of conservation areas. These were first created in 1967, as a result of widespread public concern over the pace of redevelopment in historic towns and cities. Today there are over 10,000 conservation areas in the UK. Civic Voice is asking communities across the country to come together to say "My conservation area matters" so that this can be a year of celebrations highlighting the measures designed to protect areas recognised for their special character or history.

Reading has 15 conservation areas including two north of the river – St Peter's and Surley Row. The newly created community body, the Conservation Area Advisory Committee, which includes several members from Caversham, is working with the Borough Council for conservation areas across Reading.

1967 was also the year that the Caversham and District Residents Association was founded, so 2017 is a year of golden anniversaries. CADRA's declared aim is to 'preserve and enhance the quality of life in Caversham and the surrounding district' or in other words that Caversham should always be 'a great place to live'. So, in 2017 CADRA will try and shine a light on what it is that makes Caversham special and what we all care about.

On 20 June, following a brief formal AGM, local architectural historian, Dr Megan Aldrich FSA will present a personal view on 'a history of architecture in Caversham'. From its early medieval origins through to the rapid development of the late 19th century, we are fortunate to have many interesting historic buildings and features as well as the vistas and perspectives created by the Victorian and Edwardian architects.

Megan has worked as a director of Sotheby's, with museums at home and abroad and is an elected Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of London, one of the British government's official designated bodies for providing advice regarding heritage and planning policy. She will have just returned from a two-day conference at the University of Liverpool in May on the gothic revival architect and writer, Thomas Rickman, for which she is co-organiser.

The meeting takes place on Tuesday 20 June 2017 at 7.30pm at Thameside School hall, Harley Road. Everyone is welcome.

Later in the year, we will be looking at the importance of trees in the urban landscape. Our predecessors bequeathed us a wealth of trees which still shape our environment and local views. CADRA is finalising plans for the planting of a new tree as we consider the environment which we will pass on to future generations.

Dr John Evans, a Caversham resident and crop scientist with an interest in trees is developing a presentation on 'Trees in Caversham'. This will take place on Tuesday 17 October at 7.30pm at Thameside School hall, Harley Road. We hope that you will also join us then to celebrate 50 years of work for the place we live and to toast the future of Caversham and the association.

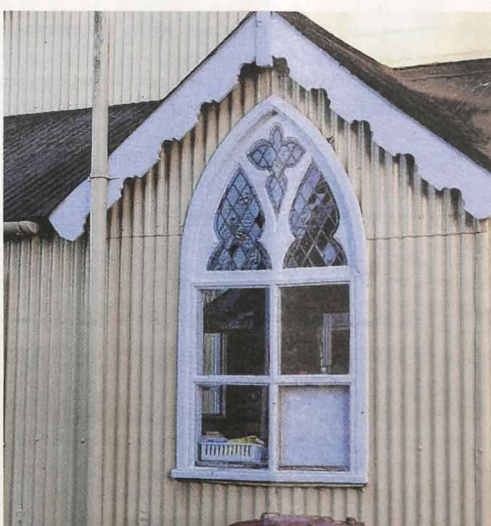

TALKING POINT

Handling Power

There does appear to be a deficit of real statesmen and women in the world at the moment.

There are a number of leaders whose immaturity and insecurity might have been amusing were they not in positions of enormous power.

It is the potential and actual abuse of power that makes these very unsuitable people highly dangerous.

If you want examples (and unfortunately this list is most certainly not exhaustive) how about the current leaders of North Korea, the Philippines, Turkey, Hungary, Russia, Zimbabwe, Syria, Venezuela, and the one we hear about every day, the United States of America?

Leaders who want to silence alternative views; who blatantly falsify what is actually happening; who want to collect more and more powers to themselves; who are prepared to use all means to keep themselves in power; who do not appear to genuinely care about the needs of their people, despite their protestations that they do; who appear to despise the human rights of their own subjects, as well as those of others; who appear to lack any vision or compassion relating to the needs beyond their own borders.

While some areas of international life are advancing, a host of prominent leaders seem to be dragging us backwards.

It is easy, of course, to point the finger at obvious failings in others without ever holding up the mirror to our own lives.

None of us is in a position of power anything like these national leaders.

But, although it is much more limited, we all have some measure of power and influence – even if it is only in our own families.

It is worth reflecting on where we do have power and influence and how we are handling it.

It is also worth reflecting on how very differently Jesus chose to use the powers he possessed. A highly perceptive person, with considerable self control and great depths of wisdom, Jesus displayed courage and compassion which continue to act as a challenge and encouragement to us all. Unlike many current world leaders, Jesus raised the standard of human possibility.

If we feel seriously disturbed by how some people are handling power, how much can we use our influence for good (not just our own good, but the good of others)?

Other music to be sung will be the Tippett Negro Spirituals from *A Child of our time* and the *Missa Brevis* by contemporary composer Jonathan Dove.


The choir will be accompanied by organist Philip Aspden who will also play some solos on the recently installed Viscount organ at St Peter's Church.

Are the large trees at the start Conisboro Avenue the Deodars? Also the tree at the junction of Conisboro Ave and Kelvedon Way?

Reply From Happy Wanderer

Dear Janet

Many thanks for your letter – it's always good to know that my articles are being read!

Yesterday, I ventured up to 'The Heights' on the No. 22 bus, to look at the trees you mention in Conisboro Avenue. They are rather magnificent, but they're some kind of pines, and not Indian Cedars, which are also known as Deodars.

Cedars and pines are closely related, and the various species can be difficult to tell apart. You really need a good book, and to be able to get near to the trees themselves, to look at bark, needles, flowers and cones – but the shape can be distinctive as well.

The Indian Cedar tends to have a single straight trunk, and to be conical in shape. It is usually pointed at the top, and the ends of the twigs droop slightly. It's very different from the Cedar of Lebanon, where the trunk often divides low down, and the branches are horizontal at the ends.

On my way back home, I took this picture of an Indian Cedar which is in the garden of a house in Albert Road, and which shows the typical shape pretty well.

Incidentally, when thinking of Deodars yesterday, the old song, "Under the Deodar" kept coming into my head. I remembered it from when I was a child. Only later, when I had invested five shillings in "The Observer's Book of Trees and Shrubs," did I realise what a Deodar was!

Fair trade fortnight at St Andrew's

At St Andrew's, our team of young fair traders run a stall after the service on the first Sunday of every month, and are spreading the word that when you buy Traidcraft products you are not just buying fair trade goods, but also helping with campaigning and development projects. In addition to their usual Traidcraft products, in Fair Trade Fortnight they held a cake sale, and St Andrew's community café, the Fisherman, donated its proceeds to Traidcraft.

Caversham Church Fete

A date for your diary. The annual church fete, organised by the three churches of the parish of Caversham Thameside and Mapledurham, St Peter, St John and St Margaret, will be held this year on the afternoon of Saturday July 8th in Caversham Court Gardens. Solar Panels at St Andrew's

In early 2016 St Andrew's Church in Caversham installed solar panels on the roof of its community hall. The 1960s hall, built to celebrate the 50th anniversary of St Andrew's, has an extensive south facing roof, which is ideal for a large array

that generates up to 10kW of electricity on sunny days.

Since their installation the panels have generated over £1400 in revenues. PCC member Gordon Ball commented, "As the hall is used during most days by the pre-school, as well as many community groups, this should help bring down our electricity bill, as well as being good for the environment, and an advertisement for others to consider doing the same."

The funding was met through a generous legacy from a former parishioner, and Reading Borough Council was instrumental in helping make this a reality, with Summreen Sheikh (sustainability partnerships officer) providing advice on the process and helping search out the best solar firm to fit within a short time frame.

As solar panels become as ubiquitous as television aerials and chimney pots, they may gain more acceptance as a standard feature on buildings old and new.

Walking for Our Lady

On the 1st May, as part of the ongoing campaign to raise funds for the enhancement of the Shrine of Our Lady of Caversham, Father Paul, Parish Priest of Our Lady and St Anne's Church, will embark on a sponsored walk of 186 miles. He will walk from the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham for the following 11 days. His route will include Peterborough, to visit the Cathedral where Queen Catherine of Aragon is buried. She was a regular visitor and benefactor to the original Shrine at Caversham. He will also call at Windsor to visit the tomb of King Henry VIII in St George's Chapel. It was Henry VIII who ordered the destruction of the original Shrine of Our Lady of Caversham.

The first day will be a stroll of seven miles to Fakenham but the next day will be a hard 22 miles to Kings Lynn. The journey will continue with each day's walk varying from 13 miles to 25 miles (on the most gruelling day from Aylesbury to Maidenhead) until he finally reaches Caversham, after a 14-mile stint from Maidenhead, on the 11th May.

Work begins on new housing scheme

Reading borough council's and A2Dominion's new housing scheme for older people in Caversham is taking shape. Work is progressing on the homes which will offer older people a combination of as much independence as possible but with care and support on site as needed.

Named Beechwood Grove, the accommodation is being constructed on the site of the former Arthur Clark Residential Home and Albert Road Day Care Centre in Caversham. Demolition work began in February and piling work was completed in April.

Beechwood Grove is expected to open in autumn 2018. When complete, it will provide 43 flats for older people with an onsite care provider. As the population ages, homes like this will meet the need of a mix of residents. 16 apartments will be rented and the rest will be leased.

In addition, communal facilities and activities will benefit older people in the local area as well as residents. This will include specialist day activities as well as a café and a range of community activities with the plan to include music workshops, arts & crafts, wellbeing activities, exercise classes, dementia activities, gardening club, computing and internet training. There will also be a hair

salon and therapy treatment which will be available to book by local people.

The lead member for adult social care, Cllr Rachel Eden said: "Beechwood Grove will offer people the best of both worlds – living in the local community, with help and support on site and at the touch of a button, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The way we grow older is changing. People want to continue to live independently for as long as possible. Beechwood Grove will offer purpose-built individual homes for older people who want to continue to live fulfilling and active lives but with increased support and care on hand when they need it."

The lead member for housing, Cllr Richard Davies said:

"As a council we were determined to ensure that activities on offer here would be made available for all elderly people living in the local community in Caversham, not just residents of Beechwood Grove. I am delighted to say that will be the case and I'm sure a lively social circle will quickly develop when the doors open. I am also pleased that the Council has negotiated 16 of the 43 homes for social rent. There is a desperate shortage of properly affordable rental homes in Reading."

Priory Avenue Surgery in Special Measures

Following an inspection in January by the Care Quality Commission, Priory Avenue Surgery has been placed in Special Measures. The following statement was issued by the surgery:

We can confirm that the Care Quality Commission has placed Priory Avenue Surgery in special measures. We wanted to reassure you, our patients, we are working to resolve the issues highlighted in the report. We welcome the report highlighting how patients, who were spoken with on the day, felt the practice offered an excellent service and the staff were caring and dealt with them with dignity and respect.

Over the past two months we have put an action plan in place to address the findings of the CQC inspection and we have been working closely with our Patient Participation Group (PPG) who have been very supportive throughout this process. We recognise that some systems and processes at the surgery were in need of review. We will continue to improve the systems and processes at the practice to

the highest levels and staff are already undergoing additional training.

As part of our Action Plan we are recruiting more staff and we are delighted that our new Lead Nurse joined the team at the beginning of April. She will provide additional support for our nursing and clinical team. In May we have an additional pharmacist joining our team.

North West Reading Clinical Commissioning Group are working closely with the practice to support us with implementing our Action Plan.

Reorganisation of New Directions Adult Learning Service

Reading borough council's adult learning and employment service is expanding and refurbishing its base in south Reading.

New Directions is undergoing a reorganisation which will see a £260,000 investment in its Northumberland Avenue building and the relocation of its services from the Caversham centre in Archway Road.

Students will benefit from an upgraded building in Whitley and courses currently offered in Caversham will be moved to the council's multi-purpose sites in Emmer Green and Tilehurst.

The South Reading centre, at Thamesbridge House, opposite Academy Sport, provides a range of learning and employment services such as English, cookery, fashion and dressmaking, maths, ESOL, arts and crafts, pottery, health and lifestyle, languages and vocational courses.

The service also works with a number of partner organisations such as the Workers Education Association and Autism Berkshire to ensure they reach a range of people in Reading and provide a varied programme.

Members of the council's policy committee agreed the improvement works at the south Reading centre at a meeting in March. The building currently provides mixed classroom and office space for New Directions and Children's Services teams and the improvements will include a café/drop-in area for staff and students, new office space, replaced flooring and a specialist pottery/art space which has re-located from Caversham.

The committee also agreed the closure of the Caversham Centre, in July 2017, and its disposal as part of the council's ongoing rationalisation of buildings in response to cuts in central government funding.

The improvement work at Thamesbridge House should be completed in time for the start of the new term in September.

Councillor Tony Jones, lead councillor for education, said: "New Directions offers excellent adult learning courses and I am pleased the council is able to invest in its centre in south Reading where provision is in high demand."

"Cuts in the council's funding from central government means we are looking at ways of making the best possible use of our buildings and disposing of properties which become surplus to requirement."

"New Directions will continue to deliver courses in Caversham utilising other venues in line with its strategy to ensure everyone has access to its services across the borough."

In March, Reading East MP Rob Wilson welcomed job seekers and employers to Reading's first Disability Confident: Access to Work Job Fair. The event was aimed at helping jobseekers with disabilities into work and enabling employers to explore the benefits of hiring people with disabilities and supporting them into employment. 'Disability Confident' is a government campaign which aims to make employers aware of the business benefits of employing disabled people.

Rob Wilson said, "I am delighted that this event has been such a success with many job seekers and businesses commenting on how enjoyable and productive it was. We have received incredibly positive feedback from job seekers and employers alike. I intend to host another event next year. I hope this can become an annual event."

Businesses such as IKEA, Network Rail, Thames Water and Thames Valley Police met jobseekers with disabilities to discuss employment opportunities. The variety of businesses was noted by one job seeker who said that "there were lots of interesting people in interesting places".

Francis Tipton of Thames Water said: "We were delighted to take part in the Job Fair, which enabled us to meet some truly inspirational candidates with valuable skills. It was a good opportunity to engage with similar minded companies and to promote our three-week work experience programme. If you're interested in

Job seekers were also able to speak with supportive and educational organisations to discuss training and support opportunities. Apprenticeships and educational opportunities were offered by a number of organisations, with one attendee noting that the "exhibitor's stalls for apprenticeships/training courses were particularly good."

Andy Granata of Mencap said: "The event proved fruitful for participants and fair goers - the environment meant it was easy to speak one-to-one about the huge amount of support that's available now. Businesses are actively engaging with people to ensure they are not only employing fairly, but changing their processes to allow people with disabilities a way into their businesses that doesn't put up barriers and hurdles. This is by far the biggest challenge for someone with a disability, "Employers also attended a series of talks which provided first-hand accounts of how disabled job seekers are supported into employment and how the organisation has benefitted as a result."

A job seeker on the day commented that "The Access to Work Job Fair was very supportive, the people at the stalls took time to actually speak to you, interested in what I had to say."

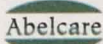

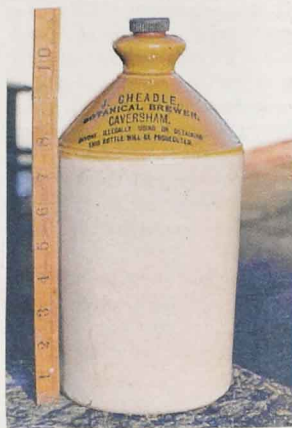

ENVIRONMENT

Cheadle's Minerals, Caversham



I'm often surprised at the number of different things that used to be made in Caversham – potato crisps, sports cars and bricks among them. A few weeks back, I was asked about a firm called Cheadle's who made mineral waters in Caversham, and if I knew where they operated from. Well, I couldn't help, and I was wondering if any *Caversham Bridge* readers might know.

The name 'Cheadle' doesn't really belong in this part of the country. In the past, I have visited two places called Cheadle: one is by the Mersey near Stockport, which has an interesting old church, and the other is the small town in Staffordshire with a splendid church designed by Augustus Pugin. So I was intrigued by the flagon in the picture, marked *J. Cheadle, botanical brewer, Caversham*. The lettering continues with this warning: 'Anyone illegally using or detaining this bottle will be prosecuted'.

Perhaps strangely, there is no Caversham address given. Did Mr C. expect his flagons to be returned to his premises in Caversham? Or maybe he delivered them to customers from door to door, and collected the empties at the same time. When the business was sold in 1918, motor lorries were included. I can remember a firm which did this in the 1950s. They used flagons looking exactly like this one.

Though the whereabouts of the Caversham premises have so far evaded me, I have been able to find out something about John Henry Cheadle. He was born in Shropshire in 1862, he joined the Shropshire Militia, and in 1883 he joined the regular army – the Oxford Light Infantry. This could indicate a connection with Caversham, which was in Oxfordshire until 1911. He left the army in 1895, and in 1900, when he married, he was a coffee house keeper in Chertsey, but his wife had been born in Winkfield. They had two daughters, Dorothy and Winifred.

In 1908, John took over the mineral water business of Sidney Weaver, at 12A Eldon Place, Reading, and was joined in the business by his nephew, Alfred. John lived at 19 Princes Street, and Alfred at 24 Eldon Street, both close to the works, and to the Royal Berkshire Hospital.

The business closed in 1918, when the local paper advertised that 'Frank Cooksey and Walker have been instructed by J. H. Cheadle to sell the valuable machinery and plant, motor lorries, 5,000 botanical jars, 1,000 dozen bottles, and numerous effects'.

The only Caversham connection I have found so far is a report of the Sunday school prize-giving at Caversham Free Baptist Church in 1908, when Dorothy Cheadle, John's daughter, was one of the winners. This strongly suggests that the family lived in Caversham at the time, but a search of the street directories has failed to locate their house or business premises.

Does the fact that Mr Cheadle described himself as a 'botanical brewer' indicate that he was a bit more than a manufacturer of fizzy drinks? In the Reading directories of the day, he is always classified as a 'mineral water manufacturer'. I wonder quite what his 'botanical jars' were.

Until the 1960s, every town had at least one of these makers of fizzy drinks. In Reading, the best-known was Tunbridge Jones, in Castle Street. Today, the trade is almost entirely in the hands of the 'big boys', and the drinks come in plastic throw-away bottles. I'm sure that many readers, like me, will remember the locally-produced drinks of our childhood with great pleasure, and how eager we were to taste them, and experience their effervescence!

The Caversham Heights Society

Members heard talks on two very different topics during March. The first was by Dr Robert Taynton, a retired GP and chairman of the charity responsible for the building and oversight of the West Berkshire Community Hospital. Dr Taynton talked about the difficulties and frustrations concerning the establishment of the community hospital with passion, humour and resignation.

In 1987 a certain Rosemary Brook, a rather formidable lady, left a plot of land for the building of a community hospital to replace the existing one which was a fire hazard and no longer fit for purpose. The land was sold for £7 million and in 1996 a charity was established to oversee the planning and development of the project to build the new hospital between Thatcham and Newbury.

It took five years of battling constant obstacles and objections

from a variety of organizations and interested bodies, including the Department of Health and the Royal Berkshire Hospital Trust, before eventually, in 2004, the Department of Health agreed to PFI (Private Finance Initiative) money being granted. Like many critics of Gordon Brown's policy to use private funding to build public projects, the speaker was very critical of the policy's impact on the NHS since hospitals have been left with paying millions of pounds to private financial companies, in this case the Nationwide Building Society, to pay for mortgages of up to 30 years to the companies that built the hospitals, in this case Jarvis. Nationwide originally lent £18 million for 30 years during which time they own the buildings and can, and have done, object to any changes to the structure of the buildings.

While the West Berkshire Hospital can undertake digital X-rays, linked to the RBH, has an operating theatre for endoscopies, a minor injury unit, a physiotherapy and out-patients departments there is no A and E department, maternity unit or kidney dialysis unit and while there is an end of life unit there needs to be an oncology department. There is a desperate need for both of the latter especially as 29 patients in West Berkshire have to travel to the RBH three days a week for kidney dialysis. The NHS recognises the need but Nationwide has blocked any hospital expansion on the grounds that it 'risks their investment'. There have been other objections raised by other local hospitals, such as Prospect Park and the RBH, even though the latter would benefit from another dialysis unit nearby.

The second talk, on the Serengeti and Ndutu, was given by Nigel Glover Wright. We were entertained with a slide show of photographs of stunning African sunrises and sunsets, and pictures of exotic birds and wildlife, taken by the speaker while on safari in the world's largest game reserve. Serengeti translates into 'the land of endless space', and judging by some of the photographs it lives up to its name. We were shown some spectacular photographs of cheetahs, leopards, lions, hyenas, jackals, giraffes, kingfishers, starlings, storks, herons, hammerhocks, hornbills and bee eaters, many with magnificent colourings so very different from their European cousins.

The society meets on alternate Wednesday evenings in the church hall of Caversham Methodist Church in Highmoor Road. 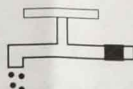
