



A new venture for Churches Together in Caversham (CTC)

One word that you do not hear very often is non-denominationalism! It's quite a mouthful, but what is it? Some years ago the buzzword was ecumenism, which meant people of different church traditions (Anglican, Methodist, Roman Catholic, Baptist, Free Churches and more) working and worshipping together, with the conscious intention and hope of bringing their traditions (or 'denominations') closer together. In many ways their work succeeded because today, in organisations up and down the country, such as Churches Together in Caversham, no-one thinks anything of the fact that we all work together. We take it for granted.

Of course we all get on together and work together for the sake of God's kingdom. Why wouldn't we? But it was not ever thus and we have the dedication of the ecumenical pioneers to thank for today's reality which is almost non-denominational. In other words, it just doesn't matter to which denomination the church belongs where you regularly worship and attend. The powers that be in our various church traditions struggle and fail to reach consensus over certain issues: meanwhile the people on the ground are just getting on with it.

We are in a time when the statistics which hit the headlines are no longer about the decline in attendance of this or that church denomination, but about how many (or few!) people go to church at all. Churchgoers and Christians are rare enough. In this context we are less concerned about differences of belief or habit, and more aware of what unites us: a commitment to Jesus Christ and seeking his kingdom. In Caversham our main activities as Churches Together are REInspired and the summer Holiday Club. See www.cavershamchurch.org.uk for more details (and notice that the name of the CTC website takes for granted that there is really only one church in Caversham, to which we all belong).

At the recent Annual Assembly of CTC we agreed a new venture; that we would adopt a 'Charity of the Year', which the churches and people of Caversham are encouraged to support in whatever way suits them and fits in with what they already do to support charities and projects. One fundraising activity at some point in the year is planned, and we hope that churches and individuals will wish to contribute to this new joint project.

We also agreed that the CTC Charity of the Year 2016-7 would be Hope Asia. Hope Asia was founded by Crispin Fairbairn, pastor of Grace Church, one of our Caversham churches, and provides a home to orphans in orphanages in Cambodia and Myanmar (Burma). It is a small local charity, and is able to guarantee that of every pound donated every single penny goes directly to the work on the ground with the children. Nothing is deducted for administration. PACT recruiting more adopters after another successful year

Adoption charity Parents and Children Together (PACT) is celebrating finding forever families for the 78 children who were placed with 57 PACT families between April 2015 and March 2016.

PACT has been supporting local families for more than 100 years providing adoption services as well as running inspirational community projects for vulnerable women and for families affected by domestic abuse.

However the search for adopters at PACT continues. Last September there were 2,060 children in England with a placement order for adoption still waiting to be placed with adopters, nearly half of whom are in sibling groups of

two or more children.

PACT chief executive Jan Fishwick said: "We're delighted to have made so many placements with our families over the last year. We must continue to recruit adopters for 'priority children' who have been waiting the longest. These children can be aged four or over, have additional needs or are in a sibling group.

"We're finding that sibling groups are often made up of three children, so if you think you're up to the challenge of three, we'd love to hear from you. Finding adopters for these groups means they can stay together which is so important.

"There is also great demand for adopters of Black British, Caribbean and African heritage."

PACT is rated 'outstanding' by Ofsted and offers support for life to all families through its award winning therapeutic support service, FACTS. PACT can also offer accelerated adoption assessments to the types of adopters who are needed most, in order to speed up the adoption process.

TALKING POINT

Agreeing to disagree

Why are there so many different churches? From time to time, this question crops up in conversation. Sometimes the implication is that Christianity is less authentic because there are so many denominations and strands of the faith.

Christian ministers in Caversham are talking together much more about what unites us than what separates us, and we're rediscovering that there are many ways in which churches can work together effectively, whilst continuing to differ about some aspects and emphases of our faith.

For example, there are now a number of projects serving the Caversham community in which Christians from different backgrounds work alongside each other. The majority of children in primary schools in Caversham have had the opportunity to explore what it is that Christians believe, through the work of RE Inspired Caversham. Groups of volunteers from local churches help deliver the RE curriculum as a free service to the schools. They are not there to convert children or persuade them to change their minds, but simply to enable children to understand what Christians believe and how those beliefs affect the way they try to live. A key feature is that volunteers explain how not all Christians have the same understanding or way of doing things, and pupils are helped to see how we still work together whilst agreeing to disagree.

Every summer, the Caversham churches work together to provide a week of holiday club fun for 150 children, and several churches have been collaborating for the past five years in the work of ARCC (Amersham Road Cooking Club) for children.

CCA (Christian Community Action) provides a weekly drop-in/support centre based at Caversham Baptist Church, and once again, there are volunteers from different church backgrounds making this happen.

At the centre of all our diversity and differences is Jesus Christ. The roots of my own denomination, Methodism, are in the pragmatic approach of John Wesley, who always put the work of the Kingdom of God before issues about church. As one Methodist put it, "We have never thought that Jesus came to found a church and then to leave the church to do his work. Much rather he came to declare the Kingdom of God. The order of thinking, we believe, goes: 'Kingdom, then the world, then the Church' rather than 'Kingdom, then the Church, then the world.'"

Unity is not the same as uniformity. In Caversham we are continuing to focus more deeply on what we can do together to serve God's kingdom in the world.

Final Landscaping Works for Christchurch Meadows

Final landscaping remedial works on Christchurch Meadows, which remain following the construction of Reading's new pedestrian and cycle bridge, were scheduled to begin in May, weather permitting.

A visit to the site by the council's contractors found ground water levels remained high on Christchurch Meadows following recent rainfall. It means that outstanding landscaping work, previously scheduled to start in April, had been delayed.

As an active floodplain, water levels on the meadows have been high since the autumn, which has limited opportunities for the contractor to revisit the site to complete the necessary landscaping work. The council remains fully committed to ensuring the works are completed,

and the contractor is contractually obliged to complete the work at the earliest opportunity.

A sustained period of dry weather should have allowed the work to begin in May.

Alison Bell, Reading Borough Council's Director of Environment and Neighbourhood Services, said,

"The council would like to reassure local residents that despite ongoing delay to the completion of these important landscaping works due to the high water levels, we remain fully committed to ensuring the outstanding works are completed as quickly as possible.

"Christchurch Bridge has been widely welcomed by local residents as not only a key new route for pedestrians and cyclists, but as a key

local landmark for Reading and the region. Associated landscaping work for Christchurch Meadows was a key element in the construction of the bridge. That remains the case and the work will be completed as soon as the weather allows."

The design and planning processes for Christchurch Bridge included specialist environmental studies. As part of that work, a flood risk assessment concluded it would be necessary to develop flood compensation areas as part of the project design. These areas have been sensitively provided on the meadows as part of the main construction contract. These are separate to the associated landscaping works which remain outstanding.

Reading's new Cycle Hub

Work to build Reading's largest cycle parking hub on the north side of Reading Station, with space for around 600 bicycles, is progressing well. It should be complete by the time you read this. The project began in February, alongside Vastern Road, and should have been finished in April, but completion was delayed due to unforeseen contamination on the site which has now been cleared. When complete the new facility will be lit and completely covered to protect bikes from the elements.

Many Caversham residents cycle to the station before switching modes to train for their onward journeys. The hub will allow an easy transition between cycle and train travel. It complements the new Pedestrian and Cycle Bridge at Christchurch Meadows, which provides a key new cycle route from Caversham into Reading Station and the Town Centre.

The new cycle hub is funded through the council's Local Sustainable Transport Fund (LSTF), which also funded the Pedestrian and Cycle Bridge.

Swan Heights site could become a temporary car park

The Swan Heights developer (Lochailort Investments) is applying to use the Reading town centre site as a car park for three years. The site of the former Cooper BMW car showroom in King's Meadow Road, near Reading Bridge, is now vacant, and the buildings on the site are being demolished.

The developer wanted to build three 98 meter high towers on the site, which would have been clearly visible from many locations in Caversham. But the plan was turned down in April last year.

Now Lochailort has applied to Reading Borough Council's planning committee for a 'part retrospective change of use' for a temporary public car park with 207 spaces for three years.

In Reading's development plan, the site is earmarked for mixed residential or office use.

Lochailort is working on a revised plan for the site.



Crossrail comes to Reading – the CADRA AGM

Over 140 people were present at the Thameside School hall in April to hear a run through of local issues followed by a presentation from Crossrail's community relations manager, John Goldsmith.

Planning issues have dominated the CADRA agenda in Caversham and news is expected on how the owners of St Martins Precinct hope to progress the full scheme, with some alterations and new tenants, following the withdrawal of the Waitrose extension. This should, in turn, allow some progress on a transport scheme. Work is moving forward for conservation areas, including St Peter's Conservation Area around Church Road. Look out for more details in the next issue. In 2017, CADRA will celebrate 50 years and would welcome views on how the organisation should move forward and how best to mark the anniversary. 
Crossrail comes to Reading in December 2019 but new services from Paddington will start in 2018. The project brings a 10% increase to London's rail capacity, with new 200 metre long trains carrying up to 1500 passengers. New routes will improve connectivity and the new rolling stock and infrastructure will improve reliability and bring savings in energy and CO2 emissions.

The scale of the engineering project is impressive and there were some extraordinary pictures of the work to create 42 km of new tunnels. A new training facility was established to address the national shortage of tunnelling and underground construction skills. Up to 3500 workers will be trained at the new academy and more than 400 apprenticeships will be created through the Crossrail supply chain.

A vast amount of excavated material has been transferred by rail, barge and road to provide material for the Wallasea Island Wild Coast project. This is a landmark conservation and engineering scheme and the largest of its type in Europe.

You may already have seen some of the changes at Paddington Station. The taxi rank has been relocated, Eastbourne Terrace has been closed for major construction works and a new road concourse. A new waterside northern entrance is starting to take shape. Many other stations require major work but Reading Station already meets the new requirements. The new ticket hall at Liverpool Street is to be built on the site of Bedlam psychiatric hospital and the archaeology has uncovered more than 85 burials so far, providing insight into lives of Bedlam inhabitants, as well as information about diet, disease and mortality.

On the western track section, six bridges have been replaced and one bridge demolished. Tracks have been lowered beneath four bridges. Work now underway includes the Acton dive-under, Stockley flyover track improvements, signalling improvements, electrification from Stockley to Maidenhead and station improvements.

When the service starts at Reading, at peak times there will be two trains per hour between Reading and central London. The operation will be franchised by TfL London Rail Ticketing system and fully integrated with Oyster. From Reading, you will reach Paddington in 50 minutes, Tottenham Court Road in 55 minutes, Liverpool Street in 61 minutes, Canary Wharf in 67 minutes, Stratford in 69 minutes and Shenfield in 102 minutes. You will be able to reach Heathrow Airport via Hayes and Harlington, Gatwick Airport and Luton Airport via step-free access at Farringdon, and Stansted and Southend airports via Liverpool Street.

John also set out the programme of electrification by Network Rail

which you can find at <http://www.networkrail.co.uk/great-western-route-modernisation/>. So far, the foundations between Didcot and Reading are complete and wires going up. New electric multiple units for Thames Valley and Oxford start this year and over 50% of masts for Crossrail West (Paddington-Maidenhead) are complete. In response to questions, he explained that a possible semi-fast Crossrail service from Reading and a direct Great Western link from Reading to Heathrow are still under discussion.

While the express trains to Paddington will continue to be the fastest journey, Crossrail will provide direct links with central London, Canary Wharf and east London, a more comfortable and reliable service to and from London, and more options for those living or working in

Reading, allowing businesses to draw staff from a larger catchment area.

The evening ended with a retiring collection in aid of the Helen and Douglas House hospice which was just short of £180.

Supporting older people to live the lives they want

A service which aims to help older people with their health and social care needs is beginning to make a real impact in Reading.

The **Living Well** service is aimed at residents over the age of 60, who have long term health conditions, enabling them to live a happier and healthier life.

A couple from Pangbourne have benefited from the service. Peter has Parkinson's disease and 79-year-old Gillian, his wife and main carer, has health problems of her own. Their personal independence co-ordinator, Sarah Finch, one of two co-ordinators employed by the service, was able to find a new care provider for Peter as the couple weren't happy with the care they were receiving. Gillian says: "Often carers would arrive late or wouldn't stay their allotted time! I was in a bad way myself and didn't feel able to handle them, but thankfully, Sarah helped us to get back on track again."

90-year-old widow Doreen, from Theale, is another person who has benefitted from the service, after being referred by her GP in August 2015. Doreen, who is visually impaired, says: "If I have a problem about any aspect of my care I can rely on my co-ordinator to help me."

As well as helping her claim attendance allowance, her co-ordinator has also helped with day-to-day tasks that are challenging for Doreen because of her sight problems, including changing batteries in her remote control, adjusting the screen size on her television and turning the alarm off on her talking watch.

Sarah ends by saying: "The Living Well service is about holistic care and improving the quality of life for our older residents - this can take a number of forms including providing support with financial matters, putting them in touch with different social clubs and encouraging them to get more exercise."

If you or someone you know would benefit from the Living Well service and is registered with one of the following Reading practices you should discuss this with your GP or ask the receptionist for information on being referred. The practices taking part are: Tilehurst Surgery Partnership, Boathouse Surgery, Balmore Park, Mortimer, Emmer Green, Western Elms, Circuit Lane, Peppard Road, Priory Avenue and Theale Medical Centre.

Following referral, a personal independence coordinator will visit the patient in their own home and help to identify activities and services that could benefit them.

The church was formally constituted in January 1871 and moved into the current building on the corner of Prospect Street in 1876 after it outgrew the original premises.

Jonathan continued "We thank God for the fantastic work of our predecessors, to establish the Baptist Church in Caversham and we look forward to serving our community for many years to come."

Spring Concert at St John's

We were treated to a very special evening of music at St John's spring concert on 23rd April. It featured the 'Burnished Brass' quintet and the mezzo-soprano Caroline Carragher, with accompaniment from Len David on piano and pipe organ.

New Bishop of Oxford

The Queen has approved the nomination of the Right Reverend Steven John Lindsey Croft, MA, PhD, Lord Bishop of Sheffield, in the Diocese of Sheffield for election as Bishop of Oxford in succession to the Right Reverend John Pritchard, MA, MLitt, who retired in 2014.

The Bishop of Oxford leads the Church of England in Oxfordshire, Buckinghamshire and Berkshire, supported by the Area Bishops of Dorchester, Buckingham and Reading. The Diocese is one of the largest and most complex in the Church of England, stretching from Milton Keynes in the north to Newbury in the south; from the Cotswolds in the west to Slough in the east.

The Diocese has a population of 2.3 million people, more than 800 churches and almost 600

parochial clergy. It also includes 12 secondary and 270 primary church schools. As the senior bishop in the Diocese, Bishop Steven will lead a large team and is expected to have a wide ranging role across the Thames Valley alongside his national responsibilities.

The Bishop of Dorchester, the Right Reverend Colin Fletcher, has been acting as Bishop of Oxford since October 2014. The Diocese faced 'an extended vacancy' after votes in May 2015 failed to produce a candidate.

The Right Reverend Dr Steven Croft, aged 58, is from Halifax in West Yorkshire. He studied at Worcester College, Oxford and then at St John's College, Durham where he trained for ordination at Cranmer Hall. He served his title as Curate at St Andrew Enfield in London Diocese from 1983 to 1987. In 1987 he returned to Halifax to be Vicar of St George, Ovenden in the Diocese of Wakefield. From 1996 he moved to become Warden at Cranmer Hall, Durham, before taking up the role of Archbishops' Missioner and Team Leader of Fresh Expressions in 2004. Since 2009 he has been the Bishop of Sheffield.

Bishop Steven became a member of the House of Lords in 2013. He is one of two bishops elected to serve on the Archbishops' Council of the Church of England, and has been chairman of the Ministry Council since 2012. In 2008 he was awarded the Cross of St Augustine by the Archbishop of Canterbury in recognition of his work with Fresh Expressions. He is the author of a number of books on Christian life and ministry and a novel for children. He writes a regular blog.

Bishop Steven is married to Ann. They have four adult children and one grandchild. He is a keen cook and bakes his own bread.

Solar energy at St Andrew's

St Andrews Church, Caversham, has recently completed a PV solar installation on its community hall. The 1960s hall, built to celebrate the 50th anniversary of St Andrews, has a large south facing roof, and was ideal for a large array that generates up to 10kW on sunny days. The electricity generated is used by hall users, and to heat the hot water for the building. Any excess is exported to the national grid.

As the hall is used during most days by the Pre-school, as well as many community groups, this should help bring down our electricity bill, as well as being good for the environment, and an advertisement for others to consider doing the same.

The funding was met through a generous legacy from a former parishioner, and Reading Borough Council had been instrumental in helping make this a reality, with Summreen Sheikh (sustainability partnerships officer) providing advice on the process and helping search out the best solar firm to fit the panels during January.

As the panels become as ubiquitous as television aerials and chimney pots, they may gain more acceptance as a standard feature on buildings old and new.

FLAG IRISES

What did you call them when you were a child? Yellow flags? Yellow irises? Or maybe you used one of the old 'country' names, like cucumbers, water-seggs, or queen of the meadow? In this part of the country they were apparently called butter-and-eggs, on account of the yellow flowers, though I've never heard that name used.

The Oxford English Dictionary says that the origin of the word 'flag' is obscure. It is recorded as meaning a plant with sword-like leaves growing by water as early as the fourteenth century – before the same word was used to denote a piece of cloth used to denote ownership, or as a means of signalling. Maybe people had looked at the 'falls' of an iris flower, flapping slightly in the breeze, and been reminded of flags on flag-poles.

Growing with the flag iris along the River Thames near here, you can sometimes find the sweet flag. Its botanical name is *acorus calamus*, while the botanical name of the flag iris is *iris pseudacorus* – the false sweet flag. The leaves of both plants are similar, and the easiest way of distinguishing them, when they're not in flower, is to crush a bit of leaf. The flag iris is scentless, but the sweet flag gives off a pleasant smell, somewhere between vanilla and oranges. In days gone by, it was strewn on the floors of churches and the houses of the wealthy.

The word 'iris' takes us back to Greek mythology, where Iris was the messenger of the gods, and wore a brightly-coloured scarf. Wherever she went, she left a rainbow in the sky. Flag irises are always yellow, but in eastern Europe, irises can be multi-coloured. A favourite of mine is *iris reichenbachiana* – which always makes me think of Sherlock Holmes, fighting it out with Moriarty above the Reichenbach Falls. I've found it across the Balkan peninsula, in Bulgaria and Greece, and the flowers can be yellow, purple, or anything in between, even in the same flower. The effect, in some cases, might be described as blackberries-and-custard.

Flag irises have big flowers, they're very common, and it's interesting to take one apart to see how it 'works'. Unusually, all the flower-parts are in threes. Most conspicuous are the 'falls', the lower petals with the pretty dark-coloured veining. Above them are the 'standards', and between them is the passageway with the stamen in it. The plant is obviously trying to attract larger insects, like bees, which have the strength to force their way along that passageway to the pollen – though often you find that tiny beetles have managed to get in as well. The stigmas are the three little upright frilly bits looking like petals that you find between the 'standards' and the 'falls'.

Intriguingly, this is one of those flowers that is marked to attract bees in a way that humans can't see. The 'fall' is intended as a kind of landing-stage, with markings to show bees the way to the pollen.

Flag irises should be flowering now near you. In some ways, they are a bit like dandelions. Both have yellow flowers, and both are gorgeous to look at. If they weren't so common, you'd go out of your way to look at them – but fortunately, you don't have to. Please enjoy them, but don't fall in the water!

CLUBS

Probus

The speaker at the April meeting of the Reading and District Probus Club was Rod D'Ayala, whose subject was 'Wildlife in the Chilterns'. Rod is a self-employed ecological consultant, and specialises in undertaking species and habitat surveys. He has a wide-ranging knowledge of the wildlife and plant life that exists in the Chilterns.

The Chilterns is a low range of hills stretching from Goring in the south west to Hertfordshire in the north east. There is a lot of beechwood and other coppiced wood including ash and hazel. It is mostly laid on chalk, being part of the central band of chalkland crossing the UK. There are many attractive landscapes in the Chilterns, which form an escarpment facing north west, and much of the area is designated as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB). The M40 motorway splits the Chilterns in two.

Wildlife habitats consist of woodland, scrub and grassland, and there are many ponds and rivers. Dead wood is a very important habitat, particularly for insects, and the scrub at the edge of woodland contains a wide diversity of wildlife.

Rod showed many pictures of the plants that exist, including, in the woodland areas, blackthorn, wych elm, dog mercury, bluebells, wood anemone, bush vetch, woodland orchids and many more. Animals include muntjack, polecat, woodmouse, dormouse. There are many varieties of insect, including beetles which live on dead wood, and reptiles including adders, slowworms and grass snakes. Different types of wildlife inhabit the different habitat types. The Chilterns contain 40 of the 60 varieties of butterfly that live in the UK.

Some types of wildlife are diminishing because people keep their gardens tidy, instead of allowing naturally scruffy areas to develop, as these are the environments in which insects and other animals will flourish, and these are important elements of the food chain.

This was a fascinating talk, enlivened by Rod's knowledge and enthusiasm for his subject, and illustrated by his many superb photographs.

Probus is a club for retired men, who enjoy a meal once a month in the congenial company of like-minded men. Lunch is followed by a talk, which may be on a variety of interesting subjects. This was a very interesting talk explaining the different types of dementia and how they manifest themselves in sufferers. She also showed us an example of a Twiddlemuff, which can help to calm dementia patients.

This was followed by tea and biscuits, before the raffle was called.

The Caversham Heights Society

The last of our series of lectures for the season was held on 6th April when Carl Feltham from the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB) gave a very interesting and informative talk on the Birds of Berkshire. His talk was made all the more interesting because of the enthusiasm and knowledge of the speaker and because his photographs,

as well as enthralling sound effects of different birds singing, brought everything to life. Carl provided an interesting discussion about different birds, reasons for their decline and/or increase, their habitats and the knowledge gleaned from catching and ringing different bird species so that a greater understanding of their flight paths and movements could be gleaned. Changing climates and strong winds are bringing new and different birds to our shores. However certain birds are in decline because of man-made actions, which include replacing wooden fascias and soffits to our houses, paving and concreting over gravel drives, and digging up or denuding our hedgerows, all things that could be reversed if we were concerned about preserving our wildlife. Carl also talked about camouflage that birds use to avoid predators and went through a 24-hour day in the life and behaviour of different bird species. The audience was encouraged to leave parts of their gardens natural with piles of logs in places for use by certain insects and slugs and snails, as well as hedgehogs; to put up nesting boxes; and to clean and disinfect bird trays, tables, bird feeders and the like to avoid the spread of infection which is killing off several of our small birds.

The audience was enthralled and felt that this was a fitting end to the season.

The following day saw a coach load of Society members travel to Beech Court Gardens in Challock, near Ashford in Kent. Unfortunately the weather could have been kinder and the spring flowers and blossoms were not in full bloom, but the trip was made by some excellent ploughman's lunches and by a fascinating visit to the medieval church at Challock. The church is now isolated, because in the 17th century the Turnpike Acts meant that the main road was diverted, leaving the villagers no option but to gradually move to a more accessible spot in what is now the village. Even so the church is well used and the unusual Millennium Murals, recognised and praised by Prince Charles, are well worth the visit.


