The Weller Centre opens with a host of community activities

On Saturday 9 September, the ribbon was cut to open the Weller Centre named after much-loved local postman, Martin Weller, who sadly died earlier this year. The community had voted in a poll to name the Centre after Martin and his wife Carol, who cut the ribbon, said: "We are so honoured and proud that the centre will be named after him. Martin always had time for people." The whole family joined her for the opening together with Mayor, Councillor Rose Williams, and MP Matt Rodda.



David Sutton, chair of The Earley Charity, spoke about its £500,000 investment in the extension and refurbishment of the former Amersham Road Community Centre. The Earley Charity has taken a 30-year lease from Reading Borough Council and has appointed Tina Ford of Catalyst Housing Association as the Centre Manager.

The Earley Charity is one of the largest local grant-making charities in central southern England. Its object is

the relief of need among the elderly, disabled or poor people living in its area of benefit which includes lower Caversham. Previously it funded the building of the Earley Crescent Community Resource Centre which is now a thriving hub within the local community.

The Weller Centre opening event was well-attended by hundreds of local people enjoying the many activities on offer. These were just a taste of what the Centre will offer the local community.

All parts of the Centre hosted a range of activities, such as an over-60s exercise class, many types of dancing, including belly dancing, and Reading Rockets taster sessions in the main hall. There were also



many information stalls there for local organisations, including ARENA (Amersham Road Estate Neighbourhood Association), RVA (Reading Voluntary Action) local Churches, Caversham Muslim Association and advice organisations.

Outside in the garden, Sandra Gough of Food4Families was giving away the crop of grapes which had thrived during the closure of the garden for the refurbishment; the Conservation Volunteers did a brilliant job removing all the weeds ready for the re-opening. The Men's Shed organisation showed their work and talked to people interested in joining them.



TALKING POINT

We are in November again a time that is very special to a number of us, a time to remember and reflect on the duties undertaken for Queen and Country in the recent past. But still we find in Church that our duty to lead a service is much tougher than some of the duties undertaken on active service, as Remembrance Sunday is a challenge for those of us taking a service where children are present. Many people in the congregation have no experience of living through a war; while at the same time there will be of course a mix of members of the church family for whom this can be a very poignant and emotional occasion. Increasingly such services include mention of wars more recent than the two major world wars of the 20th century, Falklands, Yugoslavia, including present-day fighting in the Middle East. It also includes prayers for those members of the armed forces, who are part of peacekeeping initiatives in a number of world trouble spots. Although it is called Remembrance Sunday there is also an increasing desire to complement the looking back with prayers for peace in the future.

For a lot of children Remembrance Sunday will be identified most easily as Poppy Sunday. Both in church and perhaps in school at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month and the two-minute silence to remember those who died during wars. Thankfully at least two generations in this country have not been part of a war that affected lives as directly as did the First and Second World Wars and therefore it is useful to direct their thoughts and prayers towards the theme of 'making peace'. I can say that through God's grace and from personal experience that great friendships are born out of getting to know former foe after hostilities ended and we now share experiences and look forward to a peaceful and long-lasting future in friendship and regularly meet at this time of year alternately in each other's countries.

Many see the poppy as a sign of hope, inspired as it is by the poppy fields in Belgium, where the flowers grew on the very land that had during the First World War been battlegrounds. From this we got to know the traditional poem 'they shall not grow old'. We can supplement this very special poem with a few words from the Bible for example as from Psalm 46: 9-10:

(It is God, who)... makes wars to cease to the ends of the earth.

He breaks the bow and shatters the spear.

He burns the chariots with fire.

Be still and know that I am God.

I am exalted among the nations. I am exalted in the earth.

As for us as Christians each Sunday is a Remembrance Day. It is the day when we remember the sacrifice of Jesus, who won for the entire world a different and deeper kind of peace. God's peace gift to us is Jesus. He is God's gift to all who will receive Him. Jesus makes peace with God for us and as we learn how to pass this gift on, we become peacemakers and peace-givers too. He empowers us to be peace-bringers. When generally we think of peace we think of peace with the other side, but there is a battle here at home, here around us, It is one undertaken by former service personnel who gave everything for their country and after being injured physically or mentally and discharged are left abandoned, without recognition. So, on this Remembrance Sunday may your prayers of peace be for all in need. Prince Harry gave us the Invictus Games which has highlighted the need and brought peace to those who have been given a chance. What can you do to be a person of peace and as we learn from Matthew 5: 9 'Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the sons of God.'

SMALLBONE'S


Before coming across this picture on an advertising postcard, if someone stretch of Caversham Road near the railway bridge had mentioned the name Smallbone I would have thought of the building firm, Smallbone of Streatley, or of the firm supplying fitted kitchens. It is an unusual name. Here is another 'Smallbone' establishment, on the corner of Caversham Road and Northfield Road. There is a companion postcard, with the same view but taken at night, with the neon signs declaring Smallbone Ltd

The building, with its unusual roofs and window arrangement, is immediately recognisable – it's now Drew's, the ironmongers. I used to go past it ten times a week when I worked in Central Reading. Round the corner in Northfield Road are more of the unusual roofs, showing that these buildings were built as malt-houses. Modern maltings tend to look like huge towers which dominate the skyline for miles around: these Victorian ones are more human in scale, where you can imagine maltsters going in with malt-shovels to turn the grain on the malting-floors.


Old street directories show that the business started around 1880. The

Then malting came to an end, and the premises were occupied by Stransom and Cheney, corn, hay and straw merchants. They had offices in Broad Street, and were in Caversham Road until the time of the First World War. Afterwards, in the 1920s, a manufacturing chemist, G. W. Harrison was there, and the premises were shared with other firms -Album and Solomon, tailors, and Read and Partners, electrical engineers.

Percy H. Smallbone, motor engineer, came onto the scene in 1925, and his firm was there until 1947. Then came Brown Brothers, described as motor accessories factors, and later as electrical wholesalers. They were there until 1976.

Drew's moved in the next year. Percy Drew started the firm in 1925. He was a plumber, who left his employers, Callas, Sons and May in Oxford Road, to start up on his own in a yard off Minster Street. He moved to a bigger yard in Queen's Road, when he was employing 50 plumbers, and eventually the firm moved to the shop on the corner of Friar Street and Greyfriars Road. This was probably in 1930: they first appear in Friar Street in the old directories in the 1931 edition. By this time, they were concentrating on ironmongery business. Percy's son Archie took over the shop, and then came Archie's son, David Drew. David retired in 2006, and his children took

The move to Caversham Road, well away from the main shopping area, must have been a risk, but one that paid off. Drew's reputation went before them, and they always seem to know what you want in the ironmongery, hardware and do-it-yourself line, and

Incidentally, if you look at the brickwork near the corner in Northfield Road, you can still see the 'ghost' of the Smallbone name, painted on the wall. Happy Wanderer



Funeral Director Pedals to Paris for the Royal British Legion

Funeral Director Julian Walker has cycled from London to Paris in just four days, in a bid to raise money for the Royal British Legion.

The 48-year old, who started cycling only a year ago, is a director of A.B. Walker, which has a branch in Caversham, and is one of Berkshire's oldest family businesses.

Julian was coping with a cold and lack of sleep during the epic



journey. But he said the best part was sharing the experience with the others who took part. "It's an experience I will not forget"

Julian joined hundreds of other cyclists in London at the start of the Pedal to Paris bike ride. During the challenge he cycled almost 300 miles through London, Kent and Northern France before finishing in Paris where a service of Remembrance was held at the Arc de Triomphe.

"Whenever we

through a village in France people were hanging out of their windows cheering. It made the hills feel slightly shorter to have that local support," he said.

Julian raised over £2,000 for the legion, the nation's biggest Armed Forces charity, which delivers through life support to serving personnel, veterans and their families.

"I served as an infantry officer before joining the family business and I know the importance of the support offered by the Royal British Legion," he said.

Julian enjoyed training for the ride and plans to continue cycling. He said: "It is a healthy and very friendly sport, and it has also given me the opportunity to see more of the area where I live."



The Caversham Heights Society

Our first meeting of the season began with the Annual General Meeting chaired by Jill Hodges, who is standing down, and thanked colleagues on the committee who had helped so much. Carol Cozens, the Treasurer, reported the Society was in a much healthier position than last year. Keith then re-iterated Jill's thanks and thanked her especially for her long service to the Society. She had been a member since the Society first started in November 1975. A proposal for making her an Honorary President was agreed by members. Peggy Pusey, as one of the longest serving members, was then invited to present Jill with a commemorative plate and a bouquet of flowers.

The first lecture of the season was on 'The History of Thames Water' which was given by Rob Casey, the Director of Water Strategy Management at Thames Water. Rob gave a clear and interesting overview of the water needs and services in London from Roman times until the present day. He showed that while the Romans were experts in water supply via their many aqueducts these were not needed in London because of the plentiful supply of wells though it was only in 2001 that the Museum of London discovered how water was pumped up from these wells. In 1245 a Great Conduit of lead and earthenware pipes was developed in Stratford Place just outside London's boundary at the time. Then, in 1582, the London Bridge Waterworks began pumping water directly from the River Thames but with the rapid growth in the population, and the inevitable rise in raw sewage, a solution was needed to separate fresh water from the sewage. This was found by building a 40-mile long 10feet wide channel from Ware in Hertfordshire into London. In 1609 Sir Hugh Myddleton got royal approval from James 1st to develop this channel, thus providing a water supply into London for the next 300 years. By the beginning of the nineteenth century the issue of water quality was becoming acute and between 1830 and 1860 40,000 Londoners died of cholera caused by polluted water. In 1829 the first sand filtration plant was established as a means of removing much of the bacteria affecting the water supply. This system is still in use today. During this period a Dr John Snow showed that cholera was linked to the water supply, which was still essentially drawn from the Thames. In the 1850s Michael Faraday argued that something must be done to improve the quality of drinking water. In 1858 such was 'the Great Stink' that MPs could not sit in Parliament, it was then, and only then, that they decided pass legislation to deal with the issue. This resulted in the passing of the 1858 Sewer Act. Even so because of the many different water companies at the time it proved difficult to police them all. It was not until the creation of the Metropolitan Water Board in 1903 that this was sorted out though it was only fully completed when the 1974 Water Act brought water supply, sewage treatment, and waste disposal under one overarching body. In 1984, under privatisation legislation, Thames Water Utilities was created thereby bringing in much needed investment. In 1994 the 54-mile ring main tunnel around London was built for a cost of £250 million; in 2010 the huge desalinisation plant was begun; and in 2015/16 the massive sewage disposal tunnel was begun.

Rob conceded that Thames Water does suffer from a poor image, but he pointed out that it was not always fair. One of the reasons for burst pipes, for example, is that there are so many miles of Victorian pipes that are not easy to locate and replace; another is because of the public flushing wet wipes and disposable nappies down the toilets and restaurants flushing down oils and fats with the result that enormous fat balls build up and block the pipes.






