

TALKING POINT

Magic Moments

'Magic Moments' sung by Perry Como in 1957 is a song we may associate with Christmas as it was used to sell 'Quality Street' chocolates in Christmas advertisements in the 1980's. Christmas is a 'magic moment' that many people still celebrate each year. The trouble is it is often mixed with a lot of other stuff - overloaded - and not with presents. Tired? Troubled? Preoccupied with real life worries, so that the magic moment of Christmas still feels perhaps - just out of reach?

Part of the problem might well be our upbringing. From an early age we are presented with the idea that Christmas is a time for children. Now don't get me wrong, I think the wonder and excitement that children bring to Christmas is brilliant, but it is not the whole story, and it reinforces the idea that Christmas is something you grow out of. I can understand why and that children's nativity plays cannot contain the complex threads of the original Christmas story. What do I mean? Well, you only have to read the Bible for yourself to get the salient points: Mary is an unmarried teenage mother, engaged to be married, who for shame her betrothed husband Joseph initially considers renouncing her. If Joseph had done so, Mary would probably have been stoned to death. When Jesus is born there is literally no human place on Earth for him to stay, he sleeps in a manger, an animal feeding trough. At the news of the Magi, King Herod murders young children, not that different from brutal dictatorships to this day. Joseph and Mary are forced to become refugees. The real Christmas is hardly a children's story!

For all the right reasons we protect children from the harsher elements of Christmas but for all the wrong reasons we forget what Christmas has to say to our adult world as we sentimentalise it. Sadly, that is only too clear to us when the bad things in life happen at Christmas: bereavement, illness, redundancy, homelessness, division. This is made worse by the reinforcing that we all have to be 'jolly' for a whole month of the year. Do you know how hard it is to be jolly all the time? All these anxieties of real life that have no room in our jolly commercial Christmas but are exactly the reason why God came to us, even when we make no room for Him, and not just at the Inn. Christmas is God's love making itself vulnerable to us in our troubled world. Christmas in the Bible is an enormous risk and that is no surprise because at the heart of the story is childbirth – with all the anxiety and hope that comes with that. So one thing I do believe is that Christmas is more than a capturing of childhood wonder — it is about a future yet to be born. And for those in the nativity story who can see that, they discover a magic moment – even though it looks to the rest of the world like just another poor baby whose parents can't even provide him with a bed for the night.

A while ago I went on a mindfulness course for clergy in Dorset. Mindfulness is a form of ancient meditation increasingly gaining credibility in medical circles. Basically it teaches the art of being in the present moment and seeing everything and everyone potentially as a gift. In other words, a 'magic moment'. This might be easy to scoff at, but the more I hear of increasing depression and suicide rates, or domestic violence, homelessness, or mental health issues, especially at Christmas - the more I firmly believe that we need to cultivate the art of discovering 'magic moments'. We certainly need to do something. Because what we are doing is literally making us ill. For me as a Christian it all begins at Christmas in a manger with a homeless baby and shepherds and magi and angels saying, "There is a magic moment – see it for all it's worth – it could just change your life, and help change the world."

However much we dress up the Christmas Nativity with tinsel and fairy lights, we cannot hide the real light that shines from the manger. Magic moments are not just to be discovered in church at Christmas, but in our life in the world - each day. For God loved the world so much that He dwelt among us in human form. His Spirit dwells among us now, and I am sure God provides magic moments for us to discover in the gift of each ordinary day. Just as God did over 2000 years ago in the birth of a child and all that followed from the cradle to the cross, and beyond. Magic moments that are like gifts, inviting us to receive and share them, helping to make the world a richer place for everyone.

cyclamen from his own garden. Richard, Doug, with Jane and Richard Havelock, spent a fun afternoon assembling the containers and filling them with gravel and soil, before our consultant plant expert, Richard carefully placed the plants in their new homes. We look forward to seeing what delights will emerge in the spring.

They have been well used from the outset by members of the congregation and bell ringers, and their attractive blending into the landscape has been much appreciated.

Harvest Mass at St. Anne's School

Monsignor Patrick Daly is the new parish priest of Our Lady and St Anne's Church, he celebrated the Harvest Mass for St Anne's School in October. This was Fr Patrick's first Mass in the school hall for the whole school and pupils were joined by parents, carers and friends.

After Mass, the hall was cleared by the Hall Team of pupils quickly, quietly and efficiently and was ready to be used for school lunches in no time at all.

On 1st November, staff and pupils swelled the congregation in the church to celebrate the feast of All Saints. This Mass was the first school Mass celebrated in church by Father Patrick.

CADRA celebrates Trees in Caversham and 50 years

On 17 October 2017, the Caversham and District Residents' Association marked 50 years of existence. Around midday, with help from the Mayor of Reading, a copper beech tree was planted near the Caversham war memorial. In the evening, at Thameside School, Dr John Evans talked about Trees in Caversham. Caversham has a wonderful legacy of trees, with the period from 1860 up to WWI being the high point of planting. We now have a greater understanding of the benefits that trees bring, including not just the aesthetic benefits but also beneficial impacts on severe weather outbreaks, climate change and human health. Dr Evans concluded by explaining the threats to trees and highlighting some local initiatives to plant new trees.

Changing bus routes in **Caversham**

In October, Reading Buses launched a short consultation on some radical changes to services in Caversham. This prompted a massive response, a local campaign and public meetings with Councillors and Matt Rodda, MP. A second set of proposals was then issued with comments invited up to 10 November. A second public meeting was held on Friday 3 November. The latest proposals issued on November 22nd are:

frequency and route unchanged

23/24 re-merged into clockwise and anti- clockwise

loop every 20 minutes

27/29 new routes into Caversham centre will run hourly off peak and on Saturdays, no service on Sundays an hourly through link to the RBH Monday to Saturday by extending the existing route and merging with the 19 service.

The Glastonbury Thorn



Why, you may well ask, should I be writing about a hawthorn bush in the middle of winter? In fact, this is a rather unusual hawthorn, in that it flowers around Christmas time, as well as in May.

Whatever you may think about the many silly stories that have accumulated around the Glastonbury Thorn, or Holy Thorn, over the centuries, it does exist as a kind of hawthorn, and it does flower and produce new leaves in winter. Technically, it's a 'sport' of the common hawthorn, and it is known to occur in the Middle East, and around the Mediterranean. It now appears that it's a 'sport' which may occur naturally in this country as well: self-seeded bushes have been found, well away from the famous bush on Wirral Hill at Glastonbury.

A story grew up that the winter-flowering tree on the hill at Glastonbury had been brought here by Joseph of Arimathea, the man who according to the Gospels attended to the burial of Christ's body after the Crucifixion. The story of Joseph's visit here is first recorded in the history of Glastonbury by William of Malmesbury written around 1135: or at least in the versions of the history as altered by the monks of Glastonbury Abbey, keen to attract pilgrims and the donations they would bring. Over time, the story became elaborated: Joseph had also brought with him two silver flasks, one containing drops of Christ's blood, and the other with drops of his perspiration. By the nineteenth century, he was reckoned to have brought the holy grail here as well, and to have hidden it. He was the uncle (or great-uncle) of Christ, who had been a tin merchant, and who had brought his nephew (or great-nephew) to England in search of tin. Or he had travelled here after the Resurrection with the

And did those feet in ancient times walks upon England's mountains green? Well pretty certainly not!

The first surviving record of the winter-flowering thorn dates from 1502; the



connection between Joseph of Arimathea and the thorn was established by 1645. At first it was said to have sprung from a piece of Christ's crown of thorns, but by 1722, the story of it springing from Joseph's staff where he stuck it in the ground was being promulgated.

Not surprisingly, many cuttings have been taken from the thorn, which is just as well, since the original thorn was destroyed in Puritan times.

Quainton, in Buckinghamshire, had another famous Holy Thorn, which caused problems in 1752. This was the year when we had 'lost' eleven days, to bring our calendar in line with that used across continental Europe. There was a custom there of people getting together on Christmas Eve, to gather sprigs of thorn at midnight. Should they gather on 24-25 December, or 5-6 January in 1753? They decided that the tree would probably go by the old calendar, so over 2,000 people turned up in January. It would have seemed almost blasphemous to suggest to them that when the tree flowered depended on the weather – though it has been observed to happen at any time between November and March!

Reading Minster - A place of sanctuary

eading Minster of St Mary the Virgin is a well-known landmark to all local residents, it has stood in St Mary's Butts for hundreds of years. Less well known is that it has recently returned to one of the former roles of many medieval churches, as a place of refuge and sanctuary. Today the Minster pursues an increasingly 'open-door' policy and is frequently open during the day to welcome visitors, school groups and host numerous activities for the local community including before Christmas the sale of charity Christmas cards and other items.

In the last year the church has also responded to the needs of the night time community, which if you venture into Reading town centre on a Friday or Saturday night, is remarkably busy and noisy until at least 3am. Thanks to a team of volunteers drawn from many churches around Reading, the Minster doors are opened every Friday and Saturday night from 9pm to 3am to provide a place of peace and sanctuary to a diverse range of people. In addition to welcoming many passers-by, this deliberately offers shelter and support to the more marginalized within our society; the lonely, the homeless and those suffering from intoxication, substance abuse and mental health problems. The church is filled with reflective music and beautifully lit by candlelight to create a calm and inviting space which draws many people in.

On these nights the Minster also acts as a hub for other voluntary and professional groups serving the community. This includes the street pastor - Christian volunteers who patrol the town centre providing help to those in need; they will bring people to the Minster where they can be assisted in safety off the streets. There are normally two groups of street pastors on patrol who regularly visit, in addition to one or two prayer pastors based in the adjacent church office. The First Stop initiative is also based in the Minster; these are volunteer first-aiders and a paramedic with the ambulance service who are able to assess and treat minor injuries or call for an ambulance if needed. To provide security, one or two police officers are always present. All the groups are linked by a dedicated radio network which also includes the doormen of all pubs and nightclubs, so that everybody is aware and prepared for any potential problems.

Each evening session is different and unpredictable but this would be a typical evening: At 8pm volunteers will set-up the church with music, candles and hot drinks; on Friday night the FAITH Christian group will also be in the porch serving food and drink to the homeless. At 9pm the main doors

are opened and a group of mainly homeless and lonely will happily sit at café style tables with volunteers to take hot drinks, share stories and enjoy the hospitality. Until midnight there is a steady stream of visitors, some call in specifically to reflect, sit quietly, pray or light candles; others are curious, drawn in by the candlelight and music and are welcomed by the volunteers who can explain the work of the Minster in serving the local community. There is no hard-sell, but volunteers are happy to listen to those who wish to share their story and pray with those who request it. Towards midnight the street pastor teams often bring in those who are inebriated, either on their own or with a gang of friends. It is remarkable how a loud drunken group outside will suddenly become hushed as they enter the church. The volunteers will try to sober them up with a snack and hot drink, then call a friend, a relative or a taxi as needed; first aiders are also on hand if their condition deteriorates. After endless cups of tea or hot chocolate, in the small hours the lonely and homeless tend to drift off towards their homes, hostels or places of shelter, leaving just a few to enjoy the warmth of the Minster before they venture out into the cold and rain. Overtly sleeping on the pews is discouraged but a few are quite adept at vertical slumber! Finally, by

2.30am the lights are turned on, the candles collected and refreshments are stowed away and any remaining visitors are encouraged to get ready to leave. The volunteers will lock the doors and leave by 3am but the street pastors and First Stop team will often continue for another hour or more if there is a need for their services.


The Minster sanctuary team of volunteers is drawn from many churches in the greater Reading area and typically serve an evening/ night shift once a month. There is a great need for more volunteers to continue this valuable community service, which is much appreciated by the night time community. The police have recorded a drop in street crime since the sanctuary and street pastors have been active in the town. Would you, or someone you know, consider offering your services for this work? It's always varied and interesting, sometimes challenging but always rewarding. The time may be later than your normal bedtime, but the hours pass surprisingly quickly as you are kept busy most of the time. Induction and training will be provided. The trees are cut as part of the management of lowland heath around Camberley to stop regrowth of Scots Pine shading out the heather. Lowland heath is a rare habitat in Europe and we are lucky to have a good amount in our area.

Scots pine trees are less bushy than the standard Norway spruce, but they have two huge advantages: they NEVER drop their needles and they smell great. If you are extra lucky, they are pre-decorated with pine cones!

All money raised goes to charity, with the tree sales paying for conservation volunteers in Reading to buy tools, get insurance and work on wildlife heritage sites, nature reserves and school areas, and the money from the church Christmas market will go to Myanmar refugees in Bangladesh.

Please remember that there is no parking at Caversham Court apart from a few disabled spaces, just enough space for one or two cars at a time. Park elsewhere and come in to choose your tree and gifts at leisure, leave them with us for safe keeping, and then come down with the car and we will help load. There will be another safe holding area for purchases in the church.

Caversham Heights Society Since the end of September members of the society have had the opportunity to go on one visit

and to listen to three very different talks.

On the 29th September a coach load visited Canons Ashby, an Elizabethan manor house with various additions and modifications, that has been the home of the Dryden family for the past 500 years but is now cared for by the National Trust.

Set in rolling Northamptonshire countryside, midway between Banbury and Daventry, it is a delightful gem which gives an atmosphere of timelessness. Until 1948 there was no electricity and even now the only water tap is to be found in the kitchen! The result is a dark, unostentatious and intimate family home that has hardly changed over the centuries. It is surrounded by magnificent gardens. Across the road is the Priory Church, which at the time of our visit was full of harvest fare and which is the remains of a large priory.

On the 4th October three gentlemen from the Trooper Potts Memorial Trust, Brig. Tony Verey, Capt. Andrew French and Richard Bennett, enthralled us by telling the story of the disastrous Dardanelles campaign and especially the battle of Gallipoli (1915); how the Berkshire Yeomenry [then Troop] came about; and how Trooper Potts, the only Reading man to do so, came to win the Victoria Cross. Through reading letters written by Potts' companions to their families describing conditions in the battle; by describing how Trooper Potts, under constant fire for over 48 hours, rescued a fellow soldier by pulling him on an old spade as a substitute stretcher; and by showing old photographs of the battle where 50% of the troops were injured or killed, members of the society were given a glimpse of the horrors of life in that campaign. We were also shown various items including a genuine Victoria Cross and a spade such as Potts would have used. We were also told about the educational role of the Memorial Trust and how the Trooper Potts Memorial on the Forbury came about in 2015, the centenary of Gallipoli. This proved to be a fascinating evening, even for those with little interest in military history and members of the Memorial Trust were warmly thanked for their efforts.

The next meeting, on 18th October, was a very different experience since it was largely visual. Nigel Glover White, a member of the Royal Photographic Society, delighted us with some of his pictures of the 5000 square miles of the Serengeti National park in Tanzania. Nigel showed superb photographs of the variety of birds and wild animals that can be found in the Park. The animals ranged from zebra, elephants, cheetahs, leopards, lions, hippos, crocodiles, wildebeest, impalas, gazelles to jackals and hyenas. We were also shown pictures of a variety of birds- different types of starling, eagles, egrets, herons, and roller birds. We were also shown the dry and dusty landscape with acacia trees and amazing sunsets as well as some Masai villages. Apparently there are rites of passage for the Masai from boyhood to warrior to elder. Only elders get a burial. Anyone else is left in the open to rot or be eaten by carrion.

The third talk, on 'the History of the Shrievalty and the role of the modern day High Sheriff,' was given on 1st November by Dr Christine HIII Williams, a former High Sheriff of Berkshire. In the hierarchy of constitutional figures after the Queen, the High Sheriff is the deputy to the Lords Lieutenant of each county and acts as the Queen's representative in every county plus London and Bristol.

The High Sheriff is responsible for law and order while the Lord Lieutenant is responsible for everything else! The position goes back into the dim and distant past. However it seems that the position of High Sheriff can be dated back to the 7th century, long before government as we know it was in place. Then the role of the High Sheriff was fourfold: 1. to defend the monarch; 2. to raise an army to fight for the monarch; 3. to collect taxes; and 4. to escort judges.

Needless to say over time the role has become largely ceremonial. Thus the High Sheriff escorts royal visits to his/her county; supervises citizen ceremonies; and acts as patron to the returning officer at Election times. A High Sheriff is appointed for one year only but four years in advance of taking up the post. A Shrieval Consultancy Panel seeks nominations and selects 4 people for the following four years. Nominees attend a special ceremony in the High Court in the Strand. It is up to each Sheriff to decide on his/her own particular interests to patronise.

The CHS meets on alternate Wednesday evenings at the Caversham Heights Methodist Church in Highmoor Road. Meetings begin at 7.15pm with tea and coffee and the talk starts at 8pm. 

Reading Cinemas

Do you remember the ABC and the Odeon, the Savoy, the Vaudeville, Rex and Regal, Gaumont and Glendale? A book describing all the old cinemas of Reading, with photographs of most of them, has just been published. It's been written by David Cliffe, who for many years has been writing the 'Happy Wanderer' column in 'Caversham' Bridge' on natural history and local history subjects.

David said: "During the two years I spent, on and off, writing the book, I also wrote short pieces about the two cinemas in Caversham - the Glendale and the Regal - for the 'Bridge. This book covers all the Reading, Tilehurst and Caversham cinemas - more than 20 of them over the years."

The book goes back to the beginning of moving pictures, chronicling the technical developments and how they affected picture houses in Reading. Then follows the story of each cinema. Many of them were started by local entrepreneurs, but later fell into the hands of the big national chains. As a bonus, there are lists of films made in and around Reading, and of film actors and directors with Reading connections.

The title of the book is 'Picture Palace to Penny Plunge: Reading's Cinemas.' It costs £12, and is available at Waterstone's, W. H. Smith's, or direct from Two Rivers Press – www.tworiverspress.com.

SWITCH

CAMPAIGN to encourage drivers to switch off engines when their vehicles are stationary, other than when waiting in traffic queues, is being promoted with a poster designed by a local school pupil.

The Council ran a competition inviting Year 5 pupils to design a picture to go on 'anti-idling' signs outside schools, taxi ranks and other vehicle idling hotspots around the borough.

The competition was won by Leonie McKenzie, 10, of St John's Primary School, east Reading, and signs and leaflets will now be produced to support officers in getting across the 'no idling' message to drivers. The winning design by Leonie shows a parked car belching out exhaust fumes. Posters have been designed using Leonie's picture with the messages; 'No idling, Turn off your engine - children breathing.' Another message is 'Turn off your engine – it's the law!'

The campaign to encourage drivers to switch off their engines is part of the Council's ongoing Air Quality Action Plan as research shows that switching off a vehicle's engine when stationary for a minute significantly reduces harmful pollutants and improves air quality.

The signs will be erected outside schools and other idling hot spots and officers will follow this up with a number of campaign days to promote the no-idling message with drivers. Officers will ask motorists to switch off their engines and provide them with a leaflet warning of the harm that is done to health by idling.

Fixed penalty notices can be issued when drivers refuse to switch off their engines after being asked to, or to repeat offenders.

This will also be followed up with campaign event days starting next spring to be held in a variety of locations in the borough.

Cllr Tony Page, Reading's Lead Councillor for Strategic Environment, Planning and Transport, said:

"Unnecessarily running car engines while stationary pollutes the air we breathe, leading to an increased risk of heart disease, lung cancer and asthma attacks. It is also illegal on the highway.

"Stationary vehicles can produce up to twice as many exhaust emissions as when they are moving which is why this anti-idling campaign is so important. I must stress that vehicles caught in traffic jams will NOT be ticketed!

"The aim is to focus on hot-spots such as schools and I would like to thank all the children who took part in the competition to help promote the 'no idling' message."

Why I am a Rotarian

About seven years ago I gave a talk to Reading Rotary Club about a local charity for the homeless at which I volunteer. I do not know what the Rotarians thought of my talk (although they still help the charity in many ways) but I was so impressed by the warmth of feeling and the work that they did that I immediately applied for membership.

Once inducted I was encouraged to have a look at the various teams into which Rotary clubs are divided -- including, Youth, International and Community – and I decided that this last one was the one that suited me best. The team engages in projects helping homeless and other underprivileged people. We decorated a disabled lady's house, cleared an old lady's garden as well and raised funds for various local charities. We also take people suffering from arthritis to their monthly meetings and we sell poppies each November.

More ambitiously, just before I joined, the Club built Centenary House in Reading, which provides flats for seven otherwise homeless people and which is administered by a local charity. The project was financed with aid of a mortgage now paid off thus freeing rental income from the project to be donated to local good causes. Not content with the success of that we are now engaged in helping a local charity that assists women who are in danger of violence. We are building them an annexe that will provide accommodation for seven vulnerable families.

Our Youth Service team has helped with reading in schools, installed raised beds in a school for children with disabilities and each year through Life Learning provides dictionaries for children as they move from primary to secondary education. Each year we send young people to a week's leadership course in North Wales, a project in which our Club is heavily involved. Internationally we raise money for sand dams and for hospitals in various developing countries as well as contributing to Rotary's 'Shelterbox' scheme that provides immediate relief to victims of disaster such as the recent hurricanes in the Caribbean. Also, a few years ago a party of Rotarians including members from our Club travelled to Pakistan to assist with the programme of vaccination against polio, which campaign was instigated by Rotary International in 1979 and which has led to the near disappearance of the disease worldwide.

As well as each being endowed with a large dollop of altruism, Rotarians are social animals. We meet weekly for lunch at a local restaurant and these are not the ultra-formal occasions of yesteryear. We have visiting speakers, some but not all of whom may be seeking our help for their organisations. We have parties, weekends away and biennial exchange visits with our sister club in Normandy.

All of this is based on my own experience of Rotary but there are Clubs up and down the country, including eight in the Reading area, where men and women of varying backgrounds meet at different times on different days and do great work. If you are already a Rotarian I send you greetings. If you are not and this account of my experience chimes with you, then Rotary may be for you and I recommend that you visit website https://www.rotarygbi.org/



Chat Mats arrive in Caversham

Taking time over a quiet coffee can be just the thing but sometimes a chance to chat can make all the difference. Chat Mats at the 3Cs Café in St John's Church on Gosbrook Road ensure both are available every Tuesday morning.

Chat Mats were the brainchild of Caroline Billington and spread throughout Newbury. Now, as part of the Coffee Companions project, they are available from Caversham to Cornwall.

It's a simple idea. Order your coffee, tea or soft drink (snacks also available). Ask for a Chat Mat. Put it on your table red side up and the message 'Not today, maybe another time' ensures your uninterrupted coffee break. Leave the green side showing 'Say Hello and have a chat' and a Coffee Companion will join you.

Everyone has had times when they feel lonely and would appreciate the warmth of human company. The numbers of people for whom

loneliness is a real difficulty has been recognised as a major ill in society today. Yet, to go out and break into a new gathering feels out of the question. Other people enjoy striking up a conversation at any time. Whatever your style, that is where the Chat Mat comes in.

Leave the mat by you on the table with the green side up if you would like someone to join you. And the red side if you would prefer to enjoy your drink, reading the newspaper or working your smartphone uninterrupted. People aren't mind readers and these mats are a way of gently broadcasting the message.

The idea has been received with enthusiasm by patrons of all ages at the 3Cs (Caversham Community Café). From the oldest to the young mothers and child minders popping in after nursery, all recognised there are times when others aren't around and they just want to get out for a bit of grown-up chat.

The Transition Minister at St John's,

Revd Penny Cuthbert is enthusiastic: "The Chat Mats are a brilliant idea. It's not always easy to tell who would like a chat and who would rather be left alone, but the chat mats make that clear. The 3Cs café is a great place for people to meet and make new friendships, and we hope the Chat Mats will help that to happen."

Cafés like the 3Cs increasingly have a regular weekly Companions Hour when you can know that someone will be there to talk to. Watch out for posters and stickers. At 3Cs it's from 10.30am –11.30am.

Working together, Caversham churches and Reading Voluntary Action (Champions to End Loneliness) plan to see if Coffee Companions and Chat Mats can be rolled out across all the cafés in Caversham.

Ask at the till in the 3Cs for a Chat Mat. It's open every Tuesday from 9.30am to 2.00pm.

Caversham Champions to End Loneliness are taking action!

Champions to End Loneliness is a Reading wide campaign, led by Reading Voluntary Action in partnership with different community groups around Reading to raise awareness and support action to reduce loneliness and a neighbourhood level.

On Tuesday 26 September, 40 people came together at Caversham library for a *Caversham Champions to End Loneliness Workshop*. The workshop was open to everyone and run in partnership with local Methodist and Anglican churches. The workshop highlighted information on loneliness from national and local research, encouraged discussion on what we as a community could be doing and heard from several local organisations already taking action on loneliness locally.

The organisations we heard from included:

- Engage Befriending providing befriending to housebound and lonely people in Caversham and around Reading
- Feed a Friend offering company and cake or a hot meal to people in need in Caversham.
- Caversham Good Neighbours who offer volunteer car drivers to enable people who otherwise couldn't get out and about to get to medical appointments and social engagements.
- Coffee Companions a scheme to encourage people to chat more and strike up conversation with others in cafes

Initiatives that have already started locally are:

- 'Companions Hour' at the 3Cs cafe, that invites people to come along for coffee to meet people, even if they don't know anyone.
- Pledge cards and an online pledge board to encourage people to commit to taking small actions to help reduce loneliness.

There was so much enthusiasm within the group that it was decided we would trial meeting on a monthly basis to form an 'Action Group' to focus on how we could take action to reduce loneliness in our communities and encourage others to do so too.

On Monday 30 October, 16 people met at Tipsy Bean to chat about what this group could do and how to take it forward. So many ideas were brought forward from promoting the organisations that need more volunteers, to developing the Coffee Companions initiative in Caversham, and holding some kind of reducing loneliness fair so people can find out about the wide range of activities, social groups and services available in Caversham.

The group was full of enthusiasm and will continue to meet on a monthly basis and take action to help make Caversham an even friendlier place!

The next meeting of the Action Group is 3pm, Monday 4 December at Caversham Baptist Church. Everyone is welcome.


