TALKING POINT

Magic Moments

'Magic Moments' sung by Perry Como in 1957 is a song we may associate with Christmas as it was used to sell 'Quality Street' chocolates in Christmas advertisements in the 1980's. Christmas is a 'magic moment' that many people still celebrate each year. The trouble is it is often mixed with a lot of other stuff - overloaded - and not with presents. Tired? Troubled? Preoccupied with real life worries, so that the magic moment of Christmas still feels perhaps - just out of reach?

Part of the problem might well be our upbringing. From an early age we are presented with the idea that Christmas is a time for children. Now don't get me wrong, I think the wonder and excitement that children bring to Christmas is brilliant, but it is not the whole story, and it reinforces the idea that Christmas is something you grow out of. I can understand why and that children's nativity plays cannot contain the complex threads of the original Christmas story. What do I mean? Well, you only have to read the Bible for yourself to get the salient points: Mary is an unmarried teenage mother, engaged to be married, who for shame her betrothed husband Joseph initially considers renouncing her. If Joseph had done so, Mary would probably have been stoned to death. When Jesus is born there is literally no human place on Earth for him to stay, he sleeps in a manger, an animal feeding trough. At the news of the Magi, King Herod murders young children, not that different from brutal dictatorships to this day. Joseph and Mary are forced to become refugees. The real Christmas is hardly a children's story!

For all the right reasons we protect children from the harsher elements of Christmas but for all the wrong reasons we forget what Christmas has to say to our adult world as we sentimentalise it. Sadly, that is only too clear to us when the bad things in life happen at Christmas: bereavement, illness, redundancy, homelessness, division. This is made worse by the reinforcing that we all have to be 'jolly' for a whole month of the year. Do you know how hard it is to be jolly all the time? All these anxieties of real life that have no room in our jolly commercial Christmas but are exactly the reason why God came to us, even when we make no room for Him, and not just at the Inn. Christmas is God's love making itself vulnerable to us in our troubled world. Christmas in the Bible is an enormous risk and that is no surprise because at the heart of the story is childbirth - with all the anxiety and hope that comes with that. So one thing I do believe is that Christmas is more than a capturing of childhood wonder - it is about a future yet to be born. And for those in the nativity story who can see that, they discover a magic moment - even though it looks to the rest of the world like just another poor baby whose parents can't even provide him with a bed for the night.

A while ago I went on a mindfulness course for clergy in Dorset. Mindfulness is a form of ancient meditation increasingly gaining credibility in medical circles. Basically it teaches the art of being in the present moment and seeing everything and everyone potentially as a gift. In other words, a 'magic moment'. This might be easy to scoff at, but the more I hear of increasing depression and suicide rates, or domestic violence, homelessness, or mental health issues, especially at Christmas – the more I firmly believe that we need to cultivate the art of discovering 'magic moments'. We certainly need to do something. Because what we are doing is literally making us ill. For me as a Christian it all begins at Christmas in a manger with a homeless baby and shepherds and magi and angels saying, "There is a magic moment - see it for all it's worth - it could just change your life, and help change the world."

However much we dress up the Christmas Nativity with tinsel and fairy lights, we cannot hide the real light that shines from the manger. Magic moments are not just to be discovered in church at Christmas, but in our life in the world - each day. For God loved the world so much that He dwelt among us in human form. His Spirit dwells among us now, and I am sure God provides magic moments for us to discover in the gift of each ordinary day. Just as God did over 2000 years ago in the birth of a child and all that followed from the cradle to the cross, and beyond. Magic moments that are like gifts, inviting us to receive and share them, helping to make the world a richer place for everyone.



TREE SURGEONS

OF TREE CARE

Amersham Road Cookery Club (ARCC)

Anna Clarke (Children and Family Outreach Worker from St John's Church in Caversham) has recently joined the team: she is very energetic and the children immediately related to her enthusiasm.

The cookery club was originally set up in May 2011 by Reverend Jeremy Tear and Deacon Becky Lovatt with a team of helpers. It was for children of primary school age and they met on a Wednesday afternoon after the school day had finished. Somet ime later the venue and time and day were changed, and we now meet in The Weller Centre on the 3rd Sunday afternoon of each month from 4.00pm to 6.00 p.m.

Children are encouraged to help prepare the food for cooking but are not allowed to use any cookers or hot plates - this is all done by the adult helpers. Emphasis is on cleanliness and children have to wash their hands before and after preparing the food. Preparation could involve peeling and chopping vegetables or fruit, making pastry, small cakes or bread rolls. Care has to be taken to cater for children with special allergies - and there are several. A record of these are noted as children arrive. (Often if a child with no allergies doesn't fancy what has been cooked then "I'm allergic" is used as an excuse not to eat it.) The children are encouraged to 'taste and see'.

Numbers attending are usually 12, although sometimes more than 20 arrive and one cold January no-one turned up!

Once the food has been cooked tables are laid and everyone - children and adults together - sit down to share the meal.

A theme is chosen for each month and includes a short devotional time.

The October theme was a Light Party with LED lights flashing round the walls. The children made candle lights from glass containers which they coloured and were then given tea lights to put in - the tea lights added to the excitement as they changed colour.

Lighthouses were also made using up-turned polystyrene beakers with tea lights on top. A further activity was colouring paper coasters which were then laminated

Fruit stars were cut out from melon, watermelon and apples. Also edible cheese candles made from strips of cheese - later these were served with hot dogs including some vegetarian sausages. At the end of this session the children all went home with a party bag.

December The session meeting on 16th December will

be an earlier start from 2.30pm to 4.00 pm.

The 89th Reading Scouts have been running this service for over 35 years, raising funds for the Scout Group. In the weeks that lead up to Christmas, Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorers take on the responsible job of delivering Christmas cards that have been posted in our bright red Scout Posting boxes. These boxes can be found at a number of locations in Caversham and Emmer Green including: Caversham Library,

McColls Newsagents in Emmer Green, Balmore Park and Emmer Green GP surgeries, Woodcote Way News, Co-op stores and Tesco Express. Posting boxes are also located in a number of local churches: St Andrew, St John, St Peter, St Barnabas and Gosbrook Road Methodist church.

You can post your Christmas Cards in these locations from Saturday 24th November and the last posting day will be Thursday 13th December, guaranteeing delivery in time for Christmas

Please bear in mind that we are unable to deliver south of the Caversham and Reading Bridges. In addition we do not deliver to Kidmore End, Tokers Green or Sonning Common.





Friends of the Holy Land (FHL) National Gathering at Kenilworth

The Friends of the Holy Land (FHL) accomplished its ninth year in 2018 and held a National Gathering at Kenilworth on Saturday 22nd September. A record number of delegates (110) attended, including two from Our Lady and St Anne RC Church in Caversham. It was a classic 'Wet Saturday' outside, but the gathering itself was animated not only with reports from officers but also with excellent speakers and a good deal of informal communication over lunch and refreshments.

The meeting began with an ecumenical service before proceeding to the sessional programme. Jim Quinn (Chair of Trustees) opened the meeting, and introduced Maria McCaffery (Chief Executive) to speak on the theme of 'More Christians helping more Christians'. To date FHL has raised £3.7m and has operated with a very low overhead rate, and through its local knowledge and targeting approach, has ensured the maximum of funds raised go to local beneficiaries whether families or a number of community institutions. Sourcing charitable donations and funding is challenging in the present climate, as home parishes know well. But FHL development and planning has continued, and a new strategic plan will be in place as FHL enters it tenth year in 2019. The organization remains optimistic and is preparing for a sustainable future to ensure that we can provide for beleaguered Palestinian Christian communities in the Holy Land.

Marion Homer (Communication Manager) continued the session, the theme of 'More Christians helping more Christians' being well embedded in all components of the FHL media strategy. Marion

reviewed nine 'case studies' created to help communicate the values, work and purpose of FHL and drew attention to a wide range of media resources that FHL has created and which can be used by local groups, for example, to inform and support fund-raising campaigns.

To conclude the morning we listened to the keynote speaker Sami El-Yousef. Sami, who is descended from one of Jerusalem's oldest Christian families, is the CEO of Jerusalem's Latin Patriarchate. He gave a detailed account of the difficulties faced by the Christian community living in East Jerusalem, the West Bank, Gaza, and Jordan. Calmly and dispassionately, he explained the complexity of pressures facing Christians in the region, reflecting lives lived under occupation, discrimination and as refugees. Sami revealed the dramatic decline in the Christian population of Bethlehem over the past 70 years. In 1947 Christians in Bethlehem represented 85% of the community but, by 1998, that figure had shrunk to 40%. Now, in 2018, they account for just 18% of the total population. Sami went on to explain the importance of the Christian institutions in the Holy Land, and their impact on the wider community regardless of faith or religion. He explained that, of the six hospitals in Jerusalem, four are operated by Christian churches.

The morning session closed with a combined Q&A from the speakers. Many conversations continued into the lunch period, where afterwards Olive Wood products and Christmas cards could be purchased. A local artist was also displaying her work for sale and donating all the proceeds to FHL.

After lunch, Peter Rand (Vice Chair and Trustee) opened the session. Peter is the field officer 'par excellence' of the FHL and has visited the Holy Land 25 times since 2010 to forward FHL goals, liaise with FHL local staff and to meet and develop relations with many religious and some secular organisations in Palestine (West Bank territory), Israel and Gaza, as well as in Jordan. He reviewed activities in each territory, and tried to balance pessimism with optimism and hope. Whilst the families and individuals suffer from the pessimism, Peter reminded us (as did Sami El-Yousef) that the Christian institutional presence in the Holy Land is still very strong and we could be optimistic about this. Mobilizing institutional support and interest must, in the long run, improve the chances that family and personal Christian experience of Palestinian Christians can be sustained.

The remainder of the afternoon was given over to a series of individual presentations on pilgrimage experience (Fr Patrick Mileham); optimizing a sponsored walk (John O'Brien); the work of an eleven year old boy from Worcester (Robert Foskett) who has raised (\pm 900) making candles; Pilgrimage organization (Elizabeth Pugh); and reaching new audiences (Rev. Beverley Jameson). A Q &A session preceded the final presentation by Maria McCaffrey who laid out the programme for the coming tenth year of FHL and a strategy to shape the next decade of activities. Fr. John Deeham drew the day to a close with a Reflection and Closing Prayer.

This was a very successful and informative gathering. One of its main purposes is how to inspire local groups to continue their efforts and to seek other churches and parishes to do the same. To find out more about FHL visit: https://www.friendsoftheholyland.org.uk/







Christmas cards and Robins

Will you be sending Christmas cards this year? Maybe you're one of those people who just don't. Once your friends get used to the idea, it makes things much simpler. And there's no need to feel bad about it – after all, you can always say that you've decided to give the money you would have spent on cards and postage to charity. Apart from the bother and expense, what do you do with all those cards when you get them? When the mantelpiece and sideboard are full, perhaps you have to resort to hanging them on string. Then there's the awkwardness if you've lost someone's address, or if they've moved house since last year. You might receive a card but don't know who sent it because you can't read the handwriting, or you might not receive one that you were expecting, and become anxious.



The sending of printed cards started in this country in the 1840s, and was made possible by the introduction of the Royal Mail's penny post. The custom was well established by the 1870s, and had spread to the United

States. Perhaps that other more recent revolution in communication, involving e-mail and social media, will eventually spell the end of Christmas card sending. Last year I received a number of "e-Christmas cards" from the charities I support.

From the outset, a favourite design element was the robin. It's a bird that is instantly recognisable on account of its red breast which both male and female have and it seems always to be around, even in the depths of winter. In my Caversham garden, it seems that as soon as I start to dig the soil, I hear the whirring of wings, and I know that a robin is close by, watching my every move. It will come much nearer than other birds and its distinctive song is cheerful and melodious – though of course it is singing to warn other birds to keep out of its territory. We probably mistake boldness and aggression for friendliness.

Books on superstition and folklore say that it was thought to be particularly unlucky to harm robins – to kill them, to take their eggs, or to put them in cages and bring them indoors. Apparently, even in the mid-twentieth century, some people wouldn't even have a Christmas card with a picture of a robin in the house – they would throw it out immediately on receipt.

I have read that robins appear on Christmas cards because their red breasts make us think of fire, and light – I'm reminded of the people who sat in darkness (or walked in darkness) who have seen a great light. I rather think it's because the human eye is drawn to the colour red because we associate it with fire, blood and danger. A photographer friend of mine, a Fellow of the Royal Photographic Society, once told me that the letters F.R.P.S. really stood for "Find a Red Piece Somewhere"!

The picture this month is from Thomas Bewick's 'History of British Birds,' first published in Newcastle-upon-Tyne in 1797. The caption reads: "The red-breast, robin red-breast, or ruddock." *Happy Wanderer*

Caversham War Memorial REMEMBRANCE SERVICE AND PARADE 11/11/2018



As dawn broke on the morning of this very poignant day it was pouring with rain but by the time of the Service the sun was shining. On a day with such significance it seemed fitting that we cel-

ebrated the Armistice in 1911 in the sunshine – it seemed to add to the joy that people must have felt as the guns fell silent. Great thanks was given for the end of the War, everyone present, gave extra thought to the sacrifices so many had made to give us our freedom – lives ruined in so many ways.

Thought was also given to the suffering that still lie ahead for those that did return – either they came back never to completely to recover from their physical or mental injuries and some to poverty that none of us can really comprehend this day and age. More sadness was to befall many of them and their families as they fell ill very easily with the Spanish flu and because they were so weak many of them were still to die young.

The Salute on the Library steps this year was taken by



10 children from local Organisations, holding posies of 10 poppies to mark 100 years and to remind all that their ancestors helped give them the freedom to enjoy all the things that they have today.

It seemed fitting to celebrate what was to be an interlude of peace between the First and Second World Wars.

Brakspear Brewery very kindly donated two barrels of beer and a party was held for anyone who liked to attend, at the Prince of Wales, where the Landlord & Lady – Andrew & Jacky did Caversham proud. One hundred pints of Brakspear beer was sold at 100pence (not far different to what it would have cost in 1918) for 100 minutes to mark 100 years.

Caversham suffered a very heavy loss of people during World War 1 (in some streets the names of those who died are attached to posts outside the house in which they lived) and todays Residents, as always, turned out in great numbers, to Commemorate and respect their sacrifice and this year to Celebrate the peace.

Caversham GLOBE update

In the April edition of the Caversham Bridge, Caversham GLOBE activists highlighted the air pollution killer on our busy roads with front page news. Having since installed more test tubes at four locations over a six months period, the alarming amount of harmful and dangerous nitrogen dioxide in micrograms per cubic metre (μ g/m3) has been confirmed by Winchester based Gradko Laboratories:

This means we're breathing in dangerous particles! The legal MEAN ANNUAL limit for nitrogen dioxide is 40μ g/m3. Of more concern is that air quality information collected by RBC shows that three Caversham locations have exceeded the mean annual legal limit for the past nine years!

'What is to be done?'; 'Who will do it?' and 'When?' These crucial questions and many more need some answers. The GLOBE group hopes to work with RBC Councillors, the North Reading Safer Neighbourhood Forum (NRSNF) and CADRA to develop a joint approach for remedial action. This could include: air corridors, more trees, street planters, green walls, anti-idling of vehicles when stationary and traffic reduction policies. Only by reducing the levels of polluting traffic exhaust fumes will residents, pedestrians and cyclists be able to breathe cleaner air in the long term. A call to action is overdue. Meantime, best advice might be "hold your breath"!

On a greener note, GLOBE volunteers have recently been busy in Christchurch Meadows and Balmore Walk and in Caversham centre on the planters that certainly improve Church Street. More information on the group's Facebook page https://www.facebook.com/ cavershamglobe

The Caversham Heights Society: 2018 – 2019 season

The first few weeks of the 42nd season of the Caversham Heights Society have been full and encouraging. The first meeting, on 5th September, began with the Annual General Meeting and re-election of the Committee, with the exception of the Treasurer and the former Hospitality Secretary. John Brunnen was elected to replace Carol Cozens, who was standing down as Treasurer, and Lis Nealon who was retiring after many years of loyal service. Both were presented with bouquets of flowers and thanked for their services.

Following on from these proceedings, members old and new were enthralled by two complementary talks on the 'Challenges facing the NHS at 70'. The first was given by an administrator at a large London hospital, the second by a paramedic who works for the South Central Air Ambulance Service. We all had to grasp the enormity of the pressures facing the NHS since its inception in 1948: the number of patients dealt with on a daily basis; the numbers healed of different illnesses, many of which were not identified 70 years ago; the numbers of doctors and nurses and other health care professionals; the increasing sums of money spent on the NHS and concerns over value for money achieved; the substantial reliance on non-UK staff; the changing patterns of work so that nurses are now expected to take on work previously done by doctors, whilst consultants are increasingly becoming highly specialised in their fields. There are problems to face arising from an ageing population, from the growing number of cases of obesity and diabetes, and a result of shortfalls in GP services and surgeries, too many patients opt to go to the nearest A&E Department rather than to a local pharmacist or GP surgery. The huge cost to the NHS of missed appointments was also mentioned. But, apart from what was said there is much to praise and to be thankful for in spite of many remaining challenges. The superb work done by the Air Ambulance Service was also highlighted with some very moving and actual cases being described. What came as a surprise for many was that as from the beginning of October 2018 the NHS would no longer be responsible for the Air Ambulance Services which will become charities reliant on public contributions to keep them flying.

On the 19th September we had a fascinating and well-illustrated talk on *'Victorian and early 20th Century Architecture in Reading'* given by a local expert and member of the Lutyens Society, Richard Havelock. Not only was he very knowledgeable and enthusiastic but his discussion of different approaches to architecture and how these have changed, or not, over time was insightful. The rivalry between different architects had a profound impact on the buildings in towns like Reading where a mixture of stone Georgian houses along London Road and the Assize Court in Forbury should be seen alongside the Victorian red brick properties such as Reading and Kendrick Schools. Although Reading was much maligned as a red brick town by writers such as Jerome K. Jerome and Sir John Betjeman, our speaker pointed out that the town could be proud of its heritage, and some of the great architects such as Waterhouse and George Gilbert Scott have had a positive impact with buildings like Reading Prison, the Old Town Hall, the alms houses on Castle Street, Huntley and Palmers and Caversham Rectory. Perhaps the Borough Council should do more to advertise the positive aspects of Reading now that the Abbey ruins are once again and safely open to the public?

The third event on 27th September was a day visit to Stourhead, the jewel in the crown of National Trust properties in Wiltshire. Although Stourhead is

noted for the glorious Autumn colours that show its gardens and classical temples and other buildings to great effect, the day of our visit was a little too early for this splendid show, but that seemed to matter little because we were there on one of the last hot summer days.

From the splendours of Stourhead the talk on 3rd October brought members down to earth when they were presented with a more sobering, but inspiring and encouraging, introduction to the 'Work of Launchpad in helping homeless people in Reading'. Sophie Stokes opened our eyes to the plight of homeless people by defining different types of homelessness, by looking at some of the causes, and noting that Reading had one of the highest rates of homeless people in the country – 407, or 1 in every162 households. She also noted that some 30,000 residents occupied social housing. In 1979 some Reading University students decided to get involved with the homeless issue. This group then became Launchpad in 2011 and set up as an independent charity. The charity now provides housing support, floating support, assistance with benefit applications, helping people develop budgeting, healthcare and life care skills, and it gives housing advice through a drop-in centre. It works with other local organisations such as Readifood, Salvation Army and FAITH and it helps its clients regain their independence, find employment and permanent housing. Many in the audience found this talk truly inspiring.

Future events include a Christmas Party. Meetings are held on alternate Wednesday evenings at the Caversham Heights Methodist Church Hall at 8.00pm, preceded by coffee and chat.

Before answering the call to full-time Christian ministry, Mr Saynor, age 50, was an officer in the Thames Valley Police Force. 
