



Reading's New Pedestrian and Cycle Bridge

Reading Borough Council have announced that they are working towards starting construction of the new pedestrian and cycle bridge across the Thames in the Autumn.

A public exhibition outlining progress was held in Caversham Library on May 9th and May 13th. The public exhibition was an opportunity for residents to discuss any concerns and ask any questions about the construction phase of the project.

The impressive landmark structure - located to the east of Fry's Island, between the existing Caversham and Reading Bridges - will provide a key new route for pedestrians and cyclists from Caversham into the town centre and to and from Reading Station. On the northern side it will link to the existing paths running through Christchurch Meadows. To the south it will link to an improved riverside foot and cycle path and connect via Norman Place onto Vastern Road.

When complete, the bridge structure will be approximately 120m long, with a 68m span over the River Thames. The single supporting mast - on the north bank of the River Thames - will be 39m high.

Construction of the bridge will require heavy machinery and building materials being transported onto a temporary construction compound on the far eastern boundary of Christchurch Meadows whilst building works take place. An application for a temporary construction access will be considered by a meeting of the Council's Planning Applications Committee in June.

Tony Page, Reading Borough Council's Lead Member for Strategic Environment, Planning and Transport, said:

"When complete the bridge will be a stunning landmark structure for Reading and provide a vital new link across the Thames for pedestrians and cyclists coming to and from the town centre."

"Construction is due to start in the Autumn, but before that the Council is planning for the obvious challenges of building such a large structure. That will involve some temporary disruption in terms of moving machinery and materials onto the site, but routes have been carefully planned around minimising disruption for local residents and Central Caversham, and for people who regularly use Christchurch Meadows."

"Over recent weeks officers have consulted local councillors on the logistics of the bridge construction and the public exhibitions are an opportunity for local residents to find out more, talk to officers about the construction phase and discuss any concerns they may have. I'd urge as many local residents as possible to take the opportunity to drop into either of the two events."

The preferred construction access route for machinery and materials being moved onto the site is from the IDR and via a temporary vehicle entrance on George Street. A number of options were considered when planning the route, but the route identified is located away from residential properties, is the shortest route to the construction site and also minimises the need for construction traffic having to travel through Central Caversham to access the site.

Access for machinery to the construction site will also mean the removal and replacement of seven Lombardy poplar trees which run along the eastern boundary of Christchurch Meadows, fronting George Street. The row of Poplars are around 30 years old and recent arboricultural surveys have found they are nearing the end of their safe life and are susceptible to disease.

Three of the poplars fell on to George Street last winter during the strong winds and all three were found to be diseased. Whilst nobody was injured, there are on-going concerns about the condition of the remaining trees. Aside from the seven poplars that will need to be removed to provide temporary access to the site, the council proposes to consult Reading's tree wardens and Caversham Globe over the wider removal and replacement of the remaining Lombardy poplar trees. Removal of the trees has brought protests from conservation groups.

Reading's new shared use pedestrian and cycle bridge is being funded through using part of Reading Borough Council's successful £20.7m Local Sustainable Transport Fund (LSTF), which aims to create a significant step change in trips made by sustainable modes such as walking, cycling and public transport. Other highlights of the Council's project include expanded Park and Ride facilities, working with neighbouring boroughs, and a bike hire scheme for Reading, along with a range of other initiatives.

LSTF funding is also ring fenced, which means council's like Reading who successfully bid for the money can only spend it on helping to deliver sustainable transport projects, rather than on any other council projects or services.



Caversham Bridge Newspaper 50th Anniversary

In September we will be celebrating the 50th anniversary of the *Caversham Bridge*. The organisation to produce an inter-denominational church and community newspaper was set up by Canon John Grimwade in July 1964 and the first issue appeared in September of that year.

Fifty years later the newspaper is still published every month and for all that time has been produced and run entirely by volunteers.

The editorial team is planning to produce a special anniversary issue this September and is looking for contributions from readers. TALKING POINT

Many years ago I went on a business trip to China, representing the University at an Education Fair. I travelled with a colleague whose academic subject and outlook on life were very different from my own. Once we had arrived at our destination we were too busy with our own tasks to have much time for conversation.

One evening, over dinner, we did start talking about faith – very important to me, very 'unreal' for her. Nothing I said made any kind of sense for her until we started talking about prayer. Even then it was hard going, but eventually, in my struggle to explain the inexplicable, I told her that faith, and prayer, is like 'being addressed' – being spoken to as you might speak to another person.

Some of you who read this will be tempted to dismiss all this as 'voices in his head' and not read on. But I was not talking about anything like that. There was no suggestion of being convinced I should do something weird or harmful, merely that I experienced prayer as being spoken to, understood and respected as a person. It was, and is, like being in the presence of one who creates for me a space in which I can be myself, understood and cared for even when I do not feel myself to be lovable or worth caring about.

But this understanding of faith and prayer is not, in the end, centred on 'me'. By treating me as a person, this presence reminds me that other people are persons, just as I am, understood and cared for, with needs and concerns just like me. Because of this I cannot dismiss any other people as less important than I am. Shelf stackers in the supermarket, shop assistants, lonely people in the shopping centre, are not just 'animated furniture' in the world I inhabit. As we have been reminded by no less a man than Nelson Mandela, I cannot be 'me' without 'you'.

Now turn that profound statement round the other way. If I withhold myself from you, if I simply keep myself to my-self, your opportunities for flourishing are diminished.

By reminding me that I am a person loved, understood and cared for, that quiet presence has taught me that we belong together. Our community works best when each of us makes our own contribution and when we each find a place for other people's contributions.

TOOLS WITH A MISSION (TWAM)

Sending tools across the world

In 2013 TWAM despatched the equivalent of twenty containers each 20ft long from our headquarters in Ipswich. We sent seven containers (one of which was a 40 footer) to Zambia, five to Uganda, two to Tanzania and one each to Kenya, Zimbabwe, Rwanda and Sierra Leone. There were additional significant consignments to other destinations including South Africa and Eastern Europe.

The mix of tools which has gone to help has included more than 2000 sewing machines of which 104 were treadles, 882 manuals and 1021 electric, some 90 being industrial machines. Each sewing machine is sent with a sewing pack produced by our haberdashery team who have also produced more than 300 boxes of material, almost 200 embroidery bags and 157 bags of wool.

We sent more than 1000 carpentry kits split between student (680), trade (320) and workshop (81) kits with the appropriate saws which have been restored and sharpened. The other main items were 406 computers, 308 motor

mechanics' kits, 241 typewriters, 220 builders' kits with associated groundwork tools, 179 electricians' kits, 156 bicycles, 78 wheelchairs and 20 lathes. We have also sent assorted saw benches, pillar drills, grinders, power tools, vices, clamps, mixed assorted tools, etc, etc and a few surprises such as an oven, four cement mixers, a drum kit and a weaving machine. We continue to provide schools with books and educational supplies and have sent 1,400 scholar packs. All in all a remarkable achievement from our dedicated band of volunteers, who give, collect, sort, refurbish, link with the projects overseas, share the administration, pack and load. Without such a band of contributors throughout the country TWAM would achieve only a fraction of this.

So it's time to spring clean your sheds, garages and bottom drawers. Can you help? TWAM enables people to earn a living and support themselves. In many countries of the world people have few skills, little education and no means of earning a living. A switch from aid dependency to self sufficiency is impossible without our help. TWAM does this by collecting and refurbishing tools and equipment and sending them overseas.


The opening ceremony started with a traditional Scout Flag Break (picture) and then the building was officially opened by Paul Bandy the District Commissioner for the Reading Central Scout Council (picture). Changes to Caversham bus routes

Reading Buses has proposed the following changes to Caversham bus routes, to take effect from Monday July 7th.

Route 22 for Caversham Heights, Caversham Centre and Priest Hill

The proposed changes for route 22 are very minor. The proposal is to use single deck gas buses on this route, because usage, for the most part, does not warrant double deck buses. However, because there are some journeys that would overload if they were single deck, the proposal includes running double deck buses only for the times of day that warrant them - generally the morning and early evening commuter times. Passengers using the gas buses will benefit from more buggy space and free WiFi. The route and frequency will not change.

Route 23 for Caversham Park, Henley Road and Briants Avenue

Not as many people are using route 23 as Reading Buses would like. The proposal is to reduce the frequency of this service from every 15 minutes to every 20 minutes. There would be no route change

Route 24 for Emmer Green, Grove Road and Rotherfield Way

Route 24 is performing well at the moment and to reflect that, the proposal is to increase the frequency from every 30 minutes to every 20 minutes. Grove Road and Evesham Road residents will also be affected by the proposed changes to the route 2/2A (below).

Route 2/2A, Route 25

Reading Buses are proposing to split route 2/2A

(formerly Vitality 2/2A) in the town centre.

The southern part of the route would continue to run as now, as route 2/2A (lime). There will be no change to the frequency or route, but buses will terminate in the town centre (probably at Reading Station stop EL) and will start from Blagrave Street stop EM on their way to Burghfield/Mortimer. Anyone wishing to travel north of the River Thames would have to change buses in the town centre.

The northern part of the route (to Caversham Centre, Peppard Road, Sonning Common and Peppard Common) would change to become route 25. The buses will still be the CNG powered buses that you are used to (albeit it painted pink), and the frequency would not change. Buses would start and finish in Reading town centre (probably Friar Street) and would run by Reading Station and Reading Bridge.

There would, however, be a slight change to the route. The Evesham Road/Grove Road 'kink' in the route would be removed so that the buses would run straight along Peppard Road. It is hoped that this minor change will improve reliability.

For Grove Road and Evesham Road residents, as stated above, route 24 would increase from every 30 minutes to every 20 minutes, which should compensate for the loss of route 2/2A. By splitting the route, Reading Buses expect that the reliability on both ends would improve considerably. The number of people using the through service on the current 2/2A route is low, so they believe that the split will be a viable solution to reliability problems.

Following these changes, all Reading Buses routes through Caversham will be pink.

The Ways and Means Trust

EGRA celebrate 30 years

On 10th April, at the Emmer Green Residents' Association AGM, about eighty members and several local councillors marked the association's 30th birthday with celebratory refreshments that included a beautiful cake made by the cousin of the secretary, Jane Handley, and cakes and biscuits, using recipes from the Mapledurham Mill cookbook. Margaret Ormonde, the Chairman, led the formal business of the evening. She reported another busy year for EGRA, monitoring planning proposals and guarding against threats to our adjacent countryside. Photo panels were on display to show highlights from both this year and the past thirty years. Membership currently stands at about 500 households. Margaret reminded the audience that the more members we have, the stronger our voice, and asked them to encourage friends and neighbours to join the association. She reported that most members of the committee were continuing for the coming year but that anyone interested in joining the committee would be welcome. The association continues to support community projects and has built up good relationships with the council, councillors and other local organisations.

Next, Linda Glithro spoke about the recently formed Dunsden Owen Association, established to publicise Wilfred Owen's connections with the local area and to promote his poetry through a series of events from 2014-18. The association has been awarded a Heritage Lottery Grant to achieve this. Wilfred Owen was lay assistant at All

Saints, Dunsden, from 1911-13. A Wilfred Owen trail, which includes the house in Emmer Green where Owen's parents lived, will go live on November 9th and be available as a smart phone app and as a leaflet. A vigil concert, featuring A440 choir, will take place at All Saints, late evening on August 4th, on the anniversary of the declaration of war. There will be a World War 1 exhibition at Dunsden Village Hall and a series of events during Remembrance Sunday weekend, 9 - 11 November. A further aim of the association is to make social links with Ors, the village in northern France where Owen died. Visits to and from Ors have taken place and more are planned for the future. Full details can be found on the association's website, www.owenindunsden.org.

Margaret then introduced Corry Starling, the miller from Mapledurham Mill and guest speaker for the evening. He delivered an extremely entertaining presentation about the mill, which is the only working wooden mill on the Thames, dating from the 16th century. Corry has been the miller for seven years now, after previously working on estate maintenance and has learned milling on the job, through reading and research. He explained that the fortunes of the mill over the centuries have been closely linked to the manor house which has for many years been owned by the same Catholic family, the Blounts. The present incumbents have been lovingly restoring the manor house, the mill and the village for the past thirty years.

The recent floods affected the mill badly, with no milling from November till April. The force of the water could have ripped the paddles off the wheel! The mill was alert to flooding this year; the shop stock was lifted to safety and everything in the mill that the river might have swept away removed. The mill has a new water wheel made from six oak trees grown on the Mapledurham estate. In April 2011, a turbine was fitted at the other side of the mill and now generates electricity that is sold to the grid, providing an additional income source. Corry was delighted to tell us that the Mapledurham turbine was commissioned two years before the Queen's at Windsor! He is hoping that they may soon be able to use more locally grown grain from Highclere Castle.

Corry reminded us of the films that have been shot at Mapledurham, most famously 'The Eagle Has Landed'. We can see Mapledurham on TV at present as the location for the BBC2 show, 'The Big Allotment Challenge', which was filmed there in beautiful sunshine during last summer. Margaret thanked Corry for such an informative and fascinating talk. We predict that there will be a lot of EGRA members visiting the mill this year.



The scenic gardens played host to a playful Easter trail on a sunny afternoon on the bank of the River Thames, when families flocked to Caversham Court Gardens on Saturday to find clues in a nature-themed Easter Egg Trail. Every nook and cranny of the public park was explored by young competitors vying for a chocolate prize.

Vickie Abel, chairman of Friends of Caversham Court Gardens, said: "We have the most magnificent gardens with lots of heritage to enjoy. It's so lovely to see lots of kids running about and enjoying the nature."

Scattered clues helped entrants build up pictures of different animals on a worksheet.

Many families are expected to return on Sunday, June 22, for a summer party with theatrical entertainment and children's activities on a history theme overlooking the River Thames.

Ms Abel added: "Caversham Court was the only open space by the river that wasn't flooded this winter. You could still walk along the terraces, enjoy the greenery and watch as everything else was flooded. We were very lucky."

The site dates back to the 12th Century and was refurbished in 2009 thanks to a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund. The restoration has scooped a number of accolades including Britain in Bloom Best Regional Park and a national prize from the British Association of Landscape Industries.

Caversham's latest coffee venue 'The 3Cs'

Mayor of Reading Councillor Marian Livingston was among the first to sample the delights of Lower Caversham's new café 'The 3Cs'. Caversham Community Café opened for business on Tuesday, May 6, in St John the Baptist Church, Gosbrook Road.

Richard Purkis, of Lower Caversham Community Partnership, said: "This is a venture run for the community by the community. I hope that the cafe will be well used, well regarded and grow."

The not-for-profit café serves a range of freshly-ground coffees from espressos to cappuccinos, teas, infusions, cakes, biscuits and crisps every Tuesday, from 9.30am to 2.30pm. As custom builds, more days will be added.

The 3Cs grew out of conversations between Caversham Hall, New Bridge Nursery and St John the Baptist Church. Together they formed the Lower Caversham Community Partnership, and surveys among the people and businesses of Lower Caversham showed the demand for a café in the community.

Thanks to grants from Reading Springboard, the Big Lottery Fund and Church House, St John's church has been suitably adapted, a café counter built and a volunteer manager and staff trained. Equipment and fairtrade coffee and tea were sourced from Reading's own Kingdom Coffee.

Rev Jeremy Tear, community priest at St John's, said: "St John's is delighted to be hosting the cafe and working in partnership with the nursery and the hall. Do come and visit us - you would very welcome!"

Bean Pole Day

Many people attended Bean Pole Day, an annual event which was held in Caversham Court on Saturday, 26th April, between 10am and 3pm, to promote local woodland products and wildlife friendly gardening.

On sale were bean poles and pea sticks, willow plant supports and reconditioned gardening tools. Many stalls had plants for sale.

There were stalls run by many local organisations, including RSPB, BBOWT, Ways & Means, Food 4 Families, Friends of the Earth, Reading Beekeepers, Friends of Caversham Court, Friends of the Harris Gardens, Tilehurst Horticultural Association and Motor Neurone Disease Association. Many of these had products for sale.

In addition, many children's activities were organised, the kiosk was open to serve drinks and other refreshments, and a tool sharpening service was offered.

THE CAVERSHAM BRIDGE COFFEE CAR

Looking around the streets of Reading, and of Caversham, today, there appear to be more opportunities than ever to enjoy a cup of coffee – though at a fairly high price. A hundred years ago, the supporters of the temperance movement must have found things rather different. There was a plethora of public houses, and they felt it necessary to set up stalls



in the streets where people could buy tea or coffee and a bite to eat at a reasonable price.

We still have such a stall in the middle of St Mary's Butts, which I believe started up in this way. There was another, until recently, on Station Hill. Then there are photographs from the early twentieth century showing a stall at Cemetery Junction, run by members of St. John's Church in Watlington Street, and there was this one, by

'England in Miniature' was the title of Graham Horn's talk, which proved to be a trip to the Isle of Wight. Views of well-known and less familiar sights proved what a lovely place it is, and members were prompted to visit as soon as possible.

The speaker also judged the competition: Easter biscuits. The winner was new member Claire Elliot, with Ishbel Nicholson and Sylvia Myszor as runners-up.

Details of the forthcoming river trip were given; let's hope the sun shines! More Easter goodies were on offer for lucky winners of the raffle.

Caversham Heights Townswomen's Guild

The Guild are now comfortably settled in at the Methodist Church. In May we had an interesting talk by a Magistrate, Roger Doust JP.

By way of contrast, the Social Studies group enjoyed 'Puppy Walking' by Carole Arrowsmith.

Continuing the animal theme, a visit to Adam's Farm, [the 'Countryfile' fame], to see his rare breeds of farm animals.

A coffee morning was held, and a visit was made to Caversham Heath golf club for afternoon tea.

The ambling group wandered through Clayfield Copse to see the bluebells, and on to Dunsden church. They were joined by two temporary members – a small child and a large dog.

Our next meeting will take place at Caversham Heights Methodist Church, 74 Highmoor Rd, Caversham, and will be our 53rd Birthday party, with a Carol of Bells.

St Peter's Wives Group

The speaker for our April meeting was unable to attend, but one of our members, Pat Williams, very kindly stepped into the breach, and delivered a talk on the Amish people of Pennsylvania. She came attired in their traditional garb of black dress, black apron, black tights, black shoes and white bonnet. They wear no adornment of any kind, not even watches.

The movement was founded in Europe in the late 17th century by Jakob Ammann and, to escape persecution, members left Europe for Pennsylvania. The most common Amish are the Old Order Amish, who are mainly farmers and live in exactly the same way as their forefathers. They use no cars or tractors, and just have horses and carts or horse-drawn buggies to take the family about. They are very devout people who pay a tithe to their church and meet in each other's houses for church services. They often have six or seven children and also look after their old people in their own homes. Education is very basic and finishes at 14 years old.

They manage without electricity and use bottled gas for cookers and fridges, and kerosene lamps and candles for lighting. There is no radio or television and, if there is a phone, it is situated in a shed or barn. The women make beautiful quilts on their manual sewing machines and sell these to boost their income, as well as selling fruit, vegetables and flowers from the farms. Some Amish men work in the construction industry or make furniture, and girls sometimes work in supermarkets.

Between 16 and 25 years of age, young people are given a year off and are allowed to live normally and wear jeans, drive cars etc. They usually return to the fold but, if they decide to embrace the outside world, they must forfeit any further contact with their families.

Caversham Bridge, run by the 'Adult School'. There may well have been others.

The picture – or a scan of it – arrived following my article about the Caversham Adult Schools in the February edition of the 'Bridge'. I was asking for information about the activities of the Schools, and now it seems that they may have been involved in running a refreshment stall, among other things. It may be that the Caversham School ran it, or equally, the other three Adult Schools in Reading may have had a hand in running it.

The stall itself was on wheels. The canopies could be folded down, and it had shafts, so that it could be moved by a horse. It is seen here standing in front of the prefabricated cast iron public lavatories which stood on the Reading side of Caversham Bridge. They must have been there until the 1970s, and were then dismantled, moved, and re-erected at the Chiltern Open Air Museum near the Chalfonts in Buckinghamshire.

The Adult Schools were supported by the Society of Friends, or Quakers, and it would seem that the purpose of the Schools in running the stall was to give people the chance to buy a drink away from the temptations of alcohol. One can imagine that on a fine summer's day the area around the bridge would be thronged with people of all ages, going boating, or swimming, or strolling by the river.

The influence of the Quakers, and of the temperance movement, on Reading must have been considerable. From the late 1960s, I can just remember the shop run by the Reading Temperance Society in St Mary's Butts which sold 'Amethyst' non-alcoholic drinks, and The Lodge Temperance Hotel, in King's Road.

Going back further, I can remember my mother telling me that she had joined the Rechabites as a girl – it was a temperance friendly society which had started in Salford in 1835. I can also remember, at my Church of England primary school, being made to learn the Church Catechism, and the Christian's Duty, in preparation for confirmation. The Catechism seemed very long, and was in the language of the 1662 Prayer Book. In part of it you had to promise 'to keep my body in temperance, soberness and chastity'. We were far too young to understand what we were saying, of course, and when one of us plucked up the courage to ask what 'temperance, soberness and chastity' were, I'm afraid that no satisfactory answer was forthcoming from the teacher!

Chazey WI

Helen Lambert, Chairman of CADRA (Caversham & District Residents Association) was the speaker at our April meeting and she certainly proved a popular choice. Supported by Beldon Bensley from the Caversham Heights Society, on hand with some technical expertise, she gave us a very informative talk on 'Caversham - 100 years on' with the aid of slides depicting Caversham at the turn of the 20th Century, before and beyond. How many of us knew, for example, that in days gone by Caversham Bridge was in part a drawbridge which would periodically be raised when the local population felt threatened? Or that Caversham Park was once a hunting park? There were so many stories to tell, and much of it fascinating for those of us living locally.

Helen also brought some publications about Caversham's history, including maps and photographs for us to buy.

Our April meeting was also an occasion to celebrate the founding of Chazey WI, first established in 1982. In keeping with the occasion, a delicious birthday cake was served for members and visitors - and much enjoyed by all!

Chazey WI meets on the first Tuesday of every month, 7.30 for 7.45pm, at Caversham Heights Methodist Church Hall, corner of Woodcote Road and Highmoor Road. Our programme each month is varied and interesting, so come along and make new friends!

Caversham Heights Society

The Society held two meetings during April, and made a day visit to Chiddingstone Castle in Kent. The first meeting was on the making of the film 'War Horse' by Andy Robertshaw, a military historian, who advised Steven Spielberg, the film's producer, on certain aspects of the film. It was clear from Andy's comments that Spielberg did not always take his historical advice because it did not necessarily suit the best shots for filming! Spielberg was not the easiest of people to work with and we were given some hilarious descriptions of filming that went wrong and were very amateurish. Filming took place over an intense four month period in Stratfield Saye, Wisley, Boreham Wood and Luton Hoo. Because the film category is a '12' there was no swearing and no actual dead horses, and both boys and horses could only work for four hours a day, whereas the equine make-up artists often had to work for 14 hours a day. There were over 1000 people on location on any day of filming and 120 live horses were involved. On reflection Andy felt that the film was less about war and more about friendship but it was certainly worth seeing.

The final meeting of the season was on the work of 'Magistrates in the Community'. The talk was given by Roger Doust JP, who provided an insight into the role and power of magistrates, and how these have evolved since Justices of the Peace were established by King Richard I in 1311. They are often called 'the Great Unpaid' since their only remuneration is expenses. They have considerable power, since any charge, be it murder, drunkenness, anti-social behaviour, theft or a traffic offence, begins in a Magistrates' Court. The majority are women, who were first enrolled on 31 December 1919. There are always three JPs sitting at any one time though only the Chairman of the Bench is allowed to speak. The maximum imprisonment they can impose is 12 months, though the fines that are handed down depend upon a sliding scale issued by the Ministry of Justice.
